TORONTO CONFERENCE,

HELD IN THE CITY OF TORONTO, ONT.,

JUNE 11th to 18th, 1885.

THE SECOND SESSION of the TORONTO CONFERENCE was opened in the Metropolitan Church, Toronto, on Thursday, June 11th, at 9 o'clock a.m., beginning with the Conference prayer-meeting, which continued for one hour.

The President, the Rev. ALEXANDER SUTHERLAND, D.D., occupied the chair.

The 753rd hymn was sung, the 103rd Psalm was read, the Revs. Dr. Rose and W. PIRRITTE led in prayer.

The Rev. THOMAS GRIFFITH, M.A., called the Roll, when 142 Ministers and 86 Laymen responded to their names.

What Ministers or Probationers for the Ministry have died during the past year?

THE REV. ISAAC GOLD,

Who died at Uxbridge, November 6th, 1884, was born in the State of Maine, United States, during a temporary sojourn of his parents there; from which place they returned to England, residing for a time at Noyle, Wiltshire, and afterwards at Plymouth. At the age of twelve he came with his parents to this country, living for a few years at Quebec, and then removed to Melbourne, "where he was brought up," and where, at the age of twenty, he was converted through the labours of the Revs. T. W. Constable and B. Cole. He was educated at St. Francis College, Richmond. In 1859 he entered the regular work of the ministry, under the Superintendency of the Rev. Jay S. Youmans, and for twenty-two years he "preached the Word, instant in season, out of season," was faithful to "reprove, rebuke, exhort with all long suffering and gentleness;" he "did the work of an evangelist and fulfilled his ministry."

On some of his circuits, as Aylwin, his labours were especially owned of God. He was "esteemed exceeding highly in love for his work's sake," and also for his many social and gentlemanly qualities. He was well read, intelligent and gifted in conversation, painstaking in his pulpit preparation, and a very intellectual, instructive and impressive preacher.

In 1880 he was compelled to superannuate for one year, having contracted a severe cold from sleeping in a damp bed, which, developing into consumption, prevented his return to active work. On his retirement he moved to Uxbridge, where

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he remained until his departure to be with Christ. It was a great grief to him to be so early laid aside, and even up to his death he had a strong hope—begotten of earnest desire—that he would yet be able to resume his life work. In his sickness he thought much of the importance and urgency of the work of soulsaving, and several times expressed regrets that he had not been more earnest and successful in winning souls, though he remembered gratefully what God had wrough through him. At one time during his illness he passed through a period of severe spiritual conflict that almost overcame him, but he came forth a better man, and ever after there was noticeable a tender and triumphant trustfulness, a patient and cheerful submission to the Divine will. He was much in meditation on the Scriptures, and was particularly comforted and encouraged in all his sufferings by the though of Christ, who "though he was a son, yet " learned obedience by the things which he suffered."

At the last death came suddenly, but was not a surprise. The night before his death, having now given up his expectation of recovery, while talking of his prospects of the future, he said, "I am calmly and patiently rejoicing in hope of the glory of God." The Rev. N. Burns, B.A., who was with him but two hours before the end, said, "Though he was not anticipating so speedy a departure, yet he spoke of dying with a calm composure, as one whose expectation of heaven had passed from hope into certainty. There was no rapturous ejaculation, but he was as a thoughtful Christian looking quietly at death's near approach, and ready to step into the great unknown with firm, unhesitating tread."

THE REV. JOHN LYNCH

Was born in the county of Armagh, Ireland, February 28th, 1838, and died in Queensville, Ontario, May 7th, 1885. He was converted during the great revival in Ireland, and united with the Wesleyan Church, and soon after became a class-leader and local preacher. After exercising his gifts in this way for a time, he emigrated with his father to the United States, and settled in the State of Indiana. After a brief residence there he came to Canada, and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church. The Rev. W. H. Shaw, who was then Presiding Elder on the Huron District, employed him on the Meaford Circuit in 1866. At the ensuing Conference, he was admitted on trial and sent to the St. Vincent Circuit. In 1868 he was sent to Muskoka Mission ; the next year, 1869, he was Admitted into full connexion and ordained deacon, and subsequently had charge of Orangeville, Hanover, Eramosa, Georgetown, Orangeville, a second term, and Yonge Street. His last appointment was received at the first united Conference, in Toronto, in 1884, when he was appointed to Queensville Circuit, in the Bradford District, where he "ceased to work and live."

He was united in marriage, in 1869, to Miss Lettia Hall, who now, with five children, mourns her loss. Brother Lynch was a genial and affable man, a consistent Christian, and a faithful minister of the Lord Jesus. His social qualities and uniform kindness made him many friends.

His brethren, at the recent District Meeting for Bradford District, entered upon the District records a suitable and tender tribute to his memory. His illness was very protracted and severe, but through all he was sustained and comforted by the faith of the Gospel and the love of Christ.

His end was not only peaceful, but triumphant. Funeral services were held in the Methodist church at Queensville, which were very largely attended by the good people of Queensville Circuit, who throughout his entire illness were thoughtful, kind and affectionate. There was present also a large representation of the ministers of Bradford District. Toronto and Uxbridge Districts were also represented.

The remains were conveyed to Orangeville for interment, on Tuesday, the 12th of May, and were met at the station by a large number of attached friends.

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Memorial services were conducted in the Methodist Church, Orangeville, by the Revs. J. G. Laird and R. Cade, in the presence of a large and sympathetic

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During Brother Lynch's pastorate of Willowdale Church, he was an esteemed audience. and active member of the Division of Sons of Temperance. On hearing of his death, this Association kindly sent Mrs. Lynch a card of condolence in which they express, in tender words, their affection for her deceased husband. Mrs. Lynch and her bereaved family have the sympathy and prayers of the Church.

THE REV. JOHN CARROLL, D.D.

The Rev. John Carroll, D.D., was one of the best known and most highly esteemed ministers of the Methodist Church in this country. He was born in 1869; converted in 1824; taken out into the itinerant work to fill a vacancy, under the direction of a presiding Elder, in 1827; and after a ministry of fiftyseven years, died at his post, December 13th, 1884.

John Carroll's conversion, though it occurred very early in life, was strongly Though he was but a lad, and one too who appears to have been mercifully kept from most of the evil practices often indulged in by inconsiderate youth, he was deeply convinced of sin, and the subject of a thorough repentance. Under the promptings of a quickened and enlightened conscience, he set himself diliberately and earnestly at work to put himself right, as far as it was in his power, with both God and man. He went, first of all, to his mother, who appears to have some time previously become a Methodist, and told her that he had made up his mind to serve God and save his soul. With deep contrition and many tears, he confessed to his brothers the childish faults by which he feared he had offended them and given them pain. He went to the classmeeting and reported himsef as a seeker of salvation. He offered himself for membership in the Church, and was received on probation, while as yet he was a servant, rather than a son of God. In the meantime he sought for salvation with strong cries and tears, finding his way, often, into the woods in order that in solitude he might, without interruption, cry aloud unto God for salvation. Under a sermon by the Rev.

At length the day of deliverance came. Rowley Heyland, he was enabled to look away from himself, and getting his faith fixed upon Christ as the all-sufficient Saviour, to cast on Him the burden of his sin and to entrust his soul with its eternal interests to His keeping. He felt in that instant that he was saved. The Spirit itself bore witness with his spirit that he was a child of God. In the evening of the same day Mr. Heyland preached again, discoursing this time on the indirect witness of the Spirit, and he felt that he had all the marks of the new birth, that he was indeed born again, that he had entered upon a new life.

Another event which took place soon after had, no doubt, a powerful effect upon the whole of his after life. It may be best described in his own words. "A few weeks after my conversion," he says, "through the effect of a sermon by Father Youmans, I received a further blessing—a persuasion that God had cleansed my inmost heart. What I experienced in those days prepared me to receive the testimony of Scripture relative to God's speaking to holy With Paul I truly felt that God had 'revealed his Son in me. I assuredly 'tasted the good Word of God,' and falt the powers of the world to come. When I arose in the morning it seemed as if all creation was praising God."

Such was the spiritual preparation for his life work which John Carroll received when he was as yet but a boy. From that time forward his eye was single, and his whole body was full of light. He was one of the most guileless, transparent and upright men that ever lived. It could scarcely have been otherwise, for he lived in habitual and uninterrupted communion with God. He

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was eminently a man of prayer. He learned to pray, as we have seen, even before his conversion, and the habit grew upon him to the end of his life. He delighted in prayer; and what was said of Asbury might be said of him, "he prayed and prayed until the wonder was what he could find to pray for." He was a heavenly-minded man, who was so habitually occupied with divine things that religious conversation was as natural to him as to breathe.

He was a diligent student, especially in all matters related to his own calling as a minister of Christ. He read the sacred Scriptures in the original; he was well versed in theology and ecclesiastical history; he gave careful attention to apologetics and biblical criticism; he was well read in Christian biography and books of devotion; and he was an industrious and skilful collector of facts and incidents connected with the early history of Methodism in this country. In, this latter field of investigation he has had probably no equal among us, and in the results which he achieved in it he has left an invaluable legacy to the Church.

As preacher and pastor, Dr. Carroll especially excelled. Neither his voice nor his presence was favourable to the highest oratorical effect. His sermons, however, were generally of a high order. They were always carefully prepared, combining the results of wide and careful reading with great originality of thought, and they were well adapted to awaken the conscience, to stimulate the religious life of the believer, and to lead the sinner to Christ. He was an incomparable pastor, attending to the details of pastoral duty with a minuteness and conscientiousness which could hardly be surpassed. His industry was phenomenal. Though he carried on a comprehensive and systematic course of reading and study, and performed the part of an original investigator in important fields of enquiry, wrote books, and contributed constantly to the pastoral duty was never neglected.

Such a ministry could scarcely fail to be eminently fruitful. It is not surprising that, go where he would, he was constantly meeting with people who had been brought to God through his instrumentality, and those who had been signally helped in their heavenward journey by his godly counsels and admonitions. And this experience was not confined to the period of what may be technically called his effective ministry, but continued to the close of his life. He did not outlive his usefulness. His ministry was fruitful to the last. He was, in the truest and best sense, an effective minister until the end came, and he ceased at once to work and live.

Dr. Carroll's eminent gifts, his deep piety, sound judgment, and, above all, his simple desire to promote the glory of God in the salvation of souls and the prosperity of the Church, received ample recognition from his brethren. He filled in succession the most important circuits and stations then existing in the Church. And for twenty-seven years—a longer term than has fallen to the lot of any of his brethren-he filled the office of Chairman of District. He once filled the office of co-delegate, or Vice-President. And in every position to which he was called he faithfully served the Church. During the last few months of his life he was engaged in establishing a mission and building a church in an outlying suburb of Toronto, an undertaking in the accomplishment of which he laboured with even more than his accustomed zeal and assiduity. It was while he was actively engaged in preparing for the dedication of the church that the fatal stroke came, from which he did not completely recover his consciousness, and which resulted in his passing peacefully away three days afterward to be forever with the Lord. He rests from his labours, and his works do follow him. Though his familiar form will be no more seen among us, and we shall miss his words of inspiration and admonition, he will long live in the affectionate remembrance of his brethren, to whom his name is still as ointment poured forth

THE REV. SAMUEL DWIGHT RICE, D.D.

Samuel Dwight Rice was born in the month of September, 1815, and was, therefore, at the time of his decease, on the 15th of December, 1884, in his 70th year. He was an American by birth, as were both his parents, the place of his nativity being the State of Maine; but being taken in his early childhood to Woodstock, in the Province of New Brunswick, where he grew up to manhood, he became patriotically and ardently attached to the institutions of the land of his adoption. He received his education at Bowdoin College, Massachusetts, where he and his brother appear to have had the poet Longfellow for a time as. their fellow-student. After his return from college, he engaged in commercial pursuits, to which it was his purpose to devote his life. In 1834, before he had completed his nineteenth year, by the mercy of God he got such a view of the vanity of earthly things, especially of the frivolities and gaities of what, in a worldly sense, is called a life of pleasure, as led him to deliberately renounce them all, to accept Christ and His salvation, and to devote himself to the service of God and of His Church. It was one of the special mercies of his life that he had a clearly marked conversion-his mouth was filled with laughter, and his tongue with singing. He appears to have dwelt in a continuous state of ecstasy for days, working with an energy that he had never possessed before.

In 1837 he was received on trial for the office and work of the ministry, to which he probably felt himself moved by the Holy Ghost from the time of his conversion. As to his call to this work, he had no more doubt than he had of his conversion. And the success which crowned his labours from the beginning of his ministry fully justified this confidence. Three years of his probation were spent on the Miramichi Circuit, where he performed heroic service for the Master, and had the happiness of seeing much fruit of his labours. Being of an ardent temperament, an adventurous disposition, and an indomitable will, he gloried in facing and overcoming difficulties in the presence of which men cast in a less heroic mould would have quailed. And on this particular mission circuit he found ample field for the display of these qualities. What he did and dared in these eventful years of laborious and chivalrous endeavour in the service of Christ and His Church, if the story could be accurately told, would form one of the most thrilling chapters in the missionary biography

Six years subsequently spent in the city of St. John, with an intervening year at Sackville Academy, completed his term of service in connection with what has since been called the Eastern British American Conference. In 1847, on the formation of the union of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada. with the Wesleyan Conference in Great Britain, in company with the Rev. Enoch Wood-the now venerable Dr. Wood-he came to Upper Canada, and connected himself with the Methodism of this part of what is now the Dominion of Canada. It would be useless to attempt, in a brief notice of this kind, to trace in detail the multifarious activities of his busy life from that time to the To enumerate the circuits and stations to which he was time of his decease. from time to time appointed, the offices to which he was elected by the suffrages of his brethren, and the various important interests which he had committed to his care and management, would give a very inadequate notion of the part which he has taken during all these eventful years. No man, perhaps, who has been in the ministry of our Church during all this time, took a fuller share of the labour and responsibility connected with the transaction of the business of the Church, and the settlement of the various questions which have arisen from time to time in which its interests have been involved. Everything in which the Church was interested, interested him.

With the true instincts of a Methodist and a follower of John Wesley, he appears to have, from the beginning of his ministry, taken a lively interest in the question of education. He held that the Church is responsible for the intellectual as well as the moral and religious culture of the people who come under its influence. He believed that the only safety of Methodism, or any

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other branch of the Church of God, or of the people providentially committed to its charge, lay in re-uniting

"The pair so long disjoined, Knowledge and vital piety ;"

and therefore that, at any cost or sacrifice, we ought to provide for the education of our own youth, both male and female, under our own supervision and direction. And though he had solemnly consecrated his talents and life to the evangelistic and pastoral work of the Church, and probably delighted more in preaching the Gospel to sinners and ministering to the edification of believers than in any other employment, he did not deem it at all inconsistent with his character and calling as a minister of Christ, to devote himself specifically, during many of the best years of his ministeral life, to the work of higher education. He took a profound and unselfish interest in Victoria University, and in its darkest days he did what he could to help it. Four years of selfsacrificing labour was devoted to it by him at a time when he might have been filling some of the most important stations in the country. He was really the father of the Wesleyan Ladies' College, Hamilton; and to it he gave fifteen years of his life. The disease which terminated his earthly existence was probably brought on by over-exertion in the interest of the Educational Fund of the Church, and the last speech he ever attempted to make in a Conferencethat which was delivered in the Toronto Conference last June, when the shadow of the sepulchre was upon him-was a plea for the worn-out preachers of the Church, and for its educational interests.

From the position of Superintendent of a Circuit he arose, through all the intervening grades of office, to that of General Superintendent. He repeatedly filled the office of Chairman of the District within the bounds of which his field of labour lay. In 1873 and 1874 he was President of the Conference. In 1882 he was elected President of the General Conference and appointed to travel at large through the entire Church. He presided at the adjourned General Conference in Belleville prior to the consummation of the union in 1883. The United General Conference elected him to the office of senior General Superintendent. And having reached this point it appears that his career was ended. There was nothing higher for him but heaven ; and the Master called His honoured and faithful servant home.

He was descended, both on his father's and his mother's side, from the New England Puritans, and he appears to have inherited in an eminent degree the very best qualities of that remarkable race. If they were ever as gloomy and ascetic as some people would have us believe they were, surely these unamiable qualities never descended to the subject of this sketch. There was neither call nor acid in his nature. Conscience, however, was with him an imperial power which reigned by Divine right, and from whose decisions there was absolutely no ppeal. He might err in judgment, he no doubt often did, but he was always e to his convictions of what was right. He was a conscientious, God-fearing, pious man. There is good reason to believe that the prevailing habit of his soul was one of entire consecration and perfect trust in the Lord Jesus Christ. He was eminently a man of faith. He looked upon nothing as being too great or too difficult to be done or dared if it lay in the line of duty. Lofty courage was no doubt a natural endowment with him. His mother was a Putnam, cousin to the distinguished General by that name ; and there can be little doubt that if Samuel D. Rice had devoted himself to the profession of arms, he would have achieved equal, if not greater distinction than his mother's illustrious kinsman. His courage and concentrated energy in moments of emergency, his dash and daring, would have made him a brilliant military leader. But all these qualities in his case were baptized at the font of Christianity, and refined and purified by the fire of Divine love. He had his frailties, perhaps his faults, but the prevailing impression which we get from the review of his whole life is, that he was a great and good man. And many of those who differed from him most in respect to particular questions in the past, cherish for him the profoundest respect, and are among the most sincere mourners on account of his death.

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THE REV. EDWIN CLEMENT.

Edwin Clement was born in Plymouth, Devonshire, England, in 1819; he was converted in 1838. He entered the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church, in the United States, in connection with the Genesee Conference, in 1845. He came to this country and entered the ministry of the Wesleyan Methodist He came to this country and entered the ministry of the Wesleyan Methodist into full connexion and ordained in 1850; and having given full proof of his ministry, in the conversion of sinners, the edification of believers, and in various other ways promoting the interests of the Church, he finished his course with joy, and entered into rest, in Parkdale, on the 5th of April, 1885, being at the time of his decease in the sixty-sixth year of his age, and the fortieth year of his ministry.

Of Brother Clement's family and history, the information which has reached us is scanty. His parents, however, appear to have been devoted members of the Methodist Church, who carefully brought up their children in the "nurture and admonition of the Lord."

Before his conversion he was actively engaged in Sabbath-school work. Indeed, this was the immediate cause of this change. It was his perception of the inconsistency of his attempting to save others, when he himself was not saved, which led him to seek for that saving grace which was so beautifully exemplified in the whole of his after life.

He was emphatically a good man, characterized by a devout spirit and uncommon purity of life. He was not only amiable and courteous, but a man of great fidelity in the discharge of duty. Though it was not in his nature to unnessarily give offence to even the humblest of his brethren, he never flinched from reproving the faults and sins of those committed to his charge, when duty required it. This trait in his character was all the more remarkable on account of the sweetness of his temper and disposition, and his singular freedom from anything like evil-speaking. He never dwelt upon the faults of absent persons, nor ever alluded to them when it was not absolutely necessary.

As a preacher, Brother Clement was far above mediocrity. His sermons, though seldom written, were always carefully prepared. Though, perhaps, not remarkable as a student, he was well read in theology, especially the theology of his own denomination, and in other departments of Christian literature most essential to the pastor and preacher. The effect of this reading and study was apparent in his pulpit ministrations and platform addresses. There was an originality in his way of putting things, which often gave to his discourses an indescribable charm. There was not one of them which had not something so striking in it as to not only fix attention, but fasten the truth in the memory. In leading the devotions of the congregation he especially excelled. His gift in prayer was remarkable. But in nothing, probably, did he attain to such great excellence as in the discharge of pastoral duty. The minutest detail was not overlooked, and so much of his heat and the spirit of his Master were put into this part of his work, that it told mightily on the religious life of the people and the prosperity of the Church.

Brother Clement was a man of strict and uncompromising integrity, morally incapable of an unjust or dishonourable act. These qualities specially fitted him for the administration of discipline, and inspired confidence in his management of the delicate and difficult department of official duty, both as the Superintendent of a Circuit and Chairman of a District, which latter position he held for a good many years. Those who have been associated with him as his colleagues, and those who have been brought frequently into contact with him on the Districts of which he from time to time had charge, are the men by whom he was held in the highest estimation while he was living, and who entertain the most affectionate remembrance of him now he is dead.

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The circumstances connected with the decease of such a man as was our beloved and lamented brother, are, so far as he is personally concerned, of very little consequence. The summons, come when it will, finds him ready. The suddenness of his removal is, however, solemnly admonitory to us who survive him. It gives solemn emphasis to the sentiment of the Redeemer, "I must work the work of Him who sent Me while it is day, for the night cometh when no man can work." On Thursday what had appeared to be but a slight indisposition assumed a sufficiently serious aspect to suggest the propriety of calling in a physician. But even on Friday the patient fully expected to take at least one service on the Sabbath. Indeed it may be doubted whether up to the last he was able to realize that there was any immediate danger of a fatal termination of his illness. But on Saturday evening, at 10 o'clock, he passed peacefully away, and was not, because God had taken him. "Blessed are the dead that die in the Lord, from henceforth : Yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labours, and their works do follow them."

At the Examination in April, six certificates were granted in Preliminary Course, all second class; two in the first year—one a first and one a second class; two of this year are yet to be reported on. In the second year ten certificates were granted—two first class and eight second class. In the third year nine were granted—three first class and six second. In the fourth year six were granted—one of which is a first class.

It was *Resolved*,—That such provision be made for examination that the candidates be seated separately, not less than five feet apart; and that any conversation between candidates, or the use of notes, shall vitiate the examination.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS.

Your Committee on Statistics desire to respectfully submit the following report.

Pleasure and gratitude are expressed at the large increase of the membership, to the extent of 3,509 members; 31,043 members are now enrolled in the societies of the Toronto Conference.

In regard to the Connexional Funds, it is our glad privilege to state that in every instance, save one, we can report an advance which in some cases is highly creditable. The Educational Collections amount to \$2,316.73, being an increase of \$368 on last year's contributions.

We highly endorse the system inaugurated of completing on each District, and previous to Conference, the statistics relating thereto.

We apprise the Conference that only three District Secretaries presented finished returns, while all the rest figure as delinquents.

We respectfully request the Conference to insist on greater accuracy in the membership returns, and in the faithful completion of the work expected at the hands of the officers chosen.

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REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

It is with feelings of thankfulness to the Giver of all grace that we report the great prosperity with which we have been favoured during the year that has just come to a close. We rejoice in stating that our most sanguine hopes have been realized. Extensive revivals have taken place, the Church has been awakened to more vigorous life, and encouraging progress has been made in every department of her work. The increase in membership is unprecedented; the returns, though incomplete, show our Sabbath-schools

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that ared statnsive more every pprehools to be in a prosperous condition, and more fully equipped than ever before; and, notwithstanding the stringency of the times, we are glad to find that the several funds of the Church have been liberally sustained.

We deem it, therefore, fitting for us to note the causes that, with the Divine blessing, have chiefly contributed to bring about these gratifying results,—

Methodist Union, we believe, has secured for us much of this success. It has won for us in our country the increasing respect of all classes and creeds, it has put an end to much prejudice and strife, and it has consolidated the forces of our common Methodism, and inspired her with greater devotion to God and His cause.

Organizations of people and pastors for evangelistic work have been a marked feature in religious movements on many circuits, and marvellous displays of saving grace have, in many cases, attended their labours.

Meetings for the promotion of holiness have been more frequently held, and more numerously attended than usual, and have resulted in bringing the Church to realize more fully than ever that her mission is to spread scriptural holiness throughout the land.

We must not, however, lose sight of the supreme importance of pastoral visitation, the faithful ministry of the word, the class and prayer-meeting, the family altar and the closet, together with consistency in the life, in securing to us substantial religious prosperity.

For we are confident that it is to the regular and ordinary means of grace that, with God's blessing, we are chiefly to look for growth in grace, for help in every-day Christian living, and for that culture and for those qualifications, too, that will endow us for the work of saving souls.

All this affords us much ground for hopefulness. If God has so signally blessed our labours during a time of transition and reorganization, will He not more fully crown them with success now that the Church has become more settled and united ?

All this adds to our responsibility. The young converts, who have in such large numbers united with us, demand our most prayerful consideration and our most thoughtful care, while, at the same time, it becomes us with increased ardour to press forward in the work that has been so gloriously begun, that there may be a still larger ingathering into our beloved Zion.

That this may be the case, we urge the continued use of those means, and the employment of those agencies, that have been most effective in the past, following along the line especially of those that accord most with the genius and usage of Methodism.

With respect to the two resolutions that have been referred to us, your Committee desire to state that while they would not recommend the employment of a Conference evangelist at present, yet they would give their most hearty concurrence to the securing of the services of suitable evangelists, male or female, provided they come properly accredited as members of the Church, and are willing to labour under the direction of the Superintendent of the District and the Superintendent of the Circuit on which they may be employed.

In looking over the returns from Circuits, we are painfully struck with the inadequate support that many of our brethren are receiving from their fields of labour, and we respectfully urge that steps be taken to augment their salaries by the establishment of a special fund, and by increased contributions to the Missionary Society.

We think, too, that in view of the embarrassed condition of many of our churches, greater care should be exercised in the building of such edifices; and we would recommend that the General Conference be memorialized to so legislate in the matter that the provisions of the Discipline, as contained in paragraph 289, page 139, may be more generally observed.

In conclusion, grateful for the heritage that God has given us, let us enter upon our work in the spirit of a fuller consecration and a more abiding trust in the presence and aid of the Holy Spirit; let us labour more earnestly for the salvation of souls; and the promises of God shall be fulfilled in us, and when our toils are over, it shall be ours to secure the approving words of our Lord, "Well done."

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

We desire to express our gratitude to Almighty God for the great measure of success that has attended the prosecution of temperance work during the past year; and the rapid growth of prohibition sentiment, as manifested by the numerous and signal victories in Scott Act contests.

At this crisis in the history of the temperance movement in Canada, it is highly important that our ministers and laymen should loyally and heartily unite in giving effect to Methodist doctrines upon this great question, as defined in our Discipline and the teachings of John Wesley.

We recommend that our ministers do not nominate for any official position in connection with our church-work, any member who does not, by total abstinence from intoxicating drinks, conform to the requirements of our Church.

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METHODIST CONFERENCE.

We strongly re-affirm the fact that wine and beer constitute no exception to the pernicious catalogue of intoxicating drinks. Every attempt to permit these insidious beverages to do their deadly work should receive the strenuous opposition of our people. We also feel it our duty to offer a note of warning against the use of home-made fermented wines, as they create a desire for stronger drink.

And we desire to warn our people against an association recently formed, calling itself the Liberal Temperance Union. While professing to condemn the use and advocate the prohibition of ardent spirits, it uses its platform to advocate the benefits of beer and wine as a beverage, the obvious effect being to divide the vote of temperance and social reformers in Scott Act contests, and thereby secure the defeat of that measure.

We urge that all fermented wines be banished from use in the ordinance of the Lord's Supper; and inasmuch as the pure juice of the grape can be so easily obtained, no apology exists for their further continuance.

It is strongly recommended that steps be taken by our ministers and Sunday-school officials to have our Sabbath-school scholars become pledged total abstainers, as provided by the Discipline.

We rejoice in believing that the use of intoxicating drinks at social gatherings in connection with the offering of "toasts" is steadily declining, and we trust they will yet be banished from every public or private gathering; and inasmuch as the custom of toasting is associated in most minds with the use of strong drink, we think it would be well if that unnecessary and not very dignified part of the ceremonies were omitted altogether.

Our ministers are requested to preach a sermon on Temperance once each year at least.

We cannot adequately condemn the action of an irresponsible Senate in mutilating an Act which is the legislative expression of temperance sentiment, by amendments which provide for the sale of wine and beer in Scott Act counties, thus rendering futile the self-sacrificing efforts of Christian and philanthropic people during past years in the interests of sobriety and morality. We indulge the hope that our representatives in the House of Commons will heed the unmistakable verdict of the people in this matter, and avert the calamity which the ratification of these amendments would entail. We ask all who love the cause of temperance and Christianity to manifest at the first opportunity their emphatic condemnation, at the polls, of any representative who contributes to this retrograde movement.

We suggest to all our ministers the propriety of speedily securing the franchise, so that their moral effect may be felt through the ballot box.

We extend cordial greetings to the Dominion Alliance, Woman's Christian Temperance Union, and all other societies having for their

object the promotion of temperance sentiment or prohibitory legislation; and we beg to assure them of our earnest prayers and hearty co-operation, to the end that abundant success may crown our kindred efforts.

That the editors of the *Christian Guardian* and of *Pleasant Hours* be requested to insert the foregoing report in these papers at as early a date as possible.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONFERENCE RELATIONS.

The Committee on Conference Relations beg leave to report that, after carefully considering the cases which have been referred to them, they have agreed to make the following recommendations, viz. :--

1. In the case of the Rev. W. S. Hughan, that his name be inserted in the Minutes as having entered the work in 1858, instead of 1860, as it stands in the Minutes of last year.

2. In the case of the Rev. Jeremiah Egan, that his name be entered in the Minutes as having entered the itinerant work in 1863; but inasmuch as he did not sustain the relation of an efficient minister during two years of that time, he be credited with but twenty years of effective service.

3. In the case of the Rev. Robert Cade, that his name be entered in the Minutes as having entered the itinerant work in 1852; but that inasmuch /as he has lost two years since that time, he be credited with thirty-one years of effective work.

4. In the case of the Rev. Henry Harper, that his name be entered in the Minutes as having entéred the itinerant work in 1876, instead of 1877, as it appears, by error, in the printed Minutes of last year.

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REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL SUPPORT AND EQUALIZATION OF MINISTERS' SALARIES.

Your Committee to whom was entrusted this important subject, beg leave to report as follows :---

1. A brief examination of the District returns reveals the fact that for salary, board, and fuel, a considerable number of ministers do not receive \$600 per year; several others do not receive \$500; ten do not receive \$400; while the receipts of one amount to the meagre sum of \$250. The Conference does not need to be told that all such ministers must necessarily be in straitened circumstances, which are not favourable to the proper discharge of all ministerial duties.

2. Your Committee are of the opinion that a Sustentation Fund should be formed at as early a period as possible; but, as this duty belongs to the General Conference, they think that the subject should be strongly recommended to the attention of that body at its next session.

Your Committee would further recommend that a small committee should be appointed to meet during the year, at their own expense, to mature some plan to lay before the next Conference, preparatory to the General Conference, for increasing the salaries of ministers to the minimum sum of \$750—such committee to consist of the President and Secretary of Conference, the Revs. H. Johnston and E. Barrass, with Messrs. D. McLean, R. Brown, and W. Kennedy.

The Conference added the following paragraph :---

"That in view of the great benefits which have accrued to the poorly-paid brethren, or where the salaries have been very limited, as the result of Union or other causes, from the Special Relief Fund, which was recommended by the General Conference Special Committee, we recommend that the Special Committee be requested to continue the said Fund."

Your Committee would recommend that a circular be sent to the Superintendents of Circuits and Missions, urging more liberal contributions to be made towards the support of their ministers; and also that a list of subscribers shall be published by each Circuit or Mission and presented to each subscriber.

Your Committee recommend the appointment of the Rev. Hugh Johnston, M.A., B.D., and D. McLean, Esq., to the office of Treasurers; and the Rev. E. Barrass, M.A., Secretary, who, with five other members, shall be a Committee to consider each case of deficiency, and make such appropriations as they may deem proper.

REPORT OF THE SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee desire first, and above all, to record our devout thanksgiving to Almighty God that our Canadian Sabbath is among the best, if not the best, observed in the world, and we feel assured that if we do not prove recreant to our privileges, but hallow the Sabbath and call it a delight, the Lord our God will still bless us as a nation.

We desire also to express our admiration of the noble stand that the evangelical Churches of Toronto have always taken on this great question, and to assure them that they may always count on the hearty co-operation of the Methodist Church in maintaining the sanctity of the Christian Sabbath. We have learned with special gratitude of their success in preventing the publishing of Sunday newspapers, and, we trust, not fruitless efforts to secure better legislation on this question.

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But though we speak thus, we would not hide from ourselves the fact that there is yet much Sabbath desecration in our country. There are many so-called Christians who do not hesitate to make it a day of visiting and worldly pleasure-seeking, of talking business and reading the secular paper instead of the Bible. These things we deprecate, and would warn four people against them. We are also painfully aware of the money-making greed which leads some of our railways and steamboat companies, unnecessarily, to disturb the sacred quiet of the Lord's Day, and deprive their employees of their God-given right of one day in seven for rest and worship.

There is another cause which is perhaps more potent than any of these in neutralizing what we believe to be the Scriptural observance of the Lord's Day. We refer to Romanism. Its influence on our laws affecting the Sabbath is felt in every part of our Dominion, not excepting Ontario.

Recognizing the momentous importance of this question, your Committee venture to suggest that the Conference appoint a Standing Committee, consisting of an equal number of ministers and laymen, resident in Toronto, to act conjointly with the Committees of other evangelical Churches in relation to this whole question, should they see fit to appoint them.

We would further recommend that the first Sabbath in September be set apart for special sermons on Sabbath observance.

REPORT OF THE SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

In reviewing the Sabbath-school returns of the year, and presenting the first Annual Report of the Sabbath-schools of the Toronto Conference, your Committee are glad to report several most encouraging features, notably, that there are 400 Sabbathschools within the bounds of this Conference, taught by upwards of 4,000 teachers, the greater part of whom are members of the Church, so that we may safely assume that some of the best talent of our Church is consecrated regularly to aid this most important branch of our work. There are 34,000 scholars in our schools, nearly 5,000 of whom are members of the Church, 2,200 being converted to God during this year. It is also a matter for congratulation that 25,000 copies of our admirable Sabbath-school papers and periodicals have been taken by the schools during the year, out of a total circulation of 30,000 copies.

On the other hand, we feel that upwards of 5,000 is too large a number of outside papers to be circulated among our scholars, and

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hope that all will heartily unite in placing our own literature in our schools, as pre-eminently the most suited and safe.

We are also delighted to find that the sum of \$3,635 has been raised by the schools on behalf of missions, but when we look at the next column and see that upwards of \$18,400 were raised by the same schools for local purposes, we feel sorry that the young people have not been taught a wider charity, looking to the regions beyond. We recommend to the Sunday-school Superintendents and officers the adoption of such systems of collection and contribution by our schools as will swell the receipts by the Missionary Society from these sources. The receipts to the Sunday-school Aid Fund are increased, but no one can feel that the sum of \$366.78 adequately expresses either the desire or ability of our schools to contribute to the help of the poor and needy in sparsely settled or new and far-off regions. It may stimulate some to remember that about 4,000 books and 1,200 parcels of papers have been gratuitously sent abroad during the year, some of which were scattered among our North-West Indians, and may have contributed not a little to cheer and comfort and guide them during the unrest of this anxious year. Others of these books and papers have found their way to the shores of Newfoundland, Labrador, and into the homes and huts of a hardy, toiling, but poor people, who warmly appreciate the thoughtful help of their more highly favoured fellow-scholars We hope that these considerations will immensely in these parts. stimulate this fund. Your Committee deeply regret that there are within the bounds of this Conference 180 preaching places or churches where no schools are held, or at least reported, and respectfully urge on all concerned to seek, if possible, to establish Sabbathschools at every appointment. We also respectfully urge our friends to consider whether 103 schools are not too many to be closed every winter. With the fact before us that the Methodists now supply one half of all the Sabbath-school scholars in the Protestant schools of this Dominion, shall we not consecrate ourselves anew to this most promising and fruitful field, and by God's help carry forward this work to the grandest possible results, with the greatest possible zeal for the holiest and divinest ends.

Your Committee recommend the appointment of the Rev. E. Barrass, M.A., as Secretary-Treasurer.

Your Committee also recommend that the next General Conference shall so amend the Discipline as to admit one layman from each District to be member of the Conference Sunday-school Committee.

REPORT OF THE AGNES STREET CHURCH TRUST, TORONTO.

Whereas there is a debt upon the Agnes Street Church of \$13,000, and upon the parsonage of \$2400, the annual interest upon which, including insurance, is \$1076, which sum added to the ordinary expenses, including salary, \$1414, makes a total of \$2490, And whereas of this amount the congregation could not under-

take to raise more than \$1800, there arose a deficiency of \$690,

And whereas the importance of maintaining a church in that part of the city in which the Agnes Street Church is located, is such as to be worthy of careful consideration, therefore,

Resolved,—First, That a Committee consisting of Revs. W. Briggs, President, Dr. Sutherland, Dr. Stone, Dr. Potts, E. A. Stafford, S. J. Shorey, Hugh Johnston, B.D., M. Benson, and Messrs. Daniel McLean, Wm. Gooderham, J. M. Treble, R. I. Walker, Wm. Blight, J. B. Boustead, and R. H. McBride be appointed to act in conjunction with the Trust and Quarterly Boards, for the purpose of devising means to meet the deficiency in current expenses, and to take what measures may to them seem most likely to promote the best interests of the church.

Second, That if it should appear to be desirable to do so, the said Committee shall have authority to canvass the city for funds to apply upon the reduction of the principal of the debt upon the church and parsonage.

REPORT OF THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

A memorial was laid before the Committee from Metcalf Street Church, Oshawa, asking that the method of raising moneys for the Superannuation Fund be changed or the Fund abolished. Your Committee recommend no change.

In reference to the memorial from Hagerman's Church, Unionville Circuit, your Committee recommend that the matter be referred to the Superintendent and official members of the Unionville Circuit, with the urgent request that an earnest effort be made to comply with the desire of the Trustees of Hagerman's church to as great an extent as possible.

Your Committee having considered the memorial touching an appointment on the Orangeville Circuit, do not regard the case as one of appeal. The matter having been already settled according to the "Basis of Union," therefore we cannot recommend any action by the Conference.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee would recommend that the students shall have a grant of the full amount of college fees, together with a loan of \$120.00 each, if necessary, to be repaid to the Fund within ten years without interest.

It affords your Committee very great pleasure to be able to report an increase in the funds of the Society for the past year; and yet we cannot but exceedingly regret that we have fallen so far short of the \$3,000, the small amount this Conference proposed to raise last year.

This failure, we believe, is largely due to the lack of an earnest and uniform effort to support the funds of these institutions, and we would most strongly urge that the Conference requirement, that not only collections, but also subscriptions, shall be taken up at all our appointments, be faithfully carried out.

Your Committee would earnestly call the attention of our people to the importance of our educational work. Our aim should be, next to a converted and consecrated, to have an educated ministry. Our ministry cannot be in the best sense leaders of the people, without thorough intellectual culture as well as a high religious character. Methodism, which was cradled in a university, should remember its origin, and perpetuate the influence of consecrated learning. A larger liberality on the part of our people is essential to the growing demands of

our educational work. We cannot overestimate the importance of giving to a larger number of our candidates for the ministry the advantages of a liberal culture. The Educational Society has in view the accomplishment of this object, and therefore has special claims on the liberality of our people.

Your Committee also indulge and venture to express the hope that the very liberal gifts recently made to Victoria University and the Wesleyan Theological College by several of our wealthy laymen, may be but the first-fruits of a much larger harvest than has ever yet been reaped by this Society on behalf of the educational work of the Church.

LADIES' COLLEGES.

A delegation from the Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby, consisting of the Revs. Dr. Dewart, W. H. Laird, C. Shaw, and E. Barrass, with J. B. Taylor, Esq., was introduced to the Conference.

Mr. Taylor read the report of the Directors of the College for the current year.

The report indicated the work accomplished by this institution .

during the past year, and the increased appliances for imparting instruction in the future.

The average number of boarders during the past year was 79; day pupils, 23. The number of pupils enrolled during the year was 105 day pupils, 28.

The Directors requested the Conference to confirm the re-appointment of Rev. J. J. Hare, M.A., as Governor for the ensuing year.

The request was granted.

The report of the Official Visitors was also presented and adopted. It spoke in high terms of the scope and efficiency of the instruction imparted; of the care given to the physical health and spiritual interests of the pupils; and heartily commended this institution of learning to the confidence and support of our ministers and people.

The Revs. John F. German, M.A., N. R. Willoughby, M.A., and R. N. Burns, B.A., were appointed Official Visitors for the ensuing year.

LADIES' COLLEGE, HAMILTON.

Rev. A. Burns, LL.D., Principal of Ladies' College, Hamilton, was introduced to the Conference, and spoke at length in reference to the equipment and work and prosperity of the above institution of learning.

Resolved,—That having listened to the statement of the Rev. Dr. Burns, the accomplished Principal of the Ladies' College, Hamilton, this Conference expresses its great satisfaction at the success attending this institution of learning, and rejoices at its continued and growing prosperity, and accords its hearty sympathy to this, the oldest and one of the most thoroughly equipped institutions within the whole circle of Canadian Colleges for the higher education of the daughters of our land.

ALMA COLLEGE, ST THOMAS.

The Rev. B. F. Austin, M.A., presented the report of the Board of Management of Alma College.

The report sets forth at length the dimensions of the spacious College buildings, together with an account of the various apparatus employed in carrying on the work of instruction; a statement of receipts and expenditure, assets and liabilities, attendance of students, courses of studies, the faculty, lecturers, etc.

Resolved,—That having heard the satisfactory reports presented by the Book Steward and Editors of our Connexional publications, this Conference desires to express its high appreciation of the management of these important interests of the Church, and it rejoices in the almost unparalleled success of the Book and Printing Establishments, and begs to assure these official brethren of our confidence in their administration, and also of our continued and hearty support.

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SPECIAL RESOLUTIONS.

CONDEMNATION OF THE DOMINION SENATE.

On motion of Dr. Dewart, seconded by W. Kennedy, Esq., and Resolved,-That this Conference desires to take the earliest opportunity of expressing its profound regrets and dissatisfaction at the reprehensible action of the Senate of Canada in amending the Temperance Act in a way that would destroy its virtue as a prohibitory measure, and render the successful efforts for its adoption, in a large number of places, fruitless and unavailing. And, while we fully appreciate the fidelity of those members of the Senate who have opposed these unjust amendments, we hereby declare our strong, earnest conviction that should the House of Commons so far far forget its duty to the country as to sanction this unpatriotic and treacherous mutilation of the Scott Act, it would by doing so break faith with the people, greatly injure the cause of public order and morality, and be unworthy of the confidence of all who have at heart the social and moral progress of our country.

SYMPATHY WITH THE VOLUNTEERS.

Moved by W. Kennedy, Esq., seconded by the Rev. Dr. Potts' and

Resolved,-That this Conference records its expressions of deep sorrow at the recent unfortunate insurrection in the North-West Territories, and returns thanks to Almighty God for the prospect of a near settlement of the troubles in that district. This Conference rejoices at the success which has attended the Queen's arms in the suppression of the uprising, and records its admiration for the gallant conduct of our citizen soldiers, who so loyally went forth at the country's call to maintain the supremacy of law and authority. Their uncomplaining devotion to duty under privation, their conformity to strict military discipline, and their unflinching valour in the presence of the enemy, have not been surpassed by the troops of any nation, and call forth the warmest expressions of approval. We tender to the families who have been bereft of loved ones in this struggle, and to the wounded now in the hospitals, our warmest expressions of sympathy, and we pray that specially the influence of the gospel may permeate the hearts of the people in that remote district, so that peace and happiness, religion and union may everywhere prevail.

This resolution was carried most enthusiastically by a rising vote of the Conference, after which a verse of the National Anthem was sung.

FRATERNAL RESOLUTION.

Dr. Withrow moved and Dr. Dewart seconded the following resolution, which was most cordially adopted :

Whereas the Anglican Synod of Toronto Diocese is now in session in this city, and this Conference cherishes delightful recollections of the kindly interchange of fraternal greetings between the Synod and the Conference last year,

Resolved,—That this Conference appoint a delegation to wait upon the Synod during its sessions, and to convey the expression of our joy at the growing feelings of sympathy and brotherly love between the different branches of the Church of Christ, and of our glad co-operation with the Church of England in the efforts now being put forth to restrain the evils of intemperance in this land, and in our common endeavours to promote the reading of the Holy Scriptures in our Public Schools, and to advance by every means in our power the interests of the Redeemer's kingdom.

The following composed the deputation to the Synod: Revs. Drs. Sutherland, Potts, Dewart, and Withrow, with Justice Rose and W. Kennedy, Esq.

SYMPATHY WITH THE FAMILY OF MR. J. MANNING.

On motion of the Rev. N. R. Willoughby, M.A., seconded by the Rev. Geo. Brown, and

Resolved,—That this Conference has heard with regret of the decease of Brother James Manning, of Bond Head, who was for many years an active member of the Methodist Church. We recognize with satisfaction his earnest labours for so many years as a local preacher, and his wise counsels in our General Conference and other departments of our Church. We desire to express our sympathy with the bereaved wife and family, among whom are our three fellow-labourers, Bros. Henry M., Thomas, and Charles E. Manning.

SYMPATHY WITH THE REV. E. WOOD, D.D.

On motion of Mr. W. Kennedy, seconded by the Rev. J. G. Laird, and

Resolved,—That this Conference feels deeply the continued absence through physical indisposition of our highly esteemed and venerable brother the Rev. Enoch Wood, D.D., whose wise counsels were always so highly valued by his brethren in their deliberations, and desires to assure him of our continued sympathy and affectionate regard, and pray that the Great Head of the Church

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may bless him with all spiritual blessings and spare his life many years, and that the Conference Letter-writers be respectfully requested to send a copy of this resolution to Dr. Wood.

SYMPATHY WITH JOHN MACDONALD, ESQ.

On motion of Mr. J. T. Moore, seconded by the Rev. M. Fawcett, and

Resolved,—That this Conference cannot allow this annual gathering to pass without profound regret that it has been deprived of the wise counsels of our esteemed brother John Macdonald, Esq., by reason of temporary indisposition. We would have our beloved brother know that in his retirement he is not forgotten by his brethren in the Church wherein he fills so large a. place, and that we devoutly pray that he who has abounded toward us in loving service and liberal support, may speedily enjoy a complete restoration, and that a life so useful and exemplary as his may be spared for many years to come, to wield its manifold and beneficent influences, thus challenging the admiration and emulation of his fellow-men, within as well as without the Church of Christ.

A copy of this resolution to be transmitted to Bro. Macdonald, with the earnest hope that our God will give him the richest consolations of the Holy Spirit in this cessation from his customary and consecrated activities.

UNIVERSITY FEDERATION.

Rev. S. S. Nelles, D.D., LL.D., Chancellor of Victoria University, having addressed the Conference on the subject of University Federation, the Rev. J. W. Annis, B.D., moved the following resolution, which was seconded by Mr. Daniel Maclean:

Resolved,—That this Conference having heard Chancellor Nelles, desires to thank him for his lucid, instructive and eloquent address, and to express its approval of the action of the Board of Regents of Victoria University in regard to the proposed scheme of University Federation; as we believe that if our Methodist students can share so largely the advantages of the State provision for higher education, under arrangements that will preserve Victoria College as an Arts College, and will secure to her the religious oversight of her students and give a satisfactory ground of assurance respecting the character and teaching of the University Professors, it would be promotive of the interests of our Church, and of the higher education of the country, to give our support as a people to a scheme that offers so many important advantages.

Dr. Sutherland moved the following amendment, which was seconded by Mr. J. T. Moore :

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That this Conference has heard with great pleasure the statements of the Rev. Dr. Nelles, Chancellor of Victoria University, concerning the work of that institution, and we rejoice in the evidence afforded that our denominational university has so strong a hold upon the affection, the confidence, and the loyal support of our people.

Touching the matter of University Federation, the many interests involved demand that the subject receive the most careful consideration before any decisive step is taken ; and inasmuch as the scheme now before the public has been repudiated by Queen's University, and has received only a qualified assent from Trinity; inasmuch as we have no definite assurance that the guarantees demanded by the Board of Regents of Victoria University will be granted, as they are strongly opposed by the representatives of several of the Confederating Colleges; and inasmuch as the Convocation of the State University has indicated an unwillingness, under present circumstances, to accept the scheme, and first published, much less the guarantees demanded on behalf of Victoria, we are of opinion that it does not comport with the dignity of our University or our Church to proceed further at present with negotiations; and we recommend that the whole subject be referred to the next General Conference, which alone has authority to accept or reject the proposed scheme of Confederation.

The amendment was carried.

RECOMMENDATIONS FROM THE STATIONING COMMITTEE.

Your Committee recommend that Haldane Hill, Kirtland's, Campbell's, Axe Lake and Stevenson's appointments be formed into a domestic mission to be known as Haldane's Mission.

That Hillside, Winter's, Sinclair's, and Victoria appointments be formed into a domestic mission, to be known as Hillside Mission.

COMMUNICATIONS.

To the President of the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church, with the Ministers and Lay Members in Conference Assembled.

The following resolutions were adopted by the Board of the Superannuation Fund and unanimously recommended to the Annual Conferences for their adoption, and for publication in the Minutes of the Conferences.

Resolved,—1st. That the names and addresses of the Treasurers of the Fund be published in the Minutes of each Annual Conference; and the names and addresses of all superannuated ministers—

Added by the Conference: That in the first clause after the words "superannuated ministers," the following words be substituted, "be published in the Minutes of the Conferences to which they respectively belong, and that the Secretaries of the Conferences furnish the Treasurer with certified lists of all widows and children in their respective Conferences who are claimants upon the Fund."

2nd. That each Annual Conference forward to the Clerical Treasurer through its Secretary, immediately at the close of the Conference, a certified copy of the tables containing the amounts raised for ministerial support and connexional collections on each Circuit and Mission throughout the bounds of their respective Conferences, omitting the Children's Fund, and any special collections that may be ordered by the authority of the Annual Conferences only; as there is often a delay in the publication of the Minutes which interferes with the preparation of the Report of the Committee of Estimates, etc., in time for the Financial District Meetings.

3rd. That all parties sending money to the Treasurer give a detailed statement of the amounts, so that he may know how to give due credit, either to the Circuit or minister entitled to receive such credit.

4th. That any changes made by the Financial District Meetings in the apportionments made to Circuits or Missions be reported to the Treasurer, and that the Secretary of the meeting furnish a complete list of these apportionments to the Clerical Treasurer as finally passed by the District Meeting.

The Treasurer would particularly request that all parties holding monies belonging to the Fund would forward promptly to him any sums that may be in their hands, in accordance with the above resolutions.

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THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

TORONTO CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

TO THE

SOCIETIES WITHIN, ITS BOUNDS.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,---

We gladly avail ourselves of the opportunity afforded us by this our annual gathering, to present to you our cordial greetings and hearty congratulations, and to address to you such counsels and suggestions as the character of the time, and the circumstances in which we are placed as a Church, seem to us to require.

You will be pleased, no doubt, to learn that we have had a most delightful and harmonious Conference. The spirit of brotherly kindness has, in a remarkable degree, pervaded its sessions from the beginning to the close. Though composed of both ministers and laymen, and though all have enjoyed the utmost freedom of speech and liberty of discussion, nothing has occurred to interrupt in the slightest degree the harmony of its proceedings. On a single subject, lying somewhat outside of the regular Conference business, there was, indeed, some diversity of opinion, which found very frank and earnest, though strictly brotherly, expression; but, as a rule, the conclusions reached on the important subjects which have engaged our deliberations, have been reached with practical unanimity. In view of the fact that the elements which have been brought together on this occasion have been drawn from what. until twelve months ago, formed four distinct and separate ecclesiastical organizations, these things call for devout thanksgiving to God, and afford abundant grounds of hope as to the successful working of the new order of things which has been recently inaugurated.

The review of the labours and successes of the year which has just closed, too, has filled our hearts with gladness, and kindled within us feelings of devout thankfulness to "God which always causeth us to triumph in Christ, and maketh manifest the savour of His knowledge by us in every place." It will be matter of rejoic-

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ing and of thanksgiving to you, we doubt not, as it is to us, that this initial year of the united Methodism of the Dominion has been marked by unprecedented showers of blessing. During no former year, in our entire history as a denomination, have our labours in this country been crowned with such a large measure of success. The net increase in our membership, within the bounds of this Conference alone, is 4,615; and the aggregate increase in the whole Church, after making up for the losses from death, removals and all other causes, is understood to be more than twenty thousand

Surely this calls for devout thanksgiving to the God of all "It is the Lord's doing, and it is marvellous in our eyes." grace. "What, hath God wrought !" Coming immediately after the Union, this gratifying numerical increase in our membership is peculiarly significant. It cannot but be regarded as something more than a mere coincidence. Nothing, in fact, could have more clearly indicated the Divine approval of that great and salutary measure of denominational unification. This great ingathering of souls into the Church is all the more remarkable, too, from the fact that, as a rule, it has not been the result of the introduction of any new or extraordinary measure. In a very few instances, it is true, evangelistic agencies from a distance have been employed among us, but these have been exceptions to the general rule. The means which, on the whole, have been most successful, have been those by which Methodism has won its way from the beginning. The Word of God has been faithfully preached. The social means of grace, the prayer-meeting and the class-meeting, have been regularly attended, and, we trust, increased and more conscientious attention has been given to family religion and private devotion. Never, it is believed, were the efforts of pastors more heartily seconded by the co-opera; tive Tabours of the laity. Christian testimony and sacred song, as in the early days of Methodism, have been influential factors in the revivals of the past year. Nor is the increased prominence which has been given to the doctrine of Christian Perfection, or Entire Sanctification, to be overlooked. As it was in the days of Wesley, so it is at present, where this doctrine is distinctly and persistently preached, and where believers enter into the enjoyment of this grace, sinners are awakened and converted, and the work of God in all its branches is promoted.

As a further illustration of the thoroughly healthy and prosperous condition of our societies, we point with pleasure to the fact that all our Connexional Funds have been creditably sustained. Owing to the re-organization of the work, which in many localities has been rendered necessary by the Union, it has not been easy in every case to compare the income of the year just closed with that of preceding years; but in almost every instance in which comparison has been possible the contributions of the Circuits and Stations

towards the benevolent enterprizes of the Church have been increased. It is safe to say that, so far as the territory embraced within the bounds of this Conference is concerned, in no former year has so large an amount of money been contributed by the Methodist people for the sustentation of the various departments of the work of God. And, so far as we are aware, the same spirit of enlarged and enlightened liberality pervades the entire Church.

Brethren, this is at it should be. It would be sad indeed if, when God is blessing us so abundantly, we should refuse to be the instruments of blessing to others. In so doing we would not only wrong those to whom the grace of God has made us debtor, but we would defraud our own souls; for the Divine law is that "he that soweth sparingly, shall reap also sparingly." But ye have not so learned Christ; neither have ye forgotten His words, how he said that "it is more blessed to give than to receive." And this saying has been verified in your/own experience, in that in blessing others you yourselves have been blessed. It is matter of rejoicing to us, as we are sure it will be to you, that we are able to announce that, as the result of your abounding liberality, the claims of the Superannuated Ministers, and of the widows and orphan children of ministers deceased having a claim upon the funds of the Church, have this year been fully met. And though we fear our devoted missionaries, who are doing heroic service for the Church in the high places of the field, will not be placed beyond the reach of considerable hardships, the fact that the income of our Missionary Society, in a year in which all branches of trade in the country are measurably depressed, is likely to reach the munificent sum of v \$180,000, deserves to be mentioned to the honour of our loyal and devoted people, and to the glory of the grace of God, by whom the ability and the disposition to sacrifice so largely in the interest of His cause has been given.

You will be pleased to learn that the publishing interests of the Church have never been in so flourishing a condition as they are at present. Never were we able, at any former period in our history, to do so much towards furnishing our own people, and the country generally, with a pure and healthy Christian literature. The Christian Guardian, which has been enlarged and improved during the year, has at present a larger circulation, by several thousands, than it had at any former period. Under the joint editorship of Drs. Dewart and Stone, it is finding increasing favour with our people, and becoming a more and more influential instrument The Sunday-school publications, under the judicious of good. management of Dr. Withrow, have attained to an enormous and constantly increasing circulation. They ought to be, and we trust they will soon be, read by the juvenile members of every Methodist family in the land. They'are marvels of cheapness, and they are

not inferior to any publication of the same class published either on this continent or elsewhere. The Canadian Methodist Magazine never presented stronger claims to the patronage of the Methodist people of this country. We are persuaded that it only requires to be better known, to secure for it a much wider circulation. The publication and sale of books have been carried on by our Publishing House during the year on a larger scale than ever before. In spite of the hard times, of which we hear so much complaint, the business of the establishment has constantly increased. The result has been that, after making a very handsome appropriation to the Superannuated Ministers' Fund, several thousand dollars have been added to the working capital of the concern. Though the primary object of this branch of our Church work is not to make money, it is satisfactory to know that, while it is accomplishing its purpose as an important factor in the moral and religious education of the community, by judicious management it is being made a financial The increase of capital, the enlargement and improvesuccess. ment of the building, with the introduction of new presses and other appliances for carrying on the work of publication, is greatly increasing its efficiency, and making the establishment a more influential power for good. We bespeak for it the patronage and prayers of all our people, upon whom, after all, it is dependent for its success.

The reports which have reached us from our educational institutions have been of a highly interesting and encouraging character. Victoria University, which has rendered such important service to the Church in the past, appears to have never done its work more effectively than it is doing it at present. The same observation applies to our Theological Colleges at Cobourg and at Montreal. All that is required to make these institutions even more efficient and influential than they are, is a more ample endowment, or else an improved condition of the Educational Fund. We doubt not, however, that one or both of these will be forthcoming at no very distant The resources of our people are ample, and, we believe, they day. only require to have their attention properly directed to the subject to induce them to contribute all the money that is necessary to make the educational establishment of the Church all that could be desired. * We affectionately and earnestly commend this matter to the enlightened, generous and prayerful consideration of our people, believing that there is scarcely anything, so far as merely human appliances are concerned, upon which the future of our denomina-, tion in this country, and the influence which it is to exert upon coming generations, depends, to so great an extent, as upon the character for purity and efficiency of its educational institutions.

Time would fail us to speak particularly of the Sabbath-school and other interesting and important departments of our Church

work. Already this address has exceeded the limits designed for it. We would, however, affectionately remind you that what is to be done by any of us in the furtherance of any of these objects must be done quickly. The fathers, where are they ? and the prophets, do they live for ever? The breaches which have been made in our ranks during the past year have given special emphasis to the sentiment of our Divine Exemplar, "I must work the work of Him that sent me while it is day, for the night cometh when no man can work." The spirits of our venerable and beloved General Superintendent, Dr. Rice, and that of the genial, the indefatigable, and saintly Dr. Carroll-not to speak of other beloved brethren who have passed within the veil during the past yearappear to be speaking to us from the skies, saying "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might." May the mantle of these illustrious men fall upon us who are left to carry on the work in which they toiled so long, and with such self-sacrificing assiduity and success. May a double portion of the spirit which rested upon them be given to us to fit us for meeting the solemn and weighty responsibilities which are imposed upon us by the character of the times in which we live, and the circumstances in which we are placed as a part of the Church of the living God! Animated by the spirit of a Rice and Carroll, what might not the 1,700 ministers and the 140,000 members of the Methodist Church achieve in this Dominion during the year upon which all are just entering? With the blessing of God upon our labours, the addition of forty thousand, or even twice that number, to our membership, ought not to be regarded as impossible.

We "beseech you, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice holy and acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." Let us, recognizing the greatness of our obligations to the God of our life, our mercies, and our salvation, enter upon this year in the spirit of entire consecration to God; and laying hold by faith upon the promise of the all-conquering Captain of our salvation, "Lo, I am with you alway," give to the world an illustration of what can be accomplished by a thoroughly united and sanctified Church in alliance with God. "Now the God of peace that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenant, make you perfect in every good work to do his will, working in you that which is well-pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ; to whom be glory for ever and ever. Amen."
