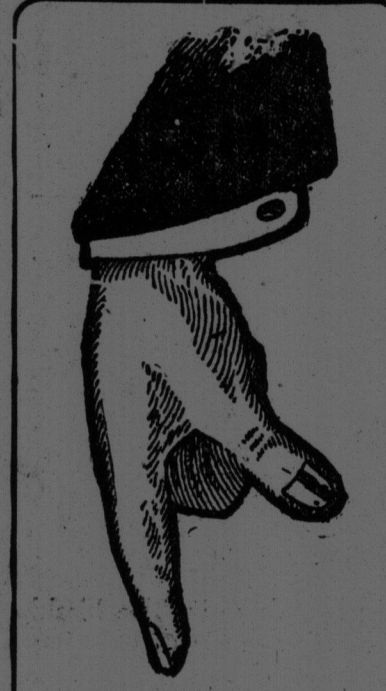
QUEBEC BUSINESS MAN DEAD

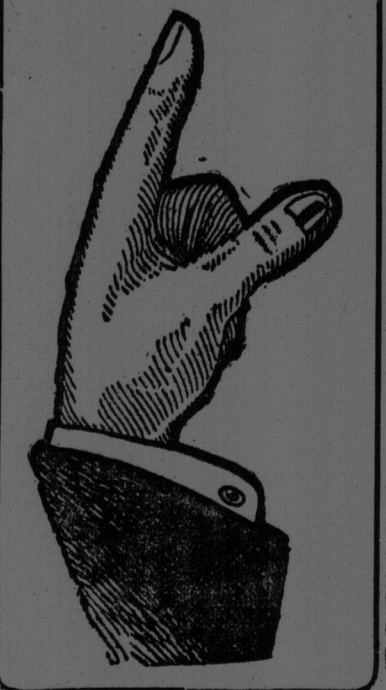

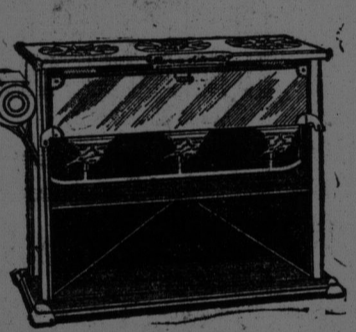

THE CROWN LANDS

One of the most important planks in the platform which Mr. A. B. Copp has submitted to the electors of New Brunswick is that which relates to a survey of the crown lands of the province.

That is exactly what Mr. Copp proposes to do, and what the present government has utterly failed to do, although one of its pledges was to have such a survey made.

We will undertake a re-survey and valuation of the crown lands of the province and provide for the conservation of our forest reserves under the direction of scientific foresters.

It will help us to understand more clearly the great need of such a survey in this province if we examine the report by Dr. Fernow of the forest survey of Nova Scotia.

I have no doubt that the cheapness of the proposition made it attractive to the government. I offered to undertake a survey of the 21,000 sq. miles of the country for \$40,000.

It must be intensely gratifying to Dr. Pugsley and to his friends to find that the latest effort to besmirch his record has ended as previous ones did in utter and complete failure.

But the most striking statement made by Dr. Fernow, and one which proves how important it is not only to have a survey of the crown lands of New Brunswick, but to prevent the cutting of small timber, is his declaration that the present mill capacity of Nova Scotia is capable of exhausting its merchantable timber in twenty years or less, and that it takes 120 years to grow a 12 inch spruce.

Senator Edwards: "Then they had better reduce the mill capacity right away." Dr. Fernow: "If they do not reduce it, it will reduce itself, because the timber will be gone. That is about the impression I would leave. We found that there is twenty years of stock on hand in Nova Scotia."

Natural reproduction will, of course fill some space, but it will not do it as fast as the Nova Scotia lumberman has believed.

Because of this condition of affairs Dr. Fernow urges the necessity of other provinces securing absolute and accurate information about their timber resources.

Therefore, the people of New Brunswick will pursue a wise course if they place Mr. Copp at the head of a new government pledged not only to survey the crown lands but to conserve them under the direction of scientific foresters.

Dr. PUGSLEY VINDICATED

There has come to the notice of New Brunswick the shock of another great surprise. The first surprise came when Hon. Dr. Pugsley, as Liberal leader, swept the province of New Brunswick in the federal elections of 1908 in face of the most bitter and unscrupulous attacks, and open slanders by his opponents.

But despite these various heart-breaking experiences, hope still lurked in the tory bosom, and when it was announced that a commission would be appointed to examine carefully into all contracts made by the late government there was an exultant shout that at last Pugsley would be found out.

And now comes the last awful surprise. The commission, of which that high souled patriot Mr. A. B. Morin was the head, until the exposure made by Mr. F. B. Caswell, compelled the government to ask for his resignation, has thoroughly examined all the contracts made by the late minister of public works, and found that Mr. Borden cannot do better than allow the contractors to go on and finish their work.

It is a relief then came on the scene, and on the angle vented spleen; So, thinking of what might have been, He hooked it!

POWER FROM REVERSING FALLS WAS HIS THEME

David J. McGrath, in Institute of Technology, Attacked Possibility of Utilizing It

Among the graduates at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology yesterday was David J. McGrath. A report of the proceedings says: "David James McGrath of West Roxbury attacked in his thesis the possibility of utilizing for power the reversing falls at St. John. Here on account of the relations to the narrow mouth of the river and the tidal wave there is a falls which reverses its direction twice each day. The matter of utilizing tides for power has always been discussed and here the circumstances are peculiar. There is evidently much energy here in the reversing of the falls and it has been Mr. McGrath's study to consider possibilities. The story was illustrated by means of lantern views, from which it is evident that there are two falls—upper and lower—which by simultaneous observations give a head of water of about ten feet.

"The outcome of the investigation is that for the utilization of these falls there would be necessary a channel through soft rock of 1200 feet in length and there might then be used a turbine or an air-

compressor of the bubble type. In competition with power now in use Mr. McGrath questions whether these falls will be useful and profitable till coal and river powers are passing. This thesis was the outcome of several weeks of study last summer. The thesis presented by Kenneth Cahill Robinson of Rosinville at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology commencement exercises in Huntington Hall on Tuesday last had for its subject one of the recent lines in which conservation manifests itself, in the proper consideration of timber. The special field which Mr. Robinson has investigated is what is termed, dry rot, a fungus effect which weakens the timber. Although very much construction has by no means passed, wood is often more resistant than steel. It is true, however, that wood is subject to the little investigated injury caused by fungi which are really in the nature of infectious disease. Lantern views showed how insidious the workings of the fungus while dormant for a long while may suddenly develop. It is a real problem to determine whether and to what extent timber is affected. In a series of experiments with southern pine Mr. Robinson discovered that sound timber will absorb but little water, and this increases as the timber becomes rotted. The absorption of water, therefore, affords an index of the condition of the timber.

CHATTY NEWS OF THE GREEN ROOM

Florence Roberts an actress who had many admirers in St. John during frequent engagements while playing in support of her late husband, Lewis Morrison in "Pansy" and other successes has met with great success in the west. Miss Roberts has attained a position as a producer on the Pacific coast similar to that enjoyed in the east by Mrs. Pike, and for a period of five years she starred in plays produced jointly by David Belasco and herself. During recent years, however, she has appeared in a number of John Curt's successes, and it is under his management that she is planning to produce a new play early in 1913. "It is a curious fact," said Miss Roberts to a reporter, "that my vaudeville tour which I expect to interrupt my tour during July long enough to produce the play for one week at Belasco's theatre, the Alcazar, that city. My vaudeville tour will extend into December, and some time in January I expect to launch the new play in New York city. The aforesaid citizen inquired why anybody should pay homage of money to the Polish pianist simply because he would play the piano. This patron of the arts had recently seen another artist who had managed seventeen other instruments, including the jewsbarg, besides the piano. Consequently the writer entertained no exacting opinion of Paderewski's value to the world. Since her return to Paris, Madame Sime has been saying something very agreeable about the United States. To the French reporters, she remarked: "I find myself smiling at myself if I would not rather live over there than here. Life in New York is so free, so inspiring to work so bright, so lively; its skies are so purple so filled with sparkling sunshine, even in winter; society there is so cordial, the women are so considerate, one gets into a veritable passion for work at top speed, one feels lifted up, forced to do one's best. Here one is tempted to lie in bed half the day; there such temptation doesn't exist, one wants to be up, stirring, working all the time. It is in the atmosphere. It is in the hearts of the people, since one is never so happy as when working. I ask myself if these twenty-five weeks I spent in New York were not happier than any I ever spent in Europe."

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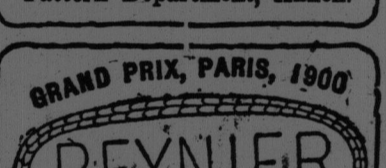

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CANADA'S PUBLIC BUILDINGS

Some Criticism in "Builder," a British Trade Paper

(Times Special Correspondence) London, May 21.—The future development of Ottawa is dealt with in this month's "Builder." Speaking of the natural beauty of its situation, the writer states that "while not rivaling Quebec, perhaps, in the scale and grandeur of its natural setting, Ottawa has a unique charm and distinctive character of her own which at all costs should be preserved. No capital city in Europe, with the possible exception of Budapest, has finer natural advantages or more romantic possibilities, and it would be nothing short of a disaster if the most is not made of such a magnificent opportunity. "It is, we believe, rather the custom in Canada to hold that the country is too busy in other directions, and is not yet rich enough to undertake great town planning schemes, but that later on, with more leisure and more wealth, they could be dealt with to greater advantage. If, however, we are to judge from the experience of this country, Canada will never be better able to afford them. Here such schemes are considered impossible because of the enormous value of the land and vested interests concerned, and it is customary to lament the fact that they were not carried out long ago when the land was cheaper and when, presumably, the country was poorer. Some interesting things are said about public buildings produced by the Government Department of Public Works. "We do not believe in departmental art, here or elsewhere. If in this country

the most that can be said for the best of such productions is that they are indifferently good, the most that can be said for the best of those produced in Canada is that they are indifferently bad. The worst are simply deplorable. This is not the fault of the officials, but of the system. "Although it might be possible to improve the standard of work by thoroughly reorganizing the department and offering salaries that would attract first-rate men, there is not the slightest doubt that the system is inherently vicious and that the government would be well advised to make a clean sweep of it and give all public work to the most competent architects in the domain. "If a town-planning commission is to succeed it needs a free hand and undisturbed authority. The creation of such a commission would seem to be a good opportunity for closing the department and conducting the architectural affairs of the state by more efficient and up-to-date methods."

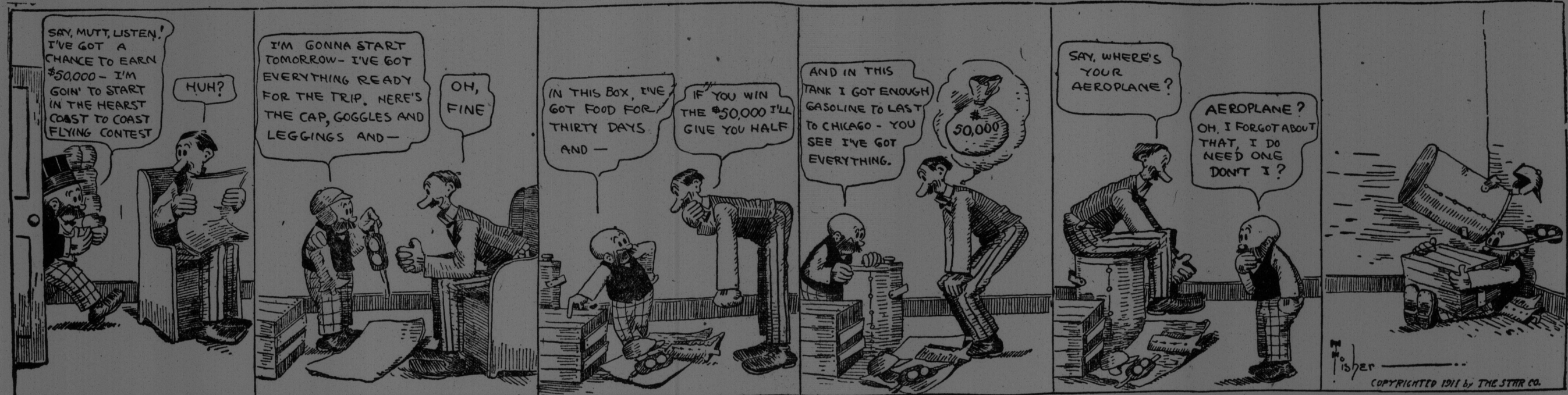

BRITISH MONEY FOR TWO CANADIAN TOWNSHIPS Big Scheme for Pine Extract in New Ontario is Being Considered (Times' Special Correspondence) London, May 21 - The announcement that some time ago the Duke of Sutherland contemplated the acquisition of a large tract of land in Northern Ontario for colonization purposes, centred attention on this part of Canada, and the addition of the new territory, Patricia, has attracted British capitalists to the undeveloped northern portion of the province.

Up to the present, Patricia, has been a half-breed who had been charged with attempting to kill an Italian. The campaign to raise \$400,000 for Dalhousie University was commenced yesterday and congratulatory messages were received from King George and others. The total amount received up to yesterday was \$200,000.

The proposal to give a city subsidy of \$1,000,000 to the British Canadian Ship-building Company, of which Sir Henry Pellatt is president, was approved by the citizens of Sydney, C. B. yesterday, the plebiscite showing a vote of six to one in favor.

One of the promoters is going to Canada this year and, if the proposition gains the assent of the government, steps will be taken to establish two townships. Sufficient skilled men to erect the necessary dwellings for the work people will be sent out. A portion of the land would be used for agricultural purposes, the intention being to make the townships as far as possible self-sustaining.

He later saw the man repeating on a freight car bound east. Another rumor is to the effect that both Mr. Smith and Mr. Doherty, the two men who were "entertained" at some length by the burglar, saw going in King street on Monday afternoon a man whom they were almost positive was the burglar.

The police have found the boots which were left behind by the burglar. They were in Thorne & Co.'s store. It had not been discovered that the burglar took a revolver, cartridges and several watches from the sporting goods department of Messrs. Thorne.

TODAY'S POLICE COURT

DOG SHOW IS TO BE HELD IN SEPTEMBER

Increased Interest Expected as Canadian Club Has Raised Local Exhibition to Two Point Show

St. John is to have a dog show again this year and exhibiting week is the time chosen and the Queen's Rink the place. The decision was reached at a meeting of the N. B. Kennel Club held last evening in the office of Vermer McLellan, the club's hustling secretary. In the absence of the chairman, Geo. J. Allen, vice-president presided.

This year's show will be either three or four days in the week, beginning on September 2. It will be held under the auspices of the Canadian Kennel Club and will be what is known as a two point show, in contrast with those of other years, which were but one point shows. This means that winners at the show of next fall will count two points towards a championship whereas in last year's exhibition only one point could be scored. The double scoring this year means much more general interest, and especially an influx of exhibitors from outside places.

WOODWORKING FACTORY BOUGHT

The latter work has been delayed owing to the lack of asphalt, and some of the commissioners are inclined to blame the old council for not having ordered a stock of this material when they knew how long it takes to secure it.

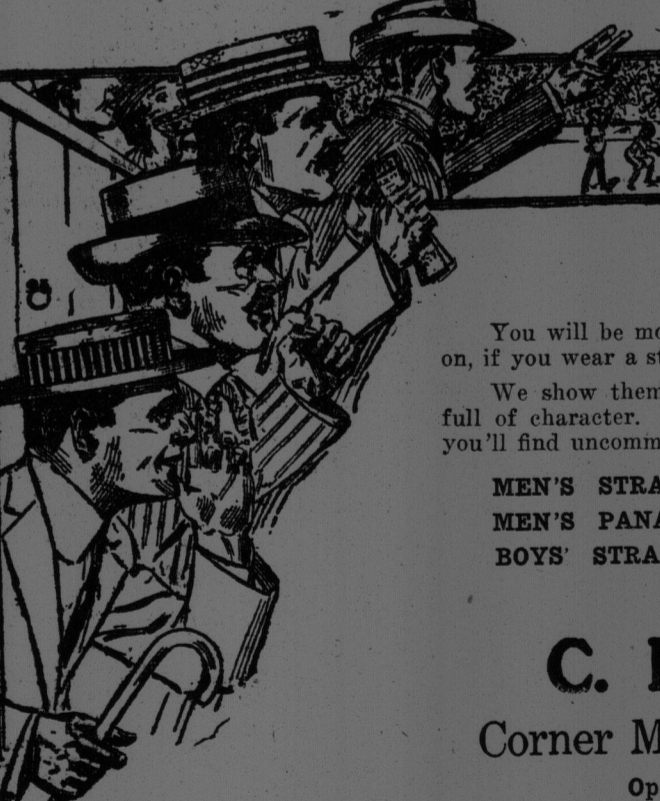

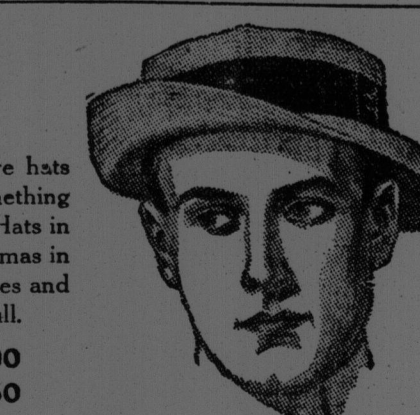
