The Farmer's Corner.

Interesting Boys in Farming.

Although most farmers profess to be anxious to attach their sons to a business of farming they adopt a course likely to make them dissatisfied with it. They seldom counsel with them about farm management or encourage them to be observing and skilful. Boys ordinarily have the poorest tools to work with; are given the most disagreeable if not the hardest labor to perform. They are left to pick up their knowledge by observation or experience. Most who take kindly to farming would read many books pertaining to agriculture and stock raising if they had the opportunity to do so. But as a rule, the books are not provided them. Farmers who are well advanced in life had few opportunities during their youth to learn much about agriculture, horticulture, or stock raising from books, for they were not then in existence. Improved stock was not then common, and there was small occasion to learn about the merits of the different breeds of cattle, horses, sheep, swine, and poultry. At present such knowledge is of the first importance and boys should be encouraged to acquire it. More information of this kind can be derived from books than from any other source available to most farm boys. Boys who are in earnest to become farmers wish also to read books devoted to improved farming and horticulture, but the chances are that they can not obtain them. They desire also to have specimens of new fruits, grasses, and grains to experiment with. Ordinarily boys who are anxious to become farmers wish to learn all the improved methods of farming, and to make experiments for themselves. It would be well if each of them had a plot of ground to cultivate in his own way, and an animal or two that he could call his own. Some farmers give a boy a pig, calf, or goat, but as soon as it becomes a hog, horse, or cow it is exchanged for a juvenile of the same species. The boy has the trouble of taking care of the animal while the man has the advantage of it. Of course the boy is discouraged at the prospect of ever having a mature animal of his own.

Boys like to assume some responsibilities early in life, and in the case of boys on a farm it is well to intrust them with the management of something. In most cases they will be faithful to their trust, and take pride in the matter that is given to them to look after and manage. Give a boy an orchard or garden to tend, and allow him the means to procure information respecting the kind of work required, and he will ordinarily make a success at it. The same is true of the care of bees, sheep, or poultry. Labor is never so cheaply performed when one is allowed to direct it himself. In no way one learns as much as by taking the entire charge of some branch of business. As a rule he will study the subject thoroughly and gain information from every source within his reach. The desire to excel and to gain credit for succeeding will be a most powerful stimulant. Nothing will attach boys to the farm as much as giving them something to manage for themselves.

But a boy has not mastered the trade of a farmer to its full extent till he has to sell and buy to good advantage. Experience is acquired to do these things judiciously. A farmer who was very successful in bringing up a large family of boys in the business in which he was engaged at tributed his success to the circumstances that he allowed his sons not only to raise the crops of stock necessary to provide their clothing and to keep them in spending money, but he intrusted them with the sale of the things they raised, and the purchase of the articles they required. They made some mistakes at first but they soon learned how to trade to good advantage. The boys knowing they had to look to the land, pigs and sheep intrusted to them for their supply of clothing and other comforts, gave them the best possible attention. In so doing they learned how to make the most out of the land they tilled and the stock they raised. Then they watched the produce market and the price list of articles they wished to purchase. Self interest, pride, and the desire for approbation caused them to put forth unusual exertions, and in some cases they came out ahead of their father, not only in raising crops and stock but in disposing of them and laying out the money to good advantage. These boys became attached to farming, and were successful in everything that pertained to husbandry and the commerce of a farm.

The Press says that the Woodstock Battery of Artillery, commanded by Capt. H. Dibb, was to finish its annual drill at "Camp Stranger" on Saturday. The corps is said to be an efficient one. The meeting this year has evidently been a very pleasant one. The companies composing the 47th Batt. have also been performing their annual drill.

HANLAN SINKS HIS BOAT.—We are informed that Hanlan, while practicing this morning on the Kennebec, and keeping close to the shore struck on a rock, breaking a hole in his Elliott boat (the Col. S. Hanlan) 12 inches long. It is supposed the boat can be repaired.—Globe 13th.
