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MINUTES

OF THE

TORONTO CONFERENCE

OF

THE METHODIST CHURCH.

The Fifth Session of the Toronto Annual Conference opened in the Metropolitan Church, Toronto, on Thursday, 14th June, 1888, at 9 a.m. The Conference prayer-meeting, lasting from 9 to 10 a.m., was conducted by the President of the Conference, Rev. John Potts, D.D.

The General Superintendent, Rev. John A. WILLIAMS, D.D., then proceeded to organize the Conference. Hymn 753 was sung. The Secretary of the Conference, Rev. Hugh Johnston, read the 115th Psalm and the 4th chapter of Ephesians. Prayers were offered by Revs. J. Gray and T. W. Jolliffe.

The Roll of Ministerial members was called, and the names of the Laymen elected by the District Meetings, when 140 Ministers and 73 Laymen responded to their names.

OUESTION.—What Ministers or Probationers for the Ministry have died this year?

ENOCH WOOD, D.D.

Enoch Wood was born near the market-town of Gainsborough, Lincolnshire, England, January 13th, 1804. He was sent to school in that town and made rapid progress in study. At the early age of sixteen, in connection with Thomas Cooper and several others like-minded, they formed a "Mutual Improvement Society" for reading and discussion, and also established an adult school where, at uncertain times, or whenever they could snatch an hour, they taught "the poor, and utterly uneducated to read." The fact that those young men thus voluntarily engaged, having such objects in view, shows the bent of inclination, which afterwards became more and more apparent, in more cases than one. Cooper developed into a Secularist and Chartist lecturer. He spent nuch time and energy, and suffered intensely, in endeavoring to raise the flown-trodden and relieve the poor. His love of liberty was only equalled by his love of literature. For him, notwithstanding his erratic course, Dr. Wood had a strong attachment, and maintained with him a loving correspondence until near the close of his life, though they never saw each other again after he first left England. Just three years ago, Dr. Wood received from him a goodly volume, entitled "Thoughts at Four-Score," with the following inscription on a fly-leaf: "Rev. Dr. Enoch Wood, with the best love of his oldest friend and former play-fellow (at Gainsborough, in dear old England) the author, Thomas Cooper, Lincoln, May 4, 1885.

Enoch Wood was a local preacher on the Gainsborough Circuit at the same time as Joseph Stinson and several others of precious memory. These all have passed away to their eternal home, most of them having lived far beyond the allotted age of man, and also labored in the Master's vineyard for many years after men of their own generation had retired from labor to rest. Enoch Wood was not destined to remain long in his native land. A terrible calamity befel several Wesleyan missionaries in the West Indies. They took passage in the 'Maria" mail boat in order to attend their District Meeting. It was at the ime regarded as a perilous undertaking; but it was the only way in which they had any prospect of reaching the Island of Antigua, where the meeting was to be held. A gale arose, and the boat was wrecked. All on board were lost xcept Mrs. Jones, wife of one of the missionaries, who was rescued by a fisherman, who found her in a bewildered state, gazing on the spot where she had vitnessed her husband sink into the water a short time before, and desirous

only of following him.

Shortly after this, in 1826, Enoch Wood was sent as a missionary to the West Indies, to take the place of one of those made vacant by that fearul catastrophe. And now commenced that series of bereavements which aused his heart to bleed, and doubtless tended to bring out those manifesta-

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tions of sympathy with which nature had so richly endowed him. Through the whole of his life, even to near its close, he had many deep baptisms of human sorrow. But none without hope! As he said on a certain occasion, referring to those sorrows, while the big tears flowed from his eyes: "But then, I believe in God, and that is enough for any man."

Less than a year after his marriage and going to his first station, on a Sabbath morning, he left the mission house to attend to his duties in the church, a short distance away, and on his return found his young wife had suddenly passed to that "bourne from whence no traveller returns." O, the sadness of passed to that "bourne from whence no traveller returns." O, the sadness of that bereaved heart! Away from friends and native land! Surrounded only by strangers! But the powerful Comforter was there to give the assurance that "earth has no sorrow that heaven cannot heal." She was laid in the grave on

that sunny and flower-clad isle, and her husband, now alone, went on with the work to which God had called him, and to do that work he was being more than

ever pre-eminently fitted.

He remained but two years in the West Indies, and from thence came to New Brunswick, where, chiefly in St. John and Fredericton, for eighteen years, the gave full proof of his ministry. His preaching in those days was very powerful, and his large heart, full both of divine and human sympathy, secured for him a welcome everywhere, and especially among the sick and sorrowful. Here he again entered into the marriage state. To him were born sons and daughters. One daughter only survives. She is the widow of the late honored and beloved Chancellor Nelles. All the other daughters, as they grew up to womanhood, sickened and died. These domestic sorrows, following each other, filled his heart with tenderness and sympathy for all in similar circumstances.

Dr. Wood first visited Toronto in the month of May, 1847, in company with the Rev. Dr. Alder, who came to negotiate a re-union of English and Canadian Methodism. This was happily effected, and Dr. Wood was appointed Superintendent of Missions. Shortly after that he removed to Toronto, where he resided until his death on Tuesday, January 31st, 1888. He at once identified himself with all the interests of Canadian Methodism, and was identified with the Mission Rooms as Superintendent and Secretary for forty years. When unable to leave his own room, for several years, he continued to arrange the religious part for publication in the Missionary Report.

For seven consecutive years he was President of our Conference, and devoted all his energies to the cause he had espoused. During his Presidency about 160 young men were received into the Conference and ordained to the work of the ministry. He filled a large place in the Methodist Church for many years, and greatly rejoiced in its widely spreading influence and power for good.

His preaching was of the expository character, and every sermon was full of pathos and affectionate application. His visits to different parts of the country were hailed with peculiar pleasure both by ministers and people. There is one other thing which cannot be passed without a brief notice. Who that ever heard Dr. Wood pray could forget it? He had a wonderful gift in prayer, and extraordinary power attended at his command. With arms outstretched, eyes suffused with tears, his heart aflame with divine love, and a voice tremulous with emotion, but full of music, heaven seemed to be brought down to earth. Many hearts have been thrilled while he prayed, and those prayers will remain as a benediction with many of us as long as God shall lend us breath.

For about seven years before his death he was afflicted with a disease which obliged him to remain at his own home. He greatly prized the visits of old friends, and loved to talk of the days gone by. He was always cheerful, and those last years of his life furnish a remarkable illustration of the sustaining grace of God, during many, many recurring hours of pain, until the Master said, "it is enough," and took him up where bereavements, pain and sorrows never His paren eventually nineteen. held in th united wi afterward gaged, he of the Inc which he he was al marriage period of Bro. 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THE REV. HENRY WILKINSON.

Our departed brother was born in the State of Vermont, October 13th, 1815. His parents, originally members of the Baptist Church, with their whole family, eventually became Methodists. Bro. Wilkinson came to Canada at the age of nineteen, and taught school in the vicinity of Gananoque. At a prayer-meeting, held in the school-house, he was led to seek and obtain salvation, and immediately united with the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and was soon licensed to exhort. He afterwards removed to Brockville, and taught a private school. While thus engaged, he was induced by the late Dr. Carroll, of sainted memory, to take charge of the Indian School at Hiawatha. From thence he went to Victoria College, which he attended for two years, teaching school at Wicklow during the vacations; he was also a class-leader at Grafton at this time. In 1842 he was united in marriage to Miss Maria Bettes, who shared his joys and sorrows for the long period of forty-six years, and now waits for the hour of reunion in heaven. Bro. Wilkinson was recommended by the District Meeting as a candidate for the ministry, but as the law of the Wesleyan Church rendered difficult the reception of married men, he accepted the offer of an appointment by the Methodist New Connexion Conference, and, after a forty years' service in the itinerancy, he was granted a superannuated relation, and settled in the village of Stayner, where he resided until the 2nd of March, 1888, when the Lord called him home. His last illness was short, but very painful. His last related experiences and prayers manifested that the grain was ripe for the sickle; the silver had been refined in the crucible, and the gold purified in the furnace. Bro. Wilkinson was a clear, logical and impressive preacher of the Word; and looked after the details of his work with great thoroughness and assiduity. That he was most highly esteemed was manifested by the large concourse of citizens from town and country who assembled at his funeral. He is greatly missed on the Stayner Circuit; by the citizens of the town, by his pastor, and, most of all, by a lonely widow.

THE REV. GEORGE THOMAS RICHARDSON

Was born in Devonshire, England, in the year 1822. His parents were members of the Congregational Church, and brought up their children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. When George was nine years old his father died, leaving him in the care of an affectionate mother, who continued to teach him the fear of the Lord, so far as morality and outward religion were concerned. At the age of seventeen years he was converted to God, during a revival, in the Methodist Sunday-school of his native town, and at once became a member of the Wesleyan Church, and from that time till the latest moment of his life he possessed a strong and unwavering attachment to the people of his choice. He loved the communion of saints, and manifested his love by a constant attendance on all the means of grace, public and private. He was an example to others, especially in a regular attendance at the prayer-meeting and class-meeting; and in the unaffected simplicity and openness with which he spoke of his spiritual condition. At the age of seventeen he received license as an exhorter; and soon after as a local preacher. In the year 1844 he was united in marriage to Miss Elvins, the only sister of the late B. P. Elvins of the British Conference; and ten years later he, with his devoted wife and children, came to Canada; and the same year, 1854, he was received as a probationer for our Canadian Methodist ministry, and was sent to supply the Coldwater Mission, near which place, three months ago, he "finished his course with joy, and the ministry which he had received of the Lord Jesus." Most of his fields of labor were arduous; but he loyally did the work of an evangelist, enduring hardness as a good soldier of the cross of Christ.

As a preacher he was plain, evangelical and practical. A great preacher he never attempted to be; but a good and useful one he was, his ministry being owned of God, in many instances, in the conversion of sinners and the building up of

believers. In 1878, by sleeping in a damp bed, he caught a severe cold, resulting in a hoarseness, which obliged him to seek temporary retirement from the full work of the ministry. For four years he sustained a superannuated relation, during which time he supplied a small charge on Scugog Island. In 1883 he again entered the active work of the ministry; but was frequently reminded that the time of departure was not far distant. At the Conference of 1887 he was appointed to the Hillsdale Circuit, where he labored till March 20th, 1888, when he practically ceased at once to work and live. His son Henry, who was with him during his last illness, asked him, a short time before the end came, "Father, what gives you the greatest comfort now?" The answer was such as might be anticipated: "The atonement of Jesus; I have the utmost confidence in that. I rest my all upon it now.

"'In my hands no price I bring, Simply to the cross I cling."

"I shall soon join 'the loved ones, who have gone before,' 'Where the wicked cease from troubling, and the weary are at rest.'" Thus passed away, to the "house of many mansions," the Rev. George Thomas Richardson, in the 66th year of his age, and the 34th of his ministry.

THE REV. W. T. NORMAN.

The subject of this notice was born at Oak Ridges, in the township of Whitchurch, on the 18th day of May, 1860, and died in Pickering, on the Greenwood Circuit, on the 13th day of April, 1888. He was the son of godly parents, but lived without a saving knowledge of the truth until he was past 22 years of age. During the winter of 1882, special services were held in the Methodist Church at Richmond Hill, by Rev. Peter Addison. Our deceased brother attended these services, and the Lord found the way to his heart. Soon afterwards the Church, seeing that he possessed gifts and graces which qualified him for a life of usefulness, advised him to prepare himself for the work of the Christian ministry.

Acting on this advice, he attended the High School for two years, then entered Victoria University, and spent two years there. He was stationed on the Sanford Circuit by the Conference of 1886, and labored very acceptably and successfully during the year. He was sent to the Greenwood Circuit by our last Conference, where, during a stay of a little over nine months, he endeared himself to the people. His purpose was to return to Victoria College next year, that he might the more thoroughly prepare himself for the important life-work which he had undertaken; but God ordered otherwise, and took him to his reward. His sufferings during a period of six days were intense, but the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ enabled him to triumph. Our loss is his eternal gain.



REPORT OF THE SUNDAY-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

In presenting their Annual Report, your Committee are glad to find that there are several items which they are sure will be gratifying for the Conference to hear. For instance, five more Sunday-schools are reported than were reported last year; but we think that in view of the fact that there is an increase of thirty-three in the number of preaching places there should have been a larger increase in the number of schools.

In respect to officers and teachers, there is an increase of 230, and in the number of scholars no less than 7,876. The number of conversions reported is 1,804, or 302 more than were reported last year; 5,962 are represented meeting in class, or 321 more than last year. The next item

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is one we are sorry to report, viz., a decrease of 1,808 in the number of scholars who are learning the Methodist Catechism. We are pleased to say that 9,116 are reported as having signed the Total Abstinence Pledge, which is an increase of nearly 2,000. In respect to Sunday-school publications, including Pleasant Hours, Home and School, Happy Days, Berean Quarterly, Berean Leaves, and Sunday-school Banner, a total of 50,676, being an increase of 2,195; but this is not so large an increase as there should be, seeing that there is an increase of more than 7,000 scholars. We are pleased to say that 1,074 fewer "others papers" were taken than were reported last year.

Your Committee are of opinion that from the number of 40,000 scholars there should be a larger number of accessions to the Church, and would respectfully suggest that every possible means should be adopted to get the children and young persons gathered into the fold of Christ; the Master said, "Feed My Lambs," and therefore we think that there should be in every Sunday-school one or more juvenile classes led by suitable

persons, to train the children for Christ.

Your Committee are gratified to find that so many of the scholar's have signed the Total Abstinence Pledge, and would strongly urge that increased attention should be given to this matter, as in many quarters cider and light or home-made wines are extensively used; and in the opinion of your Committee, the use of these beverages will lead to the use of stronger liquors.

Your Committee feel sure that the members of Conference will agree with them in the opinion that, next to studying the Holy Scriptures, it is of the highest importance that sound literature should be circulated in our Sunday-schools, and therefore they rejoice that there is a gratifying increase in the number of our Church Sunday-school publications, as none are neither better nor cheaper than those issued at our own Publishing House.

The amount of Sinday-school collections, which the Sunday-school Board receives, is the only source of help of which the Board can be certain; and as the entire collection is used purely for Sunday-school purposes, without spending one cent in the salaries of officers, your Committee would urge that the collection should in no instance be omitted, and would fain hope that ministers and officers will see to it that the Sunday-school Collection is made as regularly as those required for other Connexional purposes.

Several schools contributed towards the erection of three churches at Fort McLeod, which are not reported to the Committee. We are glad that our children are thus trained to feel an interest in missions in the

North-West.

Your Committee would respectfully suggest that in sending the collections the discipline should be observed, and all moneys should be sent through the Financial Secretaries to the Treasurer, as when this plan is not followed, errors are almost unavoidable.

Your Committee beg to recommend that the Rev. E. Barrass, M.A., be re-appointed Secretary-Treasurer.

We also recommend that Ministers and Lay members of our Church use their influence to induce directors and managers of fairs and exhibitions to take measures to have

all such practices prohibited.

Memorial from Algoma District, praying that it be recommended to the Missionary to investigate, by personal visit, into what are believed to be unduly small missionary appropriations to Missions in Algoma District, compared with Nipissing District.

Resolved,—To refer said memorial to the Mission Board, with recommendation to give favorable consideration to the prayer thereof.

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REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMORIAL OF THE BRITISH COLUMBIA CONFERENCE REGARDING INDIAN AFFAIRS IN THAT PROVINCE.

To the Members of the Toronto Conference :-

Your Committee, to whom was referred the Memorial of the British Columbia Conference regarding Indian affairs in that Province, beg leave to report :-

1. That they have considered the Conference Memorial and also the Report of the Provincial and Dominion Commissioners referred to therein. 2. That some of the charges, reflections, and insinuations against our

missionaries and their work contained in the official report referred to are serious, and in the opinion of your Committee ought not to be allowed to

pass without being challenged.

3. That while the report bears upon its face evidence of unfairness and unjust prejudice against our missionaries and against our Church, and while your Committee have every confidence that our missionaries in that field, as well as in others, have taught the Indians, not only their duty to God, but also to the Government under which they live, your Committee would respectfully urge the General Missionary Board not to allow the missionaries to remain under imputations and insinuations that they have rood reason to believe are unjust and unfounded; but to take such steps as may bring out the real facts of the case, and thereby vindicate, as is hoped, the noble work of our Church and the self-denying labor of its missionaries among the Indians of British Columbia.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Treasurer's Report for the year ending July 31st, 1887.

In presenting this Report for the consideration of the Board, the Treasurer has pleasure in stating:

1. That there has been an increase in the Permanent Fund amounting

to \$4,244.23.

2. The estimates for the year, which were made with great care, were ufficient to meet the expenditure, and the debt has been considerably reduced. It was the desire of the Treasurer to make these estimates as close as possible, in order to keep the assessments to Circuits down to the

lowest possible amounts.

3. The annual income from all sources has fully met the expectations of the Treasurer. Notwithstanding the low rate of interest, there has been an increase realized from this source of \$1,679.29. A part of this ncrease, however, should have been paid in and accounted for in last year's Report. The Book Room has paid \$6,000 to the Fund, an increase of \$2,000. The several Annual Conferences have paid the amounts in full apportioned to them, with very trifling exceptions, which are very easily explained.

4. The claimants have been paid in full, and the debt, with which we commenced the year, has been reduced \$1,667.25, leaving only a balance of \$1,044.95.

5. On the whole, the working of the new law has been an encouraging success during this, the first year of its existence, and augurs well for the future. I do not claim for it absolute perfection, but it cannot be changed till the next General Conference. As we cannot "mend" it fill then, let us, as ministers and laymen, "keep it," and with the improvements that may be made at the next General Conference, it will be a lasting blessing to the Church in all time to come.

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GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND.

Report of the Treasurer for the year ending August 31st, 1857, for publication in the Minutes of the several Annual Conferences.

As Treasurer of the above Fund, I think it important that a Report of the Fund should appear in the Minutes of the several Annual Conferences, for the information of those concerned in its management and success.

An interim Report was sent to the Conferences last year, but as the year closes on the 31st August, this is the first regular Annual Report that could be published in the Minutes since the last General Conference.

The following are the Receipts and Expenditure as they stood on the 31st August, 1887:—

According to the estimates of the Financial Committee of the General Conference, it will require \$7,500 to meet the claims on the Fund. This, I think, is a moderate estimate in view of the expenses of the past

The actual amount received from the Conferences during year is only 1,552.33. I am aware that some of the Conferences had paid a large roportion of the collections of the then current year just before the General Conference, but the collections for the following year should have been aid in before the 31st August. After making all due allowances, he amounts paid by the Conferences during the year were shamefully mall.

If this state of things should continue till the close of the quadrenium, there will be no funds to pay the expenses of the delegates to the eneral Conference of 1890. The officers appointed by the General Conference are forbidden to "disburse more than the amount in hand." The nestion, therefore, is assuming a serious aspect, and it becomes my duty to lay the facts before the parties interested at this early date, that they may govern themselves accordingly.

The Fund, at the close of the year, was indebted to the Treasurer 7,921.70. It is scarcely necessary to say that this state of things cannot continued. Some provision must evidently be made at an early date to eet the expenses of the Fund. I know of no available method of doing is, unless the Conferences provide in some way for the prompt payment mully of the amounts allotted to them by the Financial Committee of the General Conference.

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INTERIM REPORT OF THE TREASURER OF THE UNION CHURCH RELIEF FUND.

To the Presidents and Members of the Several Annual Conferences of the Methodist Church: -

The report of about nine months' operations for this year is as follows: 307 Circuits have reported \$224.88 as collections for the year, averaging about 304 more per Circuit than last year. The greater portion of this sum has been absorbed in paying interest on appropriations, and the balance, with the sum received from other Circuits to report, will be used in paying the most needy claims in part. As was done last year, a full report will be sent out early in September, which, it is hoped, will be read in all the churches when the contributions are asked for. The Treasurer is giving the best and most careful attention he can command to the administration of this Fund, and earnestly hopes the ministers and members will steadily increase their givings, which last year averaged less than four cents per member for the whole Church. Say this rate be 'doubled let all the people say "Amen."

REPORT OF THE SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE.

That the Divine Being hath appointed the Sabbath-day as a day of rest from ordinary toil; a day in which His creatures should tender Him their offerings of praise and thanksgiving, and in so doing renew their physical and spiritual being, so that His blessing might be enjoyed not only by the individual, but by the community and the nation.

That the desecration of the holy day, so set apart, is a sin against God

as well as against man's nature.

That compulsory labor, under the threat of dismission unless one labor upon the Sabbath is an act of great injustice to the individual when such is enjoined either by an employer, a corporation, or a govern-And that when the liberty of the subject is so interferred with he is deprived of one of the greatest blessings which God intended he should enjoy, and the nation sanctioning by its laws the wrong which the subject is thus called upon to endure, cannot exert the best influences for the good of its people and for the welfare of the State.

Your Committee find that nothing is more conducive to the peace, har mony and well-being of any nation than a due observance of God's most

holy day. That the laws relating to the observance of the Lord's day are different in the various provinces of the Dominion, and that grave difficulties lie in the way of harmonizing these in a country like Canada embracing as it does two peoples, distinct in nationality, religion, and language, so as to secure one Act for the better observance of the Lord's day throughout the Dominion.

Your Committee recommend that the Conference memorialize the Senate and the House of Commons at the next meeting of the Legislature

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praying for the closing of all post offices, for the cessation of all travel, and all labor connected therewith by railroad and steamers under them which cannot be justified upon the grounds of mercy and necessity, so that the day may be to His creatures what the Divine Being intended it to be—a day of rest, and to this end to have the Dominion Act apply as far as possible to all the Provinces.

Your Committee further recommend that the Conference memorialize the Local Legislature of Ontario, whose law for the proper observance of the Lord's day is immeasurably the most comprehensive in the Dominion, to make such amendments to the same as will secure the more effectual working of the law, and make its provisions less open to misconception.

Your Committee would further recommend that every Circuit, Station, and Mission throughout the Conference, be urged to memorialize the Senate, the House of Commons and the Local Government upon these points, that public interest may be more fully awakened, that employers of labor, be they individuals or corporate bodies, may fully realize that their ordinary business cannot be carried on upon the Lord's day without inflicting upon those whom they employ a gross injustice, a grievous wrong; and that no government has any right to claim to take its place among enlightened and progressive nations which does not realize that one of its first duties is to secure for its people, to the largest possible extent, the blessings and the enjoyment of the day of rest, and that its own stability and safety and well-being depends upon the devout national observance of the Lord's day.

REPORT OF CONTINGENT FUND COMMITTEE.

The amount placed at the disposal of your Committee by the Treasurer of the Fund was \$1,216, being somewhat in excess of the amount reported for the previous year. This amount your Committee is glad to report as sufficient to pay the aggregate amount of all individual claims recognized and passed by it, without the usual pro rata discount. This desirable financial fact may be accounted for on these grounds: Not that there has been largely increased liberality on the part of the Church, but that, firstly, the number of claims is much below the average—perhaps because some went rather to the Sustentation Fund—and secondly, because, with an exception or two, only literally legitimate claims have been presented.

Your Committee would call the attention of the Church to the necessity for, and marked helpfulness of, this Fund; and earnestly urge increased liberality upon its part, unto the augmentation of the treasury thereof, as it cannot be expected that the claims in coming years will be as few in number, and small in general, individual amounts, as during the present year.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee, recognizing the grave position of the Temperance cause at the present time, and the importance of a clear, strong, and emphatic deliverance on the question, and earnest efforts in every part of our work for its advancement and success, we deplore the repeal of the Scott Act in a number of places; yet we are firmly of the opinion that there is not a real weakening of the movement, but a conviction manifested that the non-enforcement of the Act makes necessary a general effort for the total prohibition of the traffic in intoxicating drink throughout the Dominion. And we think, with this in view, renewed and increased interest and zeal will be shown in the work by our people.

We would re-affirm the resolutions passed at the last Annual Confer-

ence, especially emphasizing the following:

Resolved,-That we, the Ministers and Laity of this Conference,

solemnly pledge ourselves to oppose, by all constitutional methods, any Government, political party, or individual member of Parliament who shall directly or indirectly oppose prohibitory legislation.

Resolved, -That as the ultimate power of the people to influence the Legislature is found in the ballot-box, we declare our purpose by the pulpit, by the press, and by every legitimate means, to inculcate the responsibility of all Christian men and good citizens to subordinate political party alliances to the great work of securing the abolition of the accursed

liquor traffic.

We deeply feel the great necessity for us as a Church to take a decided and uncompromising stand on the questions of total abstinence and prohibition before the country, and in order to the obtaining of clear and distinct views, and presenting no equivocal position, we would recommend that greater attention be given to the reading and exposition of the Discipline on these points in all our congregations, and to the vigorous enforcement of it in all our societies. We would further recommend, that sermons be preached during the year presenting to our people the various aspects of the question, and in every Sabbath school the subject of total abstinence be explained by lessons or addresses, and a pledge-book or card be kept, and frequent opportunities be given to those belonging to the schools to record their names. And for the better information of the Annual Conference Temperance-Committee, and increasing the general interest of the Church on the Temperance movement, it be an instruction to the official Quarterly Boards of the various Circuits and Missions within the bounds of the Conference to send up to the May District Meeting a written report of the state of the Temperance work in the particular localities represented by such Circuit or Mission, giving information as to the probable number of actual total abstainers and prohibition voters in connection with the Church, the state of public sentiment as to local or general prohibition, and whether fermented or unfermented wine is used in the Lord's Supper. These reports to be placed in the hands of a Temperance Committee to be appointed by the District Meeting, who shall prepare a report tabulating such information, which, as approved by the District Meeting, shall come up with the District Minutes to the Annual Conference.

We would earnestly request our people to entirely avoid the treating practice which is so common, and to abolish the custom of using cider and home made fermented wines, believing that the practice of using such is attended with the danger of creating an appetite for stronger drink, and of falling into the pernicious social custom of taking intoxicating liquors

as a beverage. Your Committee would recommend, that in view of the important nature of the Convention of the Dominion Alliance to be held in the city of Montreal, beginning on the third of July of this year, that delegates be appointed by this Conference to attend and take such part as will serve the best interests of the cause.

We would suggest, in order to make more generally known the views and wishes of this Conference, this report be read before our congrega-

tions early in the year.

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REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

The present state of the work is such as to awaken devout gratitude to the Great Head of the Church for the clear tokens of His continued presence, and for the steady progress in all departments of the work. We observe some evils which threaten the spirituality and power of the Church, and from which we can be saved only as we offer a constant, united, and prayerful opposition. We rejoice to know that the unity of our people in faith, in polity, and in the work of the Church is so hearty, so general, and so blessed.

The evangelistic and revival work of the year has been greatly owned of God, as is shown in our increased membership. Thank God for preeminent gifts for this work bestowed upon a few; and yet we would express our conviction that we are not to depend wholly upon these gifted few. Let ministers and people everywhere co-operate in this work, let all local talent and gifts be utilized to the utmost, and let us not rest while any for whose souls we "must give account" are "without God and without

Our Sunday-school work is marked by progress in numbers, in depth, and in preparation of workers. However, in too many cases the children are not habitually attendants at Church. According to the Discipline the Sunday-school is a part of the Church, but oftentimes there is great need that practically it should be more vitally united to it, it should be supported by the funds of the Church and that all collections in the Sunday-school should be given to the Missionary work. Let our youth be brought up in the fold, and from the earliest childhood let them know something of Christian experience as heard in class and fellowship meetings.

Our people are more than ever awake to the benefits of culture and education, and yet we lament that in some cases even these good things are allowed to interfere with that attention to Bible study and to religious services which their supreme importance demands. Perhaps the most noted feature of the work just now is the deep, loyal, and generous spirit in the great educational scheme of the last General Conference. That so much has been done is a most memorable and encouraging fact, and yet were the whole scheme triumphantly ended, we even then should scarcely equal the

zeal of our fathers in this regard.

We thank God that as our people increase in ability and in numbers they are more anxious to secure for their children the very highest possible educational advantages, and to make sure of sound religious principles as a vital element.

Your Committee gratefully recognize the increased liberality of our people in sustaining so loyally all our Connexional funds, as well as the large outlay annually made for church and parsonage erection. We note this feature of our work the more espicially, because we regard the grace of liberality as one of the best practical exponents of the spiritual state of a Christian people; for it is sometimes painfully evident that parties giving evidence of many other characteristics of Godliness are sadly forgetful here. We suggest that Conference direct each minister to preach at least one sermon a year on "Systematic Giving."

The great danger which just now seems to call for special watchfulness

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is a self-indulgent conformity to the world. The inevitable tendency of the card-table, the race-course, the theatre, the circus, and the dance is to lure multitudes to everlasting ruin. And where any form of amusement becomes so absorbing as to leave little or no time or taste for religion, or where the eager pursuit of gain or pleasure leads to doubtful methods and associations, or to the exclusion of religious work, and to the neglect of duty, it is impossible to look for moral and spiritual power, impossible to hope for a noble and influential piety. We devoutly pray that it may become more certainly and manifestly true of us all, "They

are not of the world, even as I am not of the world."

As compared with the past there is great reason for gratitude and hope.

As compared with our privileges "there remaineth yet very much

land to be possessed."

All of which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF STATISTICAL COMMITTEE.

The Statistical Committee beg to report as follows:-

1. That the total membership of the Church within the bounds of this Conference for the year 1887-88, is 36,722, which, notwithstanding that the number of deaths and removals were 6,627, shows a net increase for the year of 2,439.

2. There has been raised for building and repairing churches, to parsonages and other circuit purposes, the sum of \$218,000, being an increase

over last year of \$35,000.

3. We are glad to find that there has been an increase of \$6,000 in the amount raised for ministerial support, but are sorry to notice that on some Circuits there has been large deficiencies.

4. The Connexional Funds collections have been well sustained, with

a considerable increase in all departments.

5. Your Committee has also experienced great difficulty in the prosecution of its work through the failure of a number of Superintendents of Circuits to complete their reports at the proper time, some items not having been reported when your Committee had completed its work.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE SUSTENTATION FUND.

CONSTITUTION.

Name.—This Fund shall be called the Sustentation Fund of the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church.

Object.—The object of the Fund is to relieve those ministers within the bounds of the Toronto Conference whose salary is inadequate to their support.

Claimants.—All ministers, whether laboring on Circuits or Missions, whose salaries are lower than the following amounts, shall have their

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the hin neir ons, neir claims considered in connection with this Fund, viz.:—Married ministers, \$600; single ordained ministers, \$300; and probationers, \$200; young men travelling under Chairmen of Districts shall be regarded as probationers, providing they travel the whole year. These amounts to embrace salary only.

Income.—The Fund shall be sustained by annual collections and subscriptions to be taken up in all congregations in every Circuit and Mission throughout the Conference. Each minister and preacher shall bring the matter fairly before his people, and do his utmost to secure liberal contributions to this Fund. In case there are any delinquent Circuits, the Chairman of the District, accompanied, when possible, by a layman, shall visit such Circuits, and shall urge on the people, as he may think best, a more liberal and generous support of their ministers. No minister, or probationer who has not taken up the collection shall be entitled to any claim on the Fund. Every Circuit claiming from this Fund must show that it has paid for ministerial support an average of \$3 per member from all members over sixteen years of age, and every Mission that it has paid an average of \$2, in order to give them a legitimate claim on the Fund

Management.—The Fund shall be under the management of a committee composed of one minister and one layman from each District, appointed by the Conference, who shall have authority to distribute the funds on hand during the sessions of the Conference to the several claimants, according to the amounts received from all sources for ministerial support during the year.

No claim shall be considered by that Committee that has not been recommended by the District Meeting where the minister resides, immediately preceding such distribution.

A Treasurer shall be appointed by the Conference, who shall take charge of all the moneys collected for this Fund, to whom the Superintendents of Circuits are requested to remit all collections and subscriptions immediately on receipt thereof, and who shall pay the amounts allotted to the claimants on the order of the Chairman and Secretary of the Committee.

Superintendents of Circuits shall remit all collections and subscriptions immediately on receipt thereof, to the Financial Secretary of the District in which they are laboring, so that an account may be kept in each District of the amount raised in the District.

Your Committee, while thoroughly in sympathy with the hope expressed by the Synod's resolutions: "That the work of the joint Committee appointed to select passages of Scripture most suitable for daily reading in Public and High Schools," will command the confidence of the Church, and be of material service in inspiring the minds of our youths with the great truths of the Christian faith; and while acknowledging the advantages of havingthose selections printed in calendar form, as well as in a separate volume, beg to report that inasmuch as they are informed that the Ministerial Association of Toronto have prepared, and submitted to the Minister of Education, a plan of Biblical instruction in schools, and have also sent a copy to the Anglican Association, until some action has been taken by those respective bodies, they cannot recommend the Conference to take any action in this matter.

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REPORT OF THE WESLEYAN LADIES' COLLEGE, HAMILTON.

The Directors of the Wesleyan Ladies' College would greet the members of the Toronto Conference.

The College cannot come now, as it did for years—alone, as the only Ladies' College in the Dominion, that had a regular curriculum followed by a degree. Indeed, it was one of the first in the world that aimed so high or claimed so much for women. Nor can it now come as the only one in our own Church, for they have so multiplied that the competition for patronage is as keen as in any commercial calling.

We come, as usual, to greet you, and to assure you of our sympathy and co-operation in your great work. Ours differs from yours, but it is both preparatory and auxiliary to it.

Our course of study, as you will see from our catalogue, is both broad and practical. The mastery of it will imply a familiarity with the leading lines of culture of the present day. We are satisfied that if the graduates of the Literary Course had a fair equivalent allowed for the extra work they had done in Music and Art, their work would be found fully equal to that required for the ordinary B.A. An equitable system of education would make such allowance.

But we believe that the study of the Scriptures should run all through a Christian education. In the preparatory year our junior purils become familiar with the Gospel by Matthew. In the Academic year they take the Acts of the Apostles, thus finishing New Testament history. In the College Course begins a closer study of the Scriptures, their history, chronology, authorship, etc. In the first year, to the Psalms; in the second, through the Old Testament; in the third year, the history, chronology and authorship of the New Testament, and in the senior year, Biblical MSS., the Canon, versions, etc., will be discussed. We do not know any course, not strictly theological, that gives such an acquaintance with the Scriptures. The course of study embraces Natural Theology, Evidences of Christianity and Ethics. We call your attention to this line of study as cognate to your own work and auxiliary to it.

Our work in Literature, Music and Art is well known, and constantly growing. Next year will introduce some marked improvements. We have put into our catalogue all that any student can safely carry; more than that would be foolish display. We have graduated over 220 in the full Literary Course. These ladies have played a very important part in the educational interests of our country. A good class will be added this year, and several graduates in Music and Art.

The institution is, as you know, on a strictly self-sustaining basis; it has never asked nor received any Church aid. Its founders intended to save the Church from financial responsibility for woman's education, and thus far the original plan has been followed. We seek not your hard earnings, we ask for your sympathy and good word, so long as we merit it.

Regarding the government and discipline of the College, it may suffice to say that the development of self-respect, and the allowance of a liberal latitude for innocent relaxation, accomplish all that is needed. During the twenty-seven years of its history, no accident or mishap of any kind has befallen any student in attendance.

The saddest part of our report is the announcement of the death of

the President of our Board, Dennis Moore, Esq., also of two others of our Board of Directors, Dr. Nelles, and Dr. S. J. Hunter—three of the heaviest losses that Canadian Methodism has ever sustained in one year. Their names were as household words, wide as the Dominion.

Extending to you all a cordial invitation to visit the College, and

REPORT OF THE ALBERT COLLEGE.

To the Members of the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church:-

In accordance with the provisions of the Acts of Incorporation of Albert College, the Annual Report of said College is herewith submitted

to you.

The actual attendance of pupils during the current year has reached 161, being composed of 112 gentlemen and 49 ladies, representing the Provinces of British Columbia, Manitoba, Ontario and Quebec, and the States of New York and Michigan.

The health and deportment of students during the year has been

good.

The religious life in and about the College has been active and earnest. During the fall session a large number of our students were converted to God, and many were added to the Church. The Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. are associated under the direction of students which are doing noble work for the Master, and are giving valuable aid in building up strong Christian characters.

The literary work of the school maintains its high standing, and it is in this department that its strength and growth lie. During the past

year candidates have been preparing for examination as follows:

The Academy of Music is in a prosperous condition. Number of pupils in this department twenty-one.

The Commercial Department continues to give young men and women a thorough business training at slight cost. Number of pupils twenty-one.

The Department of Fine Art is growing rapidly and doing substantial work, as witness the late examinations of the Ontario School of Art.

The affiliated relation of Albert College to Victoria University is most pleasant, and each year is increasing in value to both institutions.

The Board of Management has undertaken during the present summer to repair the college buildings to the extent of \$7,000, in the form of a new roof and additional story, making room for about sixty more boys,

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which was imperatively needed, and a new heating apparatus for the whole building, half the cost of which has been provided for by subscriptions from Belleville.

The finances of the school are in a prosperous condition. During the past three years the School Treasurer has been able to report a small surplus of receipts over expenditures, and this year will again be able to report a surplus of about \$400.

We would remind the Conference of the duty of appointing two mem-

bers of the Conference to the Board of Management.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS OF THE ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE TO THE TORONTO CONFERENCE.

The Board of Directors of the Ontario Ladies' College have very great pleasure in presenting this their Fourteenth Annual Report.

It was our pleasing duty, last year, to refer to the very flattering success which had attended the College, and it gives us unfeigned satisfaction to report that the present year has been one of continued and increased prosperity.

Our College has now been in successful operation for fourteen years, and it may well be regarded as one of the permanent institutions of the Church. While other schools, projected by individual enterprise and sustained by personal exertion, have enjoyed but temporary and indifferent success, this College has prospered beyond the expectation of its most sanguine friends. Every year's experience enables us to make improvements upon the past, and each year we are adding to our facilities for imparting knowledge and increasing our sphere of usefulness. In attributing the unparalleled success of the College in large measure to the careful and intelligent direction of the Principal, Rev. J. J. Hare, Ph.D., and the Lady Principal, Miss Adams, M.L.A., we very cheerfully bear testimony to their able, efficient and well directed efforts, and those of their able staff of assistants, during the past year.

Our aim has been to raise the standard of education in this College above that of any similar institution in the country, to make it in every way as thorough and comprehensive as the best schools abroad, and to furnish to young ladies, desiring a collegiate education, opportunities equal to those provided for young men. We trust that, at no distant day, the work done shall receive suitable recognition in the educational system

of this Province.

In our College of Literature and Science, and in our Schools of Music, Fine Art, and Elocution, each important department has its own Professor, and our facilities for instruction afford unsurpassed advantages. We believe that, without a good degree of division of labor, the highest results of education cannot be achieved. No expense has been spared in providing superior instruments and apparatus for the effectual teaching of each subject, while our magnificent College buildings, ample lawns and grounds, render College life homelike and attractive.

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summer m of a Our College of Literature and Science embraces difficult branches of Collegiate study, and the staff comprises the Principal, Rev. J. J. Hare, Ph.D., the Lady Principal, Miss Adams, M.L.A., and five efficient assistants, besides Dr. Haanel, of Victoria University, who visits the College each week throughout the year, and gives lectures and experiments in Natural Science. The equipment comprises a large Refracting Telescope, one of the finest of its kind in the Dominion, a Compound Microscope, and a working Laboratory for students that is only equalled in University halls.

The School of Music is under the direction of Prof. J. W. F. Harrison, assisted by Prof. Bayley, Mrs. Bradley, and four other able teachers. During the present year, the pupils of this School gave a Musical and Elocutionary Recital in the Horticultural Pavilion in Toronto, and in that centre of criticism they scored a complete triumph. It is with gratification we mention that this year we have been enabled to equip this department with entirely new pianofortes, twenty-two in number, including three Concert Grand and three Cabinet Grand pianofortes, also a large new Orchestral Organ, the most complete of its class, thus making our equipment, in this department, very greatly superior to that of any ladies' school in Canada.

The School of Fine Art is under the direction of Prof. L. R. O'Brien, President of the Royal Canadian Academy, assisted by Miss Windeatt, Associate of the Royal Canadian Academy, and two competent teachers of Drawing and Art Needle-work.

The School of Elocution is presided over by Miss Graham, Gold Medallist, from the Philadelphia School of Oratory.

Social Culture and Deportment, too often overlooked in a lady's education, are special features in our College work, and it is gratifying to know that our efforts in this direction are understood and appreciated.

In addition, we provide a Commercial School in which are taught Book-keeping, Telegraphy, Phonography, and Type-writing, in connection with which we have lately added to the College a Caligraph writingmachine.

A system of physical training, including Calisthenics and Riding, is also provided, such as skating, tobogganing, lawn-tennis, croquet, etc., we being persuaded that the preservation of health, and cultivation of the physical powers are essential to the perfection of the educational system.

We are pleased to be able to report an increase of income during the year, it having exceeded twenty-three thousand dollars. The number of pupils enrolled was 160.

We also are thankful to be able to report that, during the year, there has been entire freedom from sickness, thus testifying to the healthfulness of our location and surroundings.

We desire to return to the Conference our hearty thanks for your co-operation and for the confidence you have been pleased to repose in as in the past, and we cordially commend the College to your continued patronage and support.

DEAR DR. POTTS,—It affords me pleasure to furnish you with the following statement:—

Re St. Vincent Circuit, Toronto Conference, and Woodford Circuit, Guelph Conference.

In the matter of the St. Vincent Circuit, Toronto Conference, and Woodford Circuit, Guelph Conference, after hearing the case pretty fully, I am persuaded there was an invasion of the St. Vincent Circuit, but, inasmuch as a church has been erected at Bay View and settled upon trustees, a congregation gathered, a Society formed, and a Sunday-school organized, I recommend that the appointment at Bay View remain as it is at present, until such time as the trustees of the said church request it to be connected with the St. Vincent Circuit.

A question having arisen in reference to a matter of discipline in the Toronto District Meeting, involving the rights of laymen, the following question was proposed by the Rev. Dr. Shaw, viz.: Did the Chairman of the Toronto District "duly observe and enforce our Discipline" in excluding two members of the Quarterly Official Board of the Toronto (Metropolitan) Circuit from membership in the District Meeting of May, 1888, they having been duly elected thereto by the Quarterly Official Board aforesaid; and has a Quarterly Official Board the right to elect, as members of the District Meeting, laymen to represent General and other Conference officers who may be members of the Quarterly Meeting?

On the above, the Rev. Dr. Williams, General Superintendent, pre-

siding in the Conference, furnished a ruling, as follows :-

The Chairman of the Toronto District was within his rights in excluding from a seat in the District Meeting, representatives elected by the Toronto (Metropolitan) Circuit, other than one, as the said Circuit has but one minister "in the active work on the Circuit."

The Quarterly Official Board has the right to elect by ballot, at its fourth Quarterly Official Meeting, one representative for each minister or probationer appointed to the Circuit by the Stationing Committee, which I un-

derstand to refer to the regular work of the pastorate.

The Quarterly Official Board has not the right, according to my reading of the Discipline, to elect as members of the District Meetings laymen to represent General and other Conference officers who may be members of the Quarterly Official Meeting.

(3) Who are elected by the District Meetings to the Sabbath school Committee?

(4) Who are elected by the District Meetings to the Contingent Fund Committee?

(5) What Probationers for the Ministry are recommended by the several Districts to be received into full connection and ordained?

(6) Who are the Probationers of three years?

(7) Who are the Probationers of two years?(8) Who are the Probationers of one year?

(9) Who are recommended to be received as Probationers for the Ministry?

(10) Who are the Superannuated Ministers? (11) Who are the Supernumerary Ministers?

(12) What Ministers or Probationers for the Ministry have died during the past year?

(13) What Probationers are on the list of reserve?

2nd. To classify and arrange the memorials and resolutions from the several Districts in such manner that when presented to Conference they may be readily and intelligently referred to an appropriate Committee, or acted upon by the Conference as it may direct.

3rd. Having selected a suitable Secretary, shall through him be prepared to report to the Conference at the call of the chair. The report to be read from the platform, and in such manner that the pleasure of the Conference may be ascertained on each item presented.

4th. That to facilitate the work, each District Secretary prepare, previous to coming to Conference, separate copies of all memorials and resolutions referred by his District to the Conference.

5th. That for convenience, the Secretary of the Tabulating Committee shall be ex-officio an Assistant Secretary of Conference.

6th. Prepare and present the Report on Statistics.

PASTORAL ADDRESS

MINISTERS OF THE TORONTO CONFERENCE

TO THE

MEMBERS OF THE METHODIST CHURCH UNDER THEIR CARE.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN, -We desire, from this our Annual Conference, to remind you of the gracious successes God hath vouchsafed to us during the past year. Eight thousand five hundred and ninety-six have been admitted into the Church during the year, though the losses by removal, backsliding and death leave only a net gain of 2,439. This should awaken profound gratitude, and yet deep searching of heart-gratitude that so many have been saved, searching of heart that so many have turned aside so soon. This should lead us to enquire whether the conversions are all genuine, and the admissions to the Church at all times properly guarded, and the observance of the means of grace, especially the class and prayer-meetings, faithfully urged. Let us be careful, amid the fervor of evangelistic services, that we do not bring upon ourselves the charge of having healed the hurt of the daughter of our people slightly. Let there be a genuine repentance, a genuine regeneration, a genuine consecration, a conscious spiritual life in all. Let there be no undue anxiety to multiply numbers at the expense of the purity and power and spiritual might of the Church.

We also rejoice in the liberality shown by you in the past year in the increased contributions to our various Connexional Funds, especially in the hearty response given on behalf of Education and College Federation and Endowment. We bid you yet more and more abound in this grace of liberality. Delight to lay your wealth at the feet of Jesus for the grandest and holiest uses, that the ministry may be heartily sustained, that the mission cause may be nobly advanced, that the best educated ministry may fill our pulpits, that the poor may not be forgotten, and that you yourselves may lay up treasures in heaven so as to be enduringly rich.

Your duty in the great cause of Temperance, at this solemn juncture, is to manifest by voice, and vote, and pen, and in every rightful way your unmistakable demand for the earliest possible suppression and prohibition of the liquor traffic. Let no party shibboleth delude you, as in times past, into a sacrifice of the holy demand for all measures that make for temperance. Let the cause of moral reform be before all party considerations in your converse, in the home, and in your vote at every electim. Only in this way can we hope to suppress the deepest curse of our country—the liquor traffic—and compel the respect of all law-makers for our just and righteous demands.

To this end suffer the word of exhortation on a most vital question—family religion. What the home is, to a very important degree, that will the State and the Church be. If the home training be pure, and liberal, and unselfish, and self-denying, and patriotic, and spiritual, the Church and State will surely possess these qualities in an eminent and saving degree.

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Be careful of your example in the home. In every branch of life what we wish others to become we must be ourselves. Every living creature imitates, and children especially copy the maxims, manners, principles and examples of the parental home. Do not lay aside everything for the sake of worldly advancement, and then expect your children to make sacrifices for Christ. Do not be indifferent to the means of grace, and grudging in your support of the gospel, if you would have your children set a proper value on religion, and eagerly accept it with all its conditions.

Be careful to impart sound religious instruction to the family. For the soul to be without knowledge is not good. It is a lamentable thing to see a parent straining every nerve to secure large possessions of land and property for his child, and yet leave his mind a barren waste.

Do not spare in your outlay for good books and magazines and healthy, helpful Christian literature. Let no impure literature of any kind enter your homes to poison the mental and moral life of that home. Let the Christian Guardian, our Connexional paper, be a regular and welcome visitor to every home as an important helper and religious instructor. No family instruction can be complete without family devotion. Christian parents must not only pray for their children, but with them. To think of a Christian household, without a family altar, is a strange inconsistency. A thing so vital to home piety cannot be neglected without sin. Let no claims of business, or company, or engagements of any kind, prevent the regular daily devotions of the family. In all instances unite the reading of the Scriptures with family prayer. By that means you will fill your children's minds with Bible knowledge, impress upon them the lessons and counsels of truth, and assist to lay the foundation of a sound religious education.

Maintain family government. Just, as the welfare of the State depends on the wisdom and righteousness of its laws and legislators, so the welfare of the family depends on the home government. The proper exercise of family discipline is a difficult task, requiring much wisdom and patience and firmness and affection; but the maintenance of family government is essential to the welfare of the family, the Church and the world. We say, correctly enough, the father is the parent of the child, but it is equally true that the child is the father of the man, and training forms that child that man. One of the greatest blessings you can confer on your children is to cultivate and discipline them to self-reliance, self-restraint, and self-dependence; that, as they go forth into the world, they may rely confidently upon God and a disciplined self.

Make the spiritual welfare of your children an object of unceasing care. There are three things a good parent should specially seek for his children. That they may share the piety of their parents; that they may accept the distinctive faith and principles of their parents; that they may cheerfully go forward to fulfil the Christian work and activities of the Church of their parents. First of all, and before all, seek to win your children to Christ. Then endeavor to root them in the beliefs and principles of which you intelligently approve. Then urge them to accept the unfinished work of their own church, and to its extension, consolidation, and evangelical power, consecrate their resources of wealth, or influence, or talents, or personal service. So shall the Church grow and extend with increasing power, and influence, and number, till it shall have fulfilled its part in spreading scriptural holiness throughout the land.
