THE BROWNS.—The four masted barquentine Browns, 1000 tons was launched at South Maitland, N. S., the other day. The forecast is square rigged, the other masts being fore-and-aft rigged. This evening the annual meeting of the St. John A. C. Club will be held at Gordon Pavilion hall for the election of officers, and the discussion of important business. The report of the treasurer, Mr. C. E. MacMichael will be handed in.

In this report may be seen among others the following interesting accounts: GATE REVENUE.—Base ball matches, \$2,000.40; Cricket matches \$77. Sports \$115.85.

It will thus be seen that base ball cost during the season of 1888, for match-players and material alone, \$6,212.86, and that the club derived \$6,267.49 from the gate receipts. Include the cost of printing, suits, and maintenance, and the revenue derived from base ball will be about \$100,000.

CRICKET has been a great expense to the club, as may be noticed by the report. Cricket has cost \$44,674.84 of the club's annual expenses and maintenance, and has been a source of revenue to the extent of \$27. A private subscription, however, of \$12,000, as mentioned above, and \$50 from President A. O. Skinner has increased the club's resources to the extent of \$13,000.

The maintenance spent on cricket, \$54,674.84, including clothing, rolling and repairing grounds, etc.

CRICKET has been added to the total of \$45,479.40 which \$116.29 was expended on the season.

Lawn tennis has cost this year \$23,054.40, and the club's football combined team up magnanimously with \$45.50 against that.

The athletic sports cost \$109.85 out of the club's pocket, excluding sundry expenses and lost post \$118.80.

This evening the question of allowing ladies to play football combined with the question of the admission of equal importance will be discussed and a full attendance is requested.

IN THE NORTH WEST.—A gentleman of this city just returned from the North West has much to say in favor of that country. "The crops," he says, "are good, and in answer to the inquiries of the Gazette reporter, 'are good this year, although not by any means as good as the crops of the year previous. This has been a particularly dry season in different parts of the North West, and as a consequence the wheat yield has not been as large as expected. However, while some of the farms have scarcely yielded, the wheat of wheat to the acre, others have yielded as much as twenty-two, and some have reached as high as twenty-eight bushels. The wheat itself is excellent, and as a dry season is generally followed by a season of considerable rain, the crop next year is expected to be an exceedingly good one."

"Manufacture now coming into that part of Canada in large numbers although we have said the season here is somewhat adverse to immigration. Railroads are being constructed, and there is rapidity in the Northwest, and these are sure to open the country and attract settlers."

THE "OSCAR WILDE" ARREST.—Her Passenger Escape, but Have a Rough Experience.

When the steam ship Oscar Wilde was starting to leave Glasgow yesterday morning she was disabled by the eccentric rod of the engine breaking. Captain Andrew Newbold of the Oscar explained to Captain Porter of the accident and asked him to send the "Star" up to tow the disabled steamer to the city. He was told to bring the steamer down carefully as far as he could and he would be met by the "Star."

By engineer Stevens ingenuity the eccentric rod was fixed so that the steamer could go ahead but not backwards, and a start was made. At Thompson's wharf they met the "Star" but as the Oscar appeared to work along all right it was thought she could complete the trip alone. Everything went well till shortly after seven o'clock just as the boat was rounding Robinson's point to head for Indian-town, the captain at the wheel was horrified to find that the steering gear had broken and that the boat was running straight for the steep cliffs. He knew that the boat could not back but he quickly pulled the bell cord and had the engine stopped. But almost before the sound of the bell died away the steamer brought up against the rocks with such a crash that passengers and crew were spraying in all directions, and the stove-chimney and dishes from the pantry were rolling about the floor. A cry was raised that the boat was sinking, and everybody rushed wildly for land. Geo. Hillerton, one of the crew, seized a rope, leaped ashore with it, and made the steamer fast, and in a few minutes all hands got safely ashore over a plank, just before the steamer rolled over on her side and settled down. There was a crew and eleven passengers, the most successful one of whom was Mrs. Andrew Johnston, of Simons street, the only lady passenger on board. "Like the boat she got wet to the knees getting ashore, and had a very rough experience in climbing over the wet and a slash covered cliffs to reach a
