



Vienna, March 15—The newspapers here show marked anxiety over the Ger-man situation. The Neues Wiener here show marked anxiety over the Ger-man situation. The Neues Wiener Abendblatt says it is a crime "that a handful of blind generals and other of-ficers who organized the plot" can oc-cupy public buildings but not compel workers to work. It adds that "a du-rable military victory is impossible." The Neue Tag says: "Berlin is not all of Germany and a successful raid is not a victorious revolution. The En-tente still has a word to say." "It is a great misfortune," comments the Neue Freie Presse, "that strikes Ger-many. The Entente should not in any circumstances recognize an overthrow that the German people in their entirety do not approve."
