Residence of American Ambassador, in Rome, Damaged by Fire Yesterday.

ROME, April 1-While Lloyd C. Grisscom were returning yesterday from the Easter services at the American church, Mr. Griscom saw smoke rising from the roof of his home, the Palazzo Del Drago. Leaving Mrs. Griscom to follow him he hurriedly entered the building. The servants were following their respective duties, unconscious of the fact that the palace was on fire. The ambassador gave the alarm and led the way to the attic where, on opening the door he was confronted by a burst of flame which burned one of his fingers and singed his

The firemen were quickly on the scene but not before the beams, which were put in place a couple of years ago, were burning briskly.
