





# PROTECTION OF CHRISTIANS

In View of the Unanimity of the Nations It Is Expected Turkey Will Yield.

Paris, Feb. 20.-The Russian Foreign Minister, Count Lamsdorf, has communicated to the French Government the fact that Russia received on Wednesday the last of the adherences of the European powers to the joint note to Turkey on the subject of reforms, thus making the actions of the powers unanimous. He accordingly directed M. Zinovief, Russian ambassador at Constantinople, to proceed in company with Baron Van Galice, the Austrian ambassador, to the Sultan and present the joint note yesterday. It was at first intended to present the Austrian note first, but this was reconsidered in order to give added force to the joint personal representation. It also was desired to secure the full adherence of Germany, which was somewhat conditional at first. The unanimous action decided upon includes that of Germany.

The note as finally framed strikes out all references to Macedonia, as it was considered that the designation of one part of the country by name would in-crease the anti-foreign agitation which

We protest in advance against the proposal that power should be delivered to all municipalities at the one rate. That is the Toronto idea. London naturally indorses it. It is, of course, in the interest of Toronto and London and other cities at a considerable distance from the source of supply, to fix matters so that places much nearer to the source of supply shall enjoy no advantage from their situation. Therefore it is not surprising to find, in the report of the committee appointed to prepare a report on the power question, the following expression of opinion:

"In case of municipalities so-operating in such work, it would be necessary to devise means whereby the interests of the various municipalities would be protected, the rate for power kept uniform in the several municipalities and a scale of rates maintained which would prevent any municipality from cutting

rates as against any other.' It is not surprising that the committee so reported, because all three members of the committee represent municipalities situated at a consid erable distance from Niagara Falls, and one of them is the wily Alderman F. S. Spence, of Toronto.

The one-rate proposal should be strenuously opposed by every municipality in the Niagara peninsula. It is unjust and absurd. If Niagara power is to be delivered by the Government to Toronto and London at a rate as low as it is delivered to St. Catharines and Hamilton, why not to Kingston and Windsor at the

INSECT LIFE.

Mr. C. W. Nash was the first to speak. His address on "Insect Life" brought a vital question before the farmers, who thoroughly appreciated the excellent advice given. He dealt chiefly with the "pea weevil," its in-roads on crops and the best means for its extermination. In order to keep it down, he recommended that the pea crop be threshed immediately after it was harvested and that the peas to be used for feeding purposes be chopped up at the same time. The danger of the meal thus obtained becoming heated through the excessive moisture could be remedied by mixing a quantitiy of dry bran in the pea bin. This would absorb the moisture. If farmers wished to keep the peas whole they should be placed in a barrel or tight bin and a plate or other receptacle containing bi-sulphate of carbon, at the rate of two ounces to every 100 pounds of peas, put on top of them. The gas coming from this remedy would prevent or ex-terminate any weevils. This process should last about 48 hours and should always be done in the open air. The bi-sulphate, the speaker said, was very explosive and was in many



How the Fast of Forty Days Started.

Obscrved Since Fourth Century in All

Countries.

As the Lenten season is approaching, proper observance by the church, and when the first day of it is here, that is, next Wednesday, which is Ash Wednesday, special services will be held to man and Episcopal churches.

There has been much controversy over the season of Lent, and there is still much doubt as to the original meaning of the term and what it meant to the church. The word comes from the Anglo-Saxon "lencten," meaning spring. In the Latin church it is called jejunium quadragesimal, "the fast of forty days." Roman Catholic theologians and many Protestants maintain tonic origin, but the greater number of Protestants consider it to be of ecclesiastical origin. The common opinion is and prayer. Gregory the Great in 590, directed that the Quadragesimal feast should begin on the sixth Sunday before Easter, and that all the intervening weekdays should be fast days. As this, how-ever, only gave 36 such days, the last four days of the preceding week were added either by that Pope or by Gregory II. (715), the solemn fast thus beginning on Ash-Wednesday, which thenceforward was called caput jejuunii, "the beginning of the fast.






