

STRANGE TALES ARE NEW LAMP BURNS

The Indians Speak of Hot Springs and Weird, Huge Animals.

Nenana, Alaska, May 16.—(Associated Press By Mail).—The unknown Arctic region between the Colville and Porcupine rivers, where Dr. Philip S. Smith has led a party of the United States Geological Survey on a perilous mission of exploration, is the locale of strange tales, spread among fur traders and gold hunters by the native Eskimsos and Indigass.

The territory which the Smith party has gone to investigate and chart appears on the maps largely as a blank space. Certain rivers, like the Colville, never have been traced to their headwarters, and what in the way of topography and resources lies within an area of 35,000 square miles has been a matter of conjecture.

Reports have trickled out of the Polar Basin that great lakes of oil were to be found in this wilderness. But the Eskimsos and Indians tell stranger stories. They say the land is haunted by weird beasts, some of such immense stature that they leave tracks as large as dinner plates. It is said that no Indian can be persuaded to penetrate the region, even though tempted by the promise of abundant fur. The lore has it that there are great areas of hot springs, where the snow never falls and the streams never freeze.

Statistics Show That More Than 9.000 Returned in April-May.


Ottawa, June 18-Figures prepared by the Immigration Department, on special instructions, seem to indicate that Canadians, who have been in the United States, are beginning to repat-

United States, are beginning to repatriate themselves. The statistics apply only to Canadians who have been resident in the United States for more than six months. During April and May the number of such who have returned is more than 9,000.

At the end of March the immigration officials began to check up such returning people. In April at 148 points out of 171 along the boundary where there are immigration inspectors 4,084 were reported as having returned. In May at 129 points, 4,839 returned with 42 points still to report. Instructions have been issued to immigration inspectors to forward to the department each month hereafter a statement of the number returning who had left to secure work in the United States, or who had been living there for a more or less extended period.

DISCUSS UNEMPLOYMENT. The unemployment situation in the city was discussed at the regular meeting of the Civic Employes' Local, No. 16576, last evening in Trades and Labor hall in the Bank of Montreal building with A. 

It was said the standardization inspection doctor had criticized the records as furnishing scanty information.



The medical staff also asked for an investigation of the handling of diabetic patients who, it was reported, received from unauthorized sources food other than their diet called for. It was suggested that separate accommodation be given these patients, but the meeting was of the opinion that there was no such accommodation available.

The report of the superintenden showed a daily average of 147 patient and 344 cases under treatment, 143 re maining aot the end of the month; with maining aot the end of the month; with 70 operations in the operating room and 102 operations and 805 treatments in the out-patients' department.


