Findings May Solve Riddle Regarding These People

By HERBERT MOORE (United Press Staff Correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17-Almanacs of stone discovered at the ruins of the ancient Maya city of Coba in Yucatan show that he Maya occupancy of Yacatan took place at least a century and a quarter earlier than supposed, according to statements made by Dr. Sylvanus Morley, director of the Carnegie Institute excavation expedition.

the Carnegie Institute excavation expedition.

It is now fairly certain that the ancient Maya had begun to colonize the peninsula during the early part of the fourth century, A. D., rather than at the close of the fifth century as native accounts indicate. The discovery is expected to lead to startling results in the Yucatan puzzle.

During May two members of the expedition operating at Chichen Itza in northern Yucatan, plunged through 40 miles of the tropical jungle lying to the southeast of the modern city of Valladolid and came upon a raised stone terrace, several acres in extent, marking the site of the ancient city of Coba.

In the centre of this terrace stood a magnificent stone monument, 10 feet high and 4 feet wide, elaborately sculptured on all four sides, with figures of rulers and their slaves and columns of hieroglyphics. This discovery led to the finding of seven other similar monuments nearby.



DEAR MISS DIX—Why is it that young men living with widowed mothers very seldom marry?

## HEAVY RAINFALL HOLDS UP HARVEST WORK ON PRAIRIES

Considerable Cutting is Already Done Along C. P. Main Line

WHEAT YIELD GOOD AND GRADE IS FAIR

Manitoba Gives Indications of Average Crop; Little Rust Reported

WINNIPEG, Aug. 16—About 50 per cent of the wheat, oats, barley and rye south of the main C. P. R. line to the Saskatchewan boundary has been cut in the prairie provinces and from 15 to 25 per cent in more central and northern areas, according to the weekly crop report of the Canadian Pacific Railway, issued from the offices of D. C. Coleman, vice-president in charge of western lines, here today.

Good harvesting weather obtained until the end of the week when heavy rainfall interrupted the cutting and threshing which had been fairly general. The latter shows a good yield and grade of wheat while barley was fair. However, the recent rains will help fill out the later sown grain, including a proportion of the wheat, as well as improving pastures and grass crops. WINNIPEG, Aug. 16-About 50 per

#### GOOD AVERAGE CROP.



In the central and northern areas there is a wide variation in the amount of cutting accomplished, varying from 10 vanced condition of crops.

present indications are that better than average wheat yields will obtain in entire area adjacent to and south of the main line of Moose Jaw east to Manitoba boundary and due south of Moose Jaw to the international boundary together with territory west to Shaunavon. Other central and northern parts will be fair to good, making exceptions of the Outlook subdivision and the area north, west and scuthwest of Swift Current where the crop will prove a low yielding one. Rains which have been general in the past 48 hours will delay harvesting a day or so.
