Eighty Men Suffocated, the Result of an Explosion.

RIMOUSKI, Que., Aug. 31.—The steamship Vancouver, of the Dominion Line, reached here early this morning after an exceedingly stormy and exciting voyage. She sailed from Liverpool at midnight Thursday, Aug. 21, with nearly 600 rassengers on board, many of whom belonged to various parts of Ontario. Very soon after leaving Moville on Friday evening she encountered a strong head wind and heavy sea, which continued with increasing force till Monday morning, when the wind blew a furious gale. Tons of water dashed over the main deck, fore and aft, and many passengers were drenched and a few were thrown off their feet and dashed against the bulwarks by the water that flooded the decks and poured down the stairway to the saloon.

The Tariff Debate.

New York, Sept. 1.—The Times' Washington dispatch says: As the debate on the lariff bill will close this week, the Senate must decide very soon what it will do with the proposal to attach a reciprocity scheme to that measure. The power to be vested in the President is far greater than has ever yet been given to the chief executive. Mr. Evarts is reported to be carnestly opposed to the committee's plan, because he believes Congress can not so delegate its own powers to the President, and because, if it can, it is too much power to put in the hands of any one man, even if he be a Republican President. That is one point made painfully clear by the experts who have given evidence before the Ontario Commission. Keep the boys at work.

IMPORTANT SCHOOL QUESTIONS.
London is not the only city where important public school issues have been under discussion. In Columbus, Ohio, the Board of Education has just decided that hereafter there shall be no difference in the salaries paid to men and women who are teachers in the public schools. This is but justice, if the women perform their duties as well as the men. The inconsistency of putting a premium upon sex has too long been tolerated.

Less fair are the school managers of Cincinnati, where it has been resolved to drop married women from the teachers. Why should the circumstance of a woman's marriage debar her from seeking and obtaining honorable employment? There Why should the circumstance of a woman's marriage debar her from secking and obtaining honorable employment? There can be no honest reply to the question.

A woman who is married does not seek employment from any mere selfish motive, but from the necessities of her family. Sometimes she is driven to work outside her household because of her husband's inability to work on account sickness. In other cases, one is sorry to observe, her husband is an idler who cares so little for his wife that he fails to support her. If, in either circumstance, she faces the situation with a spirit that does her credit and seeks employment as a teacher, she surely deserves to be treated with fairness. 
