**ENGLISH LANGUAGE ONLY TO BE TAUGHT** IN SASKATCHEWAN

Provincial Parliament Passes Amendments to School Act.

Regina, Sask., Jan. 11.-Final reading and passage of the Government amendments to the school act, including the "Paravenes" Render language clause of the bill, was the first act of the Saskatchewan Assembly after the Christmas vacation. The language clause provides that English shall be the sole language of instruction in the public schools of the province, and that no language other than English shall be taught during school hours, except that French may be used as the language of instruction for children up to and including Grade 1, but not beyond the first year of a child's attendance at school, and that French may be taught as a subject of French may be taught as a subject of study for one hour a day where the hoard of any district passes a resolu-tion to that effect.

Donald McLean, leader of the Opposition, called for a division after presenting an amendment to provide for English as the sole language as a subject of study. The amendment was lost, only seven voting in its favor, and the bill was given its third reading and will come into effect on May 1.

## KARL LIEBKNECHT REPORTED KILLED IN STREET FIGHT

Spartacan Leader Is Said To Have Been Slain Thursday Evening.

London, Jan. H .- Dr. Karl Liebknecht, the Spartacan leader in Germany, was killed during street fighting on Thursday evening, according to a Copenhagen dispatch to the Exchange

NO CONFIRMATION OF DEATH OF LIEBKNECHT

London, Jan. 11.—Several dispatches from the Associated Press correspondents in Berlin filed on Friday, up to 3 o'clock in the afternoon, and received here this morning, contained no mention of the reported death of Dr. Leibknecht. The dispatches, in fact, do not refer to happenings in Berlin, but deal with events in the provinces or with press comment. Nothing definite is known here as to what Friday's developments in Berlin really were.

Delayed Amsterdam advices, dated Thursday, contain reports of further Delayed Amsterdam advices, dated Thursday, contain reports of further activity by the Spartacans in the Rhine towns. They apparently control Dusseldorf, where several prominent persons were arrested while many others only escaped arrest by crossing the Rhine. The Muenster Anzeiger reports that the Spartacans stormed the prison in Muenster and set free 170 criminals. At Mulheim, during a big demonstration of strikers on Wednesday the strikers seized all newspaper buildings and issued the general Anzeiger, the next morning, as the Red Flag, designating it as the organ of the revolutionary workers of Mulheim. They forbade the issuance of all the other newspapers.

## Putting Efficiency into Repatriation

HE Repatriation Committee has been formed by the Dominion Government to bring Canada forward to a peace basis with all speed.

It will use the existing machinery and any ne essary new machinery.

The Committee consists of Hon. Sir James Lougheed, Minister of Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment; Hon. N. W. Rowell, President of the Privy Council; Hon. T. A. Crerar, Minister of Agriculture; Hon. G. D. Robertson, Minister of Labor; Hon. Arthur Meighen, Minister of the Interior; Hon. J. A. Calder, Minister of Immigration (Chairman). To assist them, Mr. H. J. Daly has been appointed Director of Repatriation.

This Committee is formed to coordinate the work of all those departments of the Government which have to do with the task of bringing back our soldiers to civil life, caring for them and their dependents, providing employment opportunities for soldiers and war-workers, and assuring proper living and working conditions. It also assists the efforts of all organizations and agencies prepared to give aid in the solution of our problems.

THE Committee surveys all plans. It prevents overlapping and confusion. It secures expert assistance. It obtains more speedy action, more effective co-operation. While its first consideration is the welfare of the Canadian soldier, its scope embraces the whole community.

The Committee has built up a Repatriation Organization to supplement the work of the existing departments of the Government.

The Committee has secured experts on each problem-military. employment, social, housing, farming, transportation, medical. Nothing is neglected. It invites representatives from all organizations which have interested themselves in the social and economic welfare of the country and the needs of our soldiers.

Co-operating with the Repatriation Committee is an Advisory Committee appointed by the Great War Veterans' Association.

With the assistance of these agencies the solution of the problem is presented to The Repatriation Committee in a practicable form.

The plans devised to meet every problem as it arises will be reported to you in the coming announce-

Both Women and Men Vote On Same Grounds Exactly

"The power of the franchise" is a phrase which has been traveling from lip to lip for sometime past, especially among women who have but lately attained And along with this talk goes & shameful ignorance on the part of many as to the grounds on which they are given a vote, and the supreme necessity of having their names appear on the voters' lists. A hasty appearance at the polls on election day will gain nothing, no matter how hard the individual may have worked for, and enthused over that particular election, if at the same time her name fails to be written upon the voters' list.

Perhaps a frank statement telling just who is permitted to have a vote and on what grounds, will help to clear up difficulties and make matters much easier on the next election day, whether it be municipal, provincial or Dominion.

As the war-times election act stands today, every man of 21 years of age, every soldier, and every woman who is either a mother, wife or sister of a soldier, is qualified to vote in a Dominion election. By the next election, however, the war-times act will no longer be valid, and it is almost certain that every man and woman who has attained the age of 21 years, and is a British subject, will be entitled to the vote.

Equal franchise has now been granted by the Provincial Government and for the next Provincial election every man and woman of 21 years of age and over, who is at the same time a British subject, will be permitted to cast a vote.

The municipal elections are much more complicated, and consequently there is greater risk of names not appearing on the voters' list through ignorance. For the municipal elections the suffrage is also equal. What stands for a man, remains the same for a woman. Property owners to the amount of \$400 are assessed, and consequently receive a vote. If husband and wife are joint owners of property to the amount of \$800, each has a vote. Tenants letting property valued at \$400 may vote. If husband and wife are joint tenants of property valued at \$800, each has a vote. Every person, man or woman, receiving a salary of at least \$1,000 is assessed for \$400 of that amount, and consequently has a vote. There is a \$600 salary exemption. Householders are exempted to the

Men of 21 years of age, receiving less than \$1,000 salary, who neither own nor rent property to the amount of \$400, do not have a vote in the municipal elections, as some women ignorantly have thought. Both women and men vote n exactly the same capacity,
