The strike of the dockers was not ordered by the unions, the men simply refused to await arbitration and walked out. They demand a raise from seven pence to eight

demand a raise from seven pence to eight pence an hour.

The meat trade is seriously threatened by the strike. At least twenty steamers, including the Minnehaha, which has just arrived at Tilbury, with a cargo of dressed beef from America, and other freighters are unable to discharge.

Many other vessels are loaded with meat from Australia, New Zealand and Argentina. The meat and other perishable goods are being taken care of in refrigerators aboard the steamers, but if the strike continues there will be a shortage







It is fortunate for the Liberal party that at this crisis a statesman, of such great moral strength as Lord Morley should be at the helm to direct his party in the House of Lords. It has been proved in past years that he is a daring pilot in extremity, while he does not underrate the strength of his opponents. Something of a sensation was created this week by the Tory rumor that Lord Morley was hastening a big political crisis, and that the Asquith government is tottering to its fall. The only excuse for this was that Lord Morley had signed the whip to the Liberal peers wich ordinarily is not issued by the leader in the lords, but by the party whip. Lord Morley is always terribly in earnest. He hopes for a peaceful solution of the constitutional difficulty, and to this end he made a strenuous appeal to the Liberal peers lest they should be caught napping by the wild backwoodsmen who are anxious to rush the situation and defeat the parliament bill, instead of following Lord Lansdowne's policy of climbing down. The Tory leader is known to be averse to a fight and does not care to challenge a division. Lord Morley has issued no extraordinary threat. He merely wishes to whip up the whole strength of the Liberals with expectation that Lord Lansdowne will own defeat without firing a shot, The Liberal party is prepared for the creation of Liberal peers, but the leaders do

ation of Liberal peers, but the leaders do not expect that the irresponsible policy of the wild peers will mean more than a ripple in the troubled waters.

Party organization is seriously occupying Mr. Balfour's attention. The party secretary has already got to work. The constituencies realise more drastic innovations. The result of the new organization will be felt in the autumn when home rule will be the test. Mr. Balfour having failed in the country is blaming not himself or his policy, but the organization, as if elections and a change of public opinion were won by machinery. It may be that Mr. Balfour is hoping to get rid by the tangle created by the tariff reformers, in which case he may persuade the new organizer to revert to old time Toryism and clear the decks for Tories of the Balfour type, and once again restore the influence of the Tory leader who has given a personal magnetism to the leadership. The policy of Mr. Balfour is pointing to the final suppression of tariff reform as an essential part of future Tory policy.

Statistics of the lumber purchased by furniture and car manufacturers in Canada in 1910, have been compiled by the forestry branch of the department of the interior; 117,893,000 board feet of timber were used worth \$2,987,210 at an average value of \$25.35 per thousand; of this 65 per cent was nafive wood at \$20.82 per thousand while the imported wod cost \$33.86 per thousand. Ontario was the principal consumer, using over 50 per cent of the total amount. About one third was used in Quebec and the remaining fifteen per cent was consumed in Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island used a negligible quantity. The timber used in Ontario, both native and imported, was more expensivel than in the other provinces, while Nova Scotia is a particularly cheap lumber province.
