

Yuan looked hale and hearty, his appearance belying the recent reports of his physical condition, which had been made an excuse for his delay in obeying the imperial command to come to Peking and assume the responsibilities of Premier, in succession to Prince Ching, which appointment was promulgated in an imperial edict of Nov. 1.

Foster, minister of rade and commerce, is taking. It is understood that Mr. Foster has determined upon a commercial policy, par between Canada and British countries throughout the world, as an offset to the possible check upon ommerce which the refusal of reciwith the United States may produce. The West Indies and Australia are the possessions which he hopes to be able to first influence. Canada is now granting preferential customs treatment to the West Indies. The trade between Canada and the southern islands was investigated two

Radcliffe, of the London Normal School, given before the Young People's Guild of the First Presbyter. ian Church last evening. The purp of the poet, said the speaker, is to present in concrete pictures the imagery of the various senses. Taking Gray's "Elegy Written in a Country yard" as an example, Mr. Radcliffe pointed out in the poem the imagery what Gray saw and heard and felt Keat's "Ode to a Nightingale" was another example taken, a poem which was characterized as the finest expression of the sense of taste, so perfect and beatutiful was Keat's imagery owhat he felt through the senses of taste, so perfect when the felt through the senses of taste or the sense or the sense or the sense or taste or the sense or taste or the sense or taste o

what he felt through the senses of sound and taste.

The sadness of the poem is derived from the imagery of Keat's knowledge that he was doomed to early death through the ravages of consumption.
