



What for many a long day had appeared to be but a dream, took definite form quite recently when a group of this city's most prominent colored women met at the home of Mrs. Joe Myers, Simioe St., and organized what is to be known as the Chrissie Char!es Sewing Guild.

This title is selected and adopted to honor the memory of Mrs. Chrissie Charles, a late departed member of the group, whose life had been marked by devotion to the highest ideals of womanhood.

These womes, looking beyond the interests of their own immediate environment, see the need for a service that will help care for the personal requirements of the city's colored people, have come forward with intelligent enthusiasm and encouraged in the knowledge of an understanding heart, that to live worthily is to live unselfishly, to meet helpfully the ever changing circumstances with which the stern reality of life confronts us all. HERO DROWNED, MEDAL

AWARDED TO HIS WIDOW Tallahassee, Florida, Nov.—In recognition of the heroism of the late Prof. Lynn P. Collins who lost his life last year in the attempt to save a woman from lrowning, a bronze medal has been awarded by the Carnegie Hero Fund Commission to his widow, a teacher at Florida A. and M. College, this city. This was one of four medals awarded to Floridians, out of a total of fifty-one awards made by the Commission at its recent meeting.

Prof. Collins, then a teacher at Bishop College, Marshall, Texas, lost his life at Iowa City on July 4th, 1928 in attempting to save Mrs. C. K. Reed from drowning in the Iowa Rivr. Overcome by her struggles, Collins was unable to make the shore and both went down.

New York, Dec.—The New York Times Wednesday in dispatches from Moscow, Russia tells of much sympathy being shown the "oppressed Negroes" of Haiti by the Russian newspapers. The report dated Dec. 10th stated:

Today's newspapers devote considerable front page space to the Haitian situation with characteristic headines about "American imperialmi" and the Soviet cartoonists was their wittiest at the expense of the United States.

I avida pictures an enormous Unce Sam swatting a tiny Negro on a table like a fly with the words "We let no one infringe on the Kellogg peace pact."

The cartoon's title is "Righteeus Wrain."

I vestia presents a cartoon of a bound Negro with a hand, above which waves the American flag, putting an automatic pistol at his head. The title of the cartoon is 'Stimson Varies His Note.'

Red Star, the army's paper, follows the same line but here a Negro bound to the mouth of cannon holds the Kellogg pact and looks repreachfully at Uncle Sam. The title is: "The Kellogg Pact Does Not Apply."
