





Canned goods from the United States have been imported into Fredericton in large quantities recently to meet a demand which the Canadian supply cannot fill. Tomatoes are the chief item in the importation. Wholesalers say that the tomato crop in Ontario was almost a total failure. All the big canning factories are situated in that province and their output was very much curtailed. Unfortunately for the consumer, the importation of tomatoes from the United States will not reduce the retail price, as the prices of the wholesalers are based on United States prices plus duty and surtax. In Fredericton one can of tomatoes can be bought for twenty-five cents, and in the United States three cans can be bought for the same amount. 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


