London, Jan. 12.—Professor Hans Delbrueck of the University of Berlin, says that nobody in Germany wishes to annex Belgium. He is quoted as saying: "It would be impossible to put German garrisons in Belgium in peace time since the troops would not be able even to pass in the streets safely unless the police and administration of justice were also taken over. This would amount to placing Belgium under perpetual military law, which is impossible. There is no middle course between incorporating Belgium in the German Empire, which nobody wants, and evacuating it."

CAUSE SEEMS ACCIDENTAL. New York, Jan. 12 .- Investigation today by New Jersey and New York police authorities of the explosion and fire in the Kingsland, N. J., plant of the Canadian Car and Foundry Company disclosed nothing to indicate that the origin was other than accidental, it was announced Police Investigators indicated that the fire started when a spark fell upon a table ignited with an inflammable fluid, with the spread of the blaze increasing when a workman attempted with water to extinguish it.

The property loss is estimated at between \$4,000,000 and \$5,000,000. This includes loss of shells, the destruction of the munition plant and damage to homes and other buildings in Kingsland. It is expected there will be considerable salvage on account of the fallure of thousands of shells to explode. Fire burned briskly in the company's works all day, and it may be another 48 hours before the main buildings can be entered. Early reports of loss of life have not been confirmed.

#### BELIEVES KEEPING HENS PAYS.

Dear Miss Armstrong,-I was much interested in a letter over the signal of "Ordinary Person," which appeared in your column two weeks ago. I agree with the writer that it would be much more interesting and immensely more selpful if lecturers on such important topics as poultry-raising and gardening would give their actual experience. The actual figures, as "Ordinary Person says. Something more practical and less theoretical would help us more. Theory alone never raised a brood of chicks, nor planted a garden. We have to get right down to the hard facts to make things go. With regard to raising fowl, until within the last two years we have always had our own fowl. We were not practical enough to keep a strictly accurate account, but I do not think we were ever out of pocket. When the hens were laying we certainly thought that the pleasure of eating strictly fresh eggs repaid us, or rather my husband, for his trouble. He experimented with several different kinds of fowl, but found that for an all-round purpose hen the Barred Rock is best. The Brown Leghorn. are good layers, but we had to bar them out on account of their flying propensities. They are veritable aeroplanes. The Buff Orpingtons, on the other and, are terrible "setters." They set and set, and continue to set. "Tis true, they lay well in the winter, but farewell to eggs the minute the warm weather comes. The Barred Rocks lay well, and are fine table birds, but like "Ordinary Person," I hate siaghtering time—it is a far from interesting process.

I, too, feel that I should like to try again. In fact, so convinced am I that I could make it a paying business that I have threatened—much to the disgust

of other members of the family—to start an incubator in an unused room of the basement. Why not? Would not that be thrift?
With regard to gardening. I know that it pays. To say nothing of the monetary value, there is nothing more ennobling than the study of the growth of plants, be they flowers or vegetables. When we look at the tiny seed and then

at the wonderful results, how can we help being reminded of the power that directs the wonderful processes of nature. With apologies, PRACTICAL WOMAN. P.S.-I trust the "Consumers' League" will tell us where to buy strictly fresh fertile eggs for stock purposes, as suggested by "Ordinary Person."

Miss Milian Nicholson, the poultry expert, whose deep interest in the welfare of Our Consumers' League Department is manifested by frequent contributions, has sent the following New Year's greeting to her readers, and also timely advice for feeding of poultry in cold weather:

It is a pleasure to have this opportunity of wishing a happy New Year to my readers in London. Again we have closed the door of the old and stepped into a new year. May our hearts have peace, and a consciousness of duty done. But after all, what has this to do with hens? Quite a lot. Believe me, the birds that are this winter being badly housed, badly fed and cared for, are not the parent stock of strong healthy chicks, or heavy producers for next winter. Remember when feeding your flock that they need food for life, food for heat, and food for egg production. Many people fall because they feed too much, and yet not enough. Most likely you will say, "That's Pat's way of putting it." But it's true just the same. If you feed your flock enough to keep them alive and warm, and a little over, the little over will go to make fat, and soon yo birds will be so fat they will hardly be able to move. A nice hot mash is good this cold weather. Boil all left pieces, potato peelings, etc., and while still hot mix until quite crumbly. The mash mixtures I described when in London should be fed in dishes or troughs, which can be made very much like a drain spout, with two pieces of wood nailed sideways. This is best fed at night, with a good feed of grain fed in the litter after. Do not forget green feed anything but cabbage. We do not like cabbage in the cold weather. A little grain should be on the floor for the fowls to get first thing each morning.
