

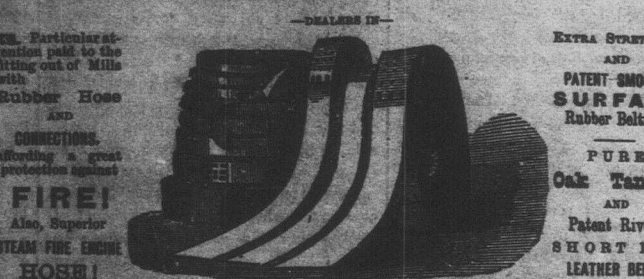

An Unreasonable Petition. No one will mistake the position of the ADVANCE in the matter of temperance, for he has always assisted those who have endeavored to work the reform of the intemperate.

The friends of the Petition were not able to urge any reason, whatever, why its prayer should be granted, although one Councillor did say it was to prevent those engaged in the traffic from clubbing together and so managing their obtaining of Licenses as to prevent the Temperance Act from coming into operation as soon as it otherwise would.

The Petition does not, in the least degree, affect the bringing of the Canada Temperance Act into operation, one way or the other, for it is not possible under the most favorable circumstances, to have the law in operation until after the meeting of the Council in July next, and at that meeting Licenses cannot be refused for an additional six months and they cannot be refused for more than six months.

We, therefore, hope that the Council will reconsider its hasty action and show that while it is prepared to do anything necessary to aid in bringing about temperance reform, it can also check ill-advised and unnecessary attempts to interfere with even those engaged in the liquor traffic.

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present year only, in view of the pending effort to have the Canada Temperance Act adopted in this County, he would vote for it, but as it did not limit the time he was not in favor of committing the Council to a perpetual policy in the matter and must therefore, oppose the motion. Another reason why the prayer of the Petition should not be granted was because the law placed the minimum License fee at \$20 and the sum for Licenses for being \$25 per year in the country districts it would have the effect of imposing upon those in the town a charge of \$40 per year instead of \$25, which was the sum they ought to pay. Conn. Campbell denied the view of Coun. Lawler and said if the prayer of the Petition were granted it would work great injustice to the country dealers and if they were to be required to pay \$40 a year, they would be compelled to pay \$80 because it was now considered just that they should pay twice as much as the country dealers. He thought the Convention that got up the Petition did not represent the ratepayers of the County or even the temperance body, as two parishes were unrepresented, and therefore the motion of the Petition should be granted. Even the temperance bodies contained more boys and girls than men and women and therefore did not represent the electors. Coun. Burhill said he was one of the delegates at the Convention which he considered sufficiently represented the County in this respect. He explained the object of the petition was to prevent the law in view of the pending action of the Temperance Act, to prevent dealers from arranging themselves to secure Licenses in such a manner as to prevent the law which adopted from being put in operation. It was not claimed that the Petition represented the ratepayers of the County, but the temperance people, although those who signed the Petition were believed, all ratepayers and persons who should command the attention and respect of the Council.

Conn. Potheringham argued that owing to the time that must elapse before the law could be put into force, it should be adopted, the granting of the prayer of the Petition was not necessary at this meeting of Council, inasmuch as no one pretended that it could be brought into operation before next July, when the Council would be obliged to grant Licenses for six months license before January next, when all Licenses would expire by law. Coun. Campbell agreed with Coun. Potheringham that there was no necessity for granting the prayer of the Petition, inasmuch as the success of the pending motion would not admit of the Act coming into force before January next, when all Licenses would expire by law.

Conn. Campbell said he was not opposed to the Temperance Act but to the injustice which the petition if adopted would work in the country districts, where the ratepayers would be required to pay \$40 a year instead of \$25 for Licenses. Coun. Cameron agreed with Coun. Crocker and explained that the Boistown Society would have been represented in Convention but for the fact that the temperance people were in a minority and disinterested in securing the success of the Temperance Act.

Coun. Brown followed on the same side, affirming that the request of the Petition was reasonable and just. Coun. Campbell said he would like to hear some Conciler explain what was to be gained by the motion of Coun. Burhill. The question being put the amendment was lost and the prayer of the Petition was ordered to be granted. Coun. Campbell after all voting for the Petition. Adjourned for dinner.

After dinner on motion of Coun. Potheringham it was ordered that the time for granting Licenses be from two to three o'clock each day.

Coun. Burhill, Potheringham, Cameron, and Freese and Soutfield were appointed a committee on County Accounts.

Coun. Campbell, O'Brien, Whitsey, Leggie, Benford, McLaughlin, Lawler, Hay, Sullivan, Betts, and Fitzpatrick were appointed Committee on Parish Accounts.

Coun. Burhill, Sullivan and Crocker were appointed Jail Committee.

Coun. Potheringham enquired whether the Council should be appointed to look after County Lands and obtain particular articles concerning them had attended to the duty entrusted to them. The Warden replied that he had no information from the Committee.

Coun. Campbell brought up the Liquor License matter by referring to the fact that under the petition granting the prayer of the Temperance Petition outside parishes which formerly pay \$25 a year for Licenses would be obliged to pay \$40 a year and he thought the rate in the town ought to be obliged to pay \$80 a year as much as the country dealers, that being the present proportion between town and country. The subject was dropped for the present.

Coun. Burhill moved that Constable Cotier receive \$1 for shovelling away snow and building the fire this morning. After some discussion the motion was passed.
