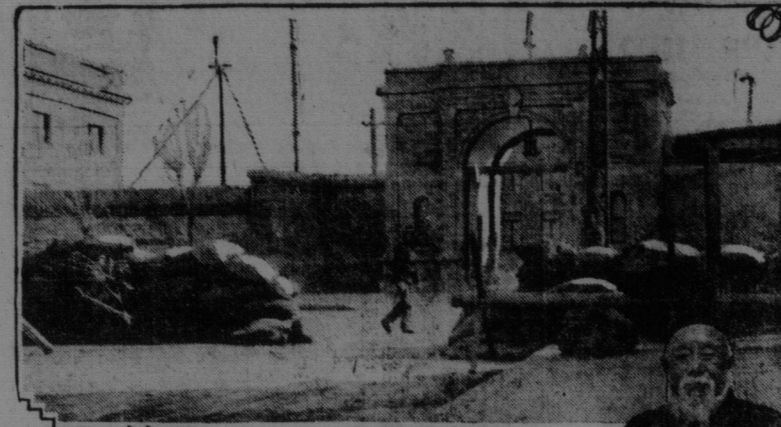

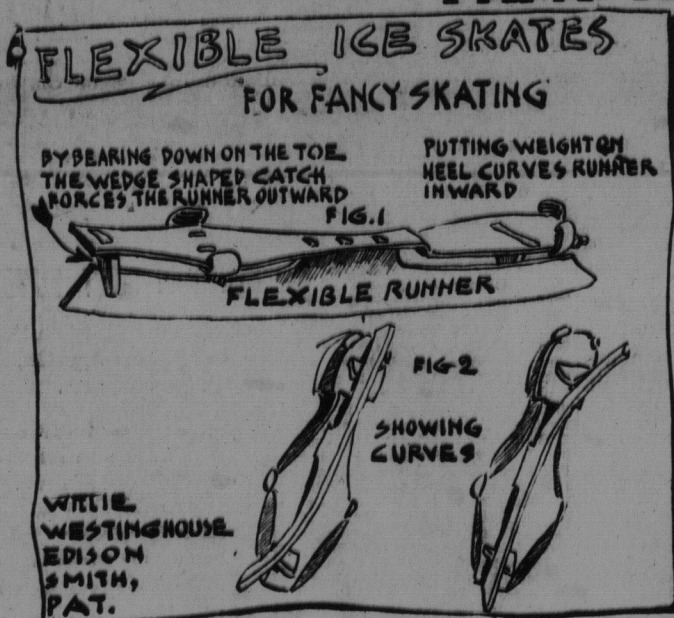

**Pipe Leaking.**

The police report that there is a bad leak in the water pipe at the corner of Carmarthen and Broad streets.

**Health Board Met.**

The regular monthly meeting of the board of health was held yesterday afternoon when only routine business was transacted.

**Traffic Delayed.**

A team belonging to the coopering firm of Taylor and White, broke down on Main street yesterday afternoon, when one of the wheels of the sloop caught in the car track and came off, the traffic being held up for half an hour.

**Pedestrians In Danger.**

Serjt. Campbell reports that a large quantity of rock and stones fell from a bank to the sidewalk on the corner of Elliott Row and Pitt street, yesterday afternoon and there is still a quantity of loose stone in the bank that is liable to fall and injure pedestrians.

**Will Meet Board.**

At the request of Hon. Geo. E. Foster, who will be a visitor in the city today, a meeting of the Board of Trade will be held in the afternoon, when it is understood the Minister will make an important intimation relative to his trade agreement with the West Indies and its probable effect upon the traffic through this port.

**Mattress Burned.**

About nine o'clock last evening a fire was discovered in a mattress in one of the bedrooms in the Dufferin Hotel. A still alarm was sent in to No. 1 chemical. The burning mattress was thrown into the hotel yard and the fire was extinguished by the chemical. The damage done was small.

**Publicity Committee Met.**

At a meeting of the exhibition publicity committee held at the office of Secretary H. A. Porter, yesterday afternoon, several plans were discussed, it being finally decided to have advertising matter placed in all the hotels and other public places in the different cities and towns of the Maritime Provinces.

**Horse Obstinate.**

There was an amusing incident on Union street yesterday afternoon about 4 o'clock. A truck horse became balky on the street car track and refused to move. A truck car with a number of passengers on board was unable to pass and after being stalled a short time the driver was placed against the tail of the sloop and the power turned on. The sloop and horse were shoved down the street and clear of the track by the time it reached Sydney street. A large crowd gathered and after numerous suggestions had been given to the driver some drug was procured at a drug store and poured into the horse's ears and then after a couple of shakes of his head, the animal started down Waterloo street.

**Women Fight.**

Elizabeth Coleman and Mrs. Foster were in the police court yesterday afternoon and laid information against Mrs. Nettie Niles on the charge of assault. The Coleman woman says that Mrs. Niles slapped her on the face and Mrs. Foster complained that the Niles woman assaulted her daughter. Mrs. Niles' husband was in court and informed the court that his wife was ill and could not appear in court but he would bring her to court this afternoon if he had to bring her in a coach. He was informed by the court that there was an old charge standing against his wife and she would probably have to account for the lot when she comes before the court this afternoon at 4 o'clock.

**Dill Coming Home.**

Fred Dill, the young man who was supposed to have been killed by an L. C. R. freight train last Wednesday evening and his remains interred on Sunday by his mother, will arrive home today from Montreal. It was not known by Mrs. Dill that the corpse was not that of her son until Saturday night after the remains had been taken to her home on Queen street, West End, and she received a telegram from Montreal that her son was there, hale and hearty. The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon from Mrs. Dill's residence, and on Monday morning it was learned that the body was that of John Hughes, of Prince Edward Island and the deceased's brother arrived in the city to claim it. The remains were taken from the grave and taken away by the brother.

**WILCOX HEARING IN POLICE COURT**

**Youthful Forger Remanded to Jail After Some Evidence is Heard - Adams Boy Allowed to Go.**

In the police court yesterday afternoon Douglas Adams, a boy charged with stealing goods amounting to \$75 from J. M. Roache and Co., was given some good advice by Magistrate Ritchie and allowed to go under suspended sentence.

George Wilcox, charged with forgery, was before the court. Fred Roach, secretary and treasurer for Brock and Paterson, Ltd., gave evidence that cheque issued by the prisoner and signed by Brock and Paterson, per J. M. Paterson, was not from the company and that there was no person in the firm by the name of J. M. Paterson.

John H. Bond, manager of the Dufferin Hotel, was called on and testified that the defendant registered at the hotel on April 18th and left there on April 29th, the day he was arrested. A draft for \$100 offered at the branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia on Charlotte street, on April 29th, and signed with the name of John H. Bond did not bear the signature of the witness and he had never signed a draft for the defendant.

Edward S. Crawford, manager of the Charlotte street branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia, testified that the defendant called at the bank on the afternoon of April 29th and requested that a draft on the Slater Shoe Company for \$50 be put through. The draft was signed with the name of John H. Bond and while witness was calling Mr. Bond up on the telephone to ascertain if he had signed the draft Wilcox departed from the bank and left the draft behind him.

Detective Killen gave evidence of having been summoned to the Royal Hotel on the evening of April 29th and found Wilcox closed in the office with Thomas Reynolds, a clerk. The latter informed the witness that Wilcox had passed a forged cheque on him and obtained \$20 on it. The cheque was signed Brock and Paterson, per J. M. Paterson. The detective said that he then placed Wilcox under arrest and when he searched the prisoner he found other cheques and drafts.

The prisoner was remanded to jail.

**PASS PLANS FOR MORE OF VALLEY RAILWAY**

**Meeting of Provincial Government Yesterday - A. B. Wilmot's Resignation Accepted - Will Enter Larger Sphere.**

The meeting of the Provincial Government was held here yesterday afternoon in the government rooms, Church street. Plans and profiles for a further 30 miles of the St. John Valley Railway were considered and passed.

The resignation of A. B. Wilmot, provincial superintendent of immigration, was accepted. Mr. Wilmot has taken the position of superintendent of immigration for New Brunswick under the Dominion government, and will make his headquarters at Fredericton. A. Bowler, who has charge of the immigration department in London, Eng., had an interview with the government. He will sail from Quebec on Friday. W. E. McMillen, Frederickton, was appointed acting deputy surveyor general during the absence of T. G. Loggie, who is leaving for a holiday in England.
