

The farmer's Corner.

Interesting Boys in Farming.

Although most farmers profess to

business of farming they adopt a course likely to make them dissatisfied with it. They seldom counsel with them about farm management or encourage them to be observing and skilful. Boys ordinarily have the poorest tools to work with; are given the most disagreeable if not the hardest labor to perform. They are left to pick up their knowledge by observation or experience. Most who take kindly to farming would read many books pertaining to agriculture and stock raising if they had the opportunity to do so. But as a rule, English and Canadian Tweeds the books are not provided them. Farmers who are well advanced in life had few opportunities during sll of the Newest Patterns and just the thing their youth to learn much about agriculture, horticulture, or stock raising from books, for they were not then in existence. Improved stock was not then common, and there was small occasion to learn about the merits of the different breeds of cattle, horses, sheep, swine, and poultry. At present such knowledge is of the at reasonable rates. first importance and boys should be encouraged to acquire it. More information of this kind can be derived from books than from any other source available to most farm boys. Boys who are in earnest to be-

come farmers wish also to read books devoted to improved farming and horticulture, but the chances are that they can not obtain them. Tie, desire also to have specimens of new fruits, grasses, and grains to experiment with. Ordinarily boys who learn all the improved methods of farming, and to make experiments for themselves. It would be well if each of them had a plot of ground to cultivate in his own way, and an animal or two that he could call his own. Some farmers give a boy a pig, calf, or colt, but as soon as it, becomes a hog, horse, or cow it is exchanged for a juvenile of the same species. The boy has the trouble of taking the advantage of it. Of course the boy is discouraged at the prospect of ever having a mature animal of his own.

In no way one learns as much as by taking the entire charge of some branch of business. As a rule he will study the subject thoroughly and gain information from every source within bis reach. The desire to excel and to most powerful stimulant. Nothing will attach boys to the farm as much as giving them something to manage for themselves.

But a boy has not mastered the trade of a farmer to its full extent till he has to sell and buy to good advantage. Experience is acquired to do these things judiciously. Self interest, pride, and the desire for approbation caused them to put forth unusual exertions, and in some cases they came out ahead of their father, not only in raising crops and stock but in disposing of them and laying out the money to good advantage. These boys became attached to farming, and were successful in everything that pertained to husbandry and the commerce of a farm.
