COMMONS CLOSES; NO VOTING DATE FIXED BY GOVT; **GUTHRIE SWORN**

Dominion Parliament Dissolved This Afternoon, As From Saturday—Premier Says No Election Date Yet, But Polling Likely Ir January—Guthrie Becomes Solicitor General.

Ottawa, Oct. 4.—At 1 o'clock today a proclamation was issued dissolving Parliament as from Saturday. Announcement of dissolution was made to a Canadian Press representative by the prime minister. No date, the prime minister stated, had been fixed for the election. This will be decided later, although it is unlikely that the election date will be before January.

GUTHRIE SWORN IN.

There was a further addition to the Cabinet this morning in Hugh Guthrie, Liberal member for South Wellington. Mr. Guthrie takes the portfolio of solicitor-general, held by Hon. Arthur Meighen up to the present time. Mr. Meighen retains his portfolio as secretary of state. Mr. Guthrie was sworn in shortly before 1 o'clock.

MYSTERIOUS MACHINE CAN USE FREE ENERGY

Tests of Wonderful Discovery To Be Made by U. S.

Washington, Oct. 4.—The House bill providing for tests of a mysterious machine for utilizing free energy, devised by Garabed T. K. Giragossian, an Armenian inventor, from Boston, went to the Senate today and congressmen, enthusiastic over the war possibilities of the machine, planned a drive for immediate action.

Giragostian so impressed five members of the House patents committee at a secret demonstration that they recommended passage of the bill to provide for a demonstration before a board of five scientists and the secretary of the inferior as a preliminary to the Government buying the rights to use the device.

U.S. Investigato Discovers That Anti-British Publisher Was Close "Social" Intimate of Von Papen, Boy-Ed and Bolo Pasha, Exposed Agents of Kaiser In America.

New York, Oct. 4.—The investigation of State Attorney-General Merton E. Wise into the activities here of Bolo Pasha, under arrest in France, disclosed that William Randolph Hearst, the newspaper publisher, attended a dinner given in this city by Bolo, in March, 1916, according to the attorney-general.

There were present at this dinner, Mr. Lewis told newspapermen, Adolph Pavendosft, who figured as an intermediary for the transfer of German funds into New York banks to be sent to Paris for peace propagands among French newspapers, Capt. Boy-Ed and von Papen, naval and military attaches of the German embassy, and Jules Bois, a French lecturer, who, it was revealed, received money from Bolo Pasha.

U. S. WAR TAX REACHES ALL

Washington, Oct. 4.—The new war taxes, designed to raise two and a half billion dollars under the provisions of the revenue bill signed late yesterday by Presi-dent Wilson, went into effect to-day. dent Wilson, went into effect today.

BRITISH DRIVE A MILE DEEP AND OVERRUN FOE'S HEIGHTS: **BOCHES SURRENDER IN FLOCKS**

GERMAN COMMANDERS Haig's Men Advanced Again Early This PLEAD WITH WORKERS TO SUPPLY MATERIAL

Conference at Enemy's Main Army Headquarters.

FOE IS SHORT OF NICKEL

Probably Not Now Able To Keep Pace With Entente Production.

Amsterdam, Oct. 4.-Fears that Germany might possibly be unable to continue fighting owing to the lack of raw material have been answered by Major-Gen. Schuech, the new minister of munitions, who, according to a dispatch from Berlin,

cording to a dispatch from Berlin, says:

"Regarding the supply of raw materials, particularly those required for the manufacture of guns and munitions, we are not dependent solely on the stock in hand, which, moreover, would be insufficient. We have to produce them, and this production is preceeding satisfactorily."

Gen. Schuech admitted that production was interrupted temporarily last year, because of transport difficulties. Although these seem to have been overcome, the minister of munitions expects a probable recurrence the coming wister.

Copenhagen, Oct 4.—Leaders of various groups of German labor were received at main army neadquarters this week not for the purpose of congratulating Field Marshal von Hindenburg on his birthday, as first was intimated, but in an effort to have German workmen speed up the production of munitions. Complaints of the labor classes dealing with the operation of compulsory labor service law were made. A lengthy conference was devoted to discussing the possible improvement of the conditions of labor and the maintenance of the output of munitions, which General von Ludendorf, quartermaster general, de-

Morning East of Ypres, Rolling Germans Back For Mile At Some Points and Carrying Much Valued Crests-Steady Stream of Prisoners Already Started Back-British Commander Reports Satisfactory Progress.

London, Oct. 4.—Field Marshal Haig has begun a new offensive east of Ypres. The official statement from British headquarters, issued today, says that the British attacked at 6 o'clock this morning on a wide front, and are making satisfactory progress. A number of prisoners already have been taken.

DRIVE FOR OVER MILE.

British Front in France and Belgium, Oct. 4—(By Associated Press).—Field Marshal Haig's forces in the offensive begun to the east of Ypres this morning, in some places have penetrated the German lines to a depth of one mile and have overrun the crest of the Passchendaele-Gheluvelt Ridge.

At an early hour the Germans were surrendering by hundreds. Further to the south, Cameron Covert, where there

had been much hard ghting, was left well in the rear. Today's battle was along strongholds which comprised the crucially important system of German defences along the Passchendaele-Gheluvelt Ridge.

REACH THE CROSS ROADS.

British Headquarters in France and Belgium, Oct. 4. -The British already have penetrated well beyond the hamlet of Broodseinde, in which lie the crossroads formed by the highways between Zennebeke and Moorsled and Passchendaele and Beclaire.

GETS FOOTING ON RIDGE.

British Headquarters in France and Belgium, Oct. 4. -The northern wing of the onrushing British troops was battling forward this morning within a short distance of Poelcappele. It had a footing on the famous Gravenstafel Ridge, which juts out from the Passchendaele Ridge, to the west, and had crushed through the Zonnebeke-Broodseinde Ridge, which is an integral part of the Passchendaele-Gheluvelt chain.

BROODSEINDE CAPTURED.

American Markets Benefit, Say Dealers, From Canadian Prohibition.







Announcement Is Made From Ottawa of Drastic Action Contemplated by Canadian Government Official-Coal Consumers Will Be Safeguarded During Coming Winter, But Half-Baked London Scheme Must Be Voted Down.

Need for the establishment of a municipal coal yard-if, indeed there has ever been any-passed yesterday with the official announcement made for the benefit of Londoners by the office of the Canadian Fuel Controller at Ottawa that immediate steps are contemplated for the fixing of maximum profits, and to provide completely adequate protection for coal consumers from private profiteers.

The telegram which came to London over the signature of Mr. C. W. Peterson, the deputy fuel controller, acting in the absence of his chief, Mr. C. A. Magrath, is as follows:

OTTAWA, Oct. 3, 1917.

"Regulations are now under consideration fixing maximum profits for brokers, wholesalers and retail dealers in coal, and machinery for enforcing such provisions is being provided. THESE PROFITS WILL BE ON A REASONABLY LOW BASIS.

"The Fuel Controller can assure the people of London fair treatment at the hands of the dealers, and the only justification for municipal coal yard would apparently be any economy in handling that could be effected. C. W. PETERSON." '(Signed)

Thus the people without the expenditure of one cent on the part of either property owner or other domestic consumer, are furnished with adequate protection from the difficulties that have beset the householder with mounting war costs. The fuel conroller exercising the complete power vested in him under the War Measures Act will see that definitely fixed and "reasonably low" profits alone are exacted by those who handle the coal between the mine and the consumer.

"If authorized by the Parliament of Canada the governor-in-council may, on such terms and conditions (if any) as Parliament may prescribe, at any time while any event of default may exist, and be continuing, by order declare the equity of redemption of the Canadian Northern and of all persons whomsoever in the mortgaged premises to be foreclosed, and thereupon the equity of redemption of the Canadian Northern (and of such other persons) in the martgaged premises, and every part thereof, shall be and become absolutely barred and foreclosed, and the same shall thereupon be vested in His Majesty, in the right of the Dominion of Canada, any statutory enactment or any rule of law or equity to the contrary notwithstanding."





New York, Oct. 4.—Are the Giants handicapped by opening the world's series in Chicago, the field of their opponents? One might be prompted, to think so, as it would be natural to assume that the team playing on its own grounds before a friendly crowd would have the advantage, says the Sun.

Often one hears fans in discussing the series say: "Too bad the Giants open in Chicago. I think they would have a much better chance if they started in the Polo Grounds."

Men who bet on baseball seem to take the same view. Before President Hempstead of the New York Club lost the toss on the first game poolroom men were offering six to five on the Giants if the series opened in New York, and even money if the series started in Chicago.

Are Giants Handicapped?

But answering that opening question are the Giants really handicapped by opening in Comiskey Park? World's series history indicates that the home team has no advantage over the visitors. PATRIOTIC FUND

Estimated Revenue Required for 1912 Will Be Twelve

Ottawa, Oct. 3.—The regular quarterly meeting of the national executive of the Canadian patriotic fund was held this morning. His excellency the governor-general presided.

A discussion took place amongst the members as to the best methods to be adopted to secure revenue for the fund for the coming year, should the war last until the end of 1918. Although there was a wide divergency of opinion, the general tendency was for the continuation of the voluntary subscription, many of those present expressing themselves as being opposed to discontinuing the voluntary system, which in the past had shown such magnificent results. It was finally decided to leave the question in the hands of a special committee composed of Sir Wm. Mulock, Sir Henry Egan, Lord Shaughnessy. Hon. MacKenzie King, Cyrus A. Birge of Hamilton and Sir Herbert Ames, M. P. This committee will study the question and will report back to the national executive at a further meeting to be held on October 26.

The estimated revenue required for 1913 will be \$12,000,000. The report submitted by the treasurer showed that up to the last day of September a total of \$23,939,635.27 has been paid into the fund. Sir Herbert Ames remarked that if the books had kept open two days later the \$30,000,000 mark would have been passed.

Practical Housekeeping Hints

HOW TO BUY

Go to the store yourself. Select for yourself the article you desire to purchase. Inquire its price.

If quality and price please you, be sure that you get in weight or measure the amount you buy. Watch the scale. Watch the measure.

You are entitled to all the bone and the trim mings of the piece of meat that you buy. You should take home and make use of such bone and trimmings. The fat can be rendered and used for cooking purposes; the bone and trimmings use soup or stew. When the trimmings are not taken home, the butcher throws them into a box under the counter and sells them to someone else. They belong to you and you should have them.

In buying meat, don't go in and ask for 25c. worth of meat, and leave the butcher to decide how

much meat you should have for a quarter. Select your piece of meat, ask the price per pound; say how many pounds you want; have it weighed; see that you get your weight and that the butcher's calculation as to how much meat you have, at a certain price per pound, is correct. Many a penny is lost to the customer by neglecting the above simple

Don't buy in small quantities if you can possibly avoid it. Buy for cash and buy in large quantities foods that are not perishable. Buy where you can do the best.

Wherever possible buy in bulk and not in package. You will find it cheaper to buy your vinegar by the gallon than by the bottle.

Have you ever stopped to figure out how much more you would get for your money if you bought certain articles of food by the pound instead of by the package?

Food that is wrapped and sold in attractive-looking packages must of necessity cost more than the same food sold in bulk, which means sold by the pound. There are several reasons why so many foods are put up in packages.

First. The package looks pretty, appeals to the eye, and makes the food seem more appetizing.

Second. Most of the packages are air-tight and dustproof, and for sanitary reasons a great many people prefer food that is done up in packages.

As a matter of fact, it is possible for your grocer to keep on hand, in bulk, exactly the same foods as the packages contain, and it is also possible for him to keep them in bulk in sanitary, dustproof containers, so that the foods should be clean when they




