At the present time the Dominion secures bananas, for instance, through the New York fruit exchange, at prices much above the cost at the point of production. On the other hand, there is little direct traffic in flour from Canada to the Indies. The same applies pretty well to copra and the products thereof, and to other commodities of the islands.

He thought that a committee of council members, such has had been formed, might act as a board of arbitration between the company and the people. The flat service charge of 85 cents is unfair to the smaller consumer, he said. Arrangements might be made to vary the charge so that the larger consumers would pay a more equitable share of it. Ald. Watkinson said it was an unfair proposition altogether, and that if the citizens did what he did they would not pay the charge.

Plumbing Bylaw.

The revised plumbing bylaw was adopted. Its provisions will not become effective until it has been approved by the provincial board of health and the local board of health. Ottawa, June 22.—Sir Robert Borden announced at the close of the Government caucus today that two Government proposals under discussion were wheat control and aid to shipbuilding, under authority to the minister of finance to indorse promissory notes of purchasers. 





#### FIRST RED CROSS OUTPOST HOSPITAL BUILT IN CANADA

Will Provide Medical Aid for 800 Settlers in Saskatchewan.

PRINCE ALBERT, Sask., June 21.1-The first Red Cross outpost hospital in Canada is being erected in the Paddockwood region jointly by the people of the district, the Red Cross and the businessmen of this city.

This district, embracing 30,000 square miles, holds about 800 settlers, 350 of whom are married. They have all been from twenty or fifty miles from the nearest doctor or hospital, which at times has created a serious condition. Regarded as one of the richest mixed farming countries in the Dominion, this region along the Canadian National Railways is attracting many settlers, especially soldiers, and the only drawback has been the lack of adjacent medical attention for sickness or accident.



OTTAWA, June 21.—(By Canadian Press.)—In answer to a question by Hon. The solicitor-general also moved that the preceding clause be amended to provide that in the taking of a referendum under the Canada temperance act the chief election officer be given power to say what part of the machinery under the proposed act shall apply, and also to provide that the voters' list used in the Ontario provincial election in October, 1919, shall be accepted, without revision, as the basis of lists for a temperance referendum in that province. The Ontario referendum is to be taken this fall.

Is Not Necessary.

The minister explained that much of the machinery provided under the new act was not necessary for a simple temperance referendum, and the chief election officer was therefore given power to dispense with the use

chief election officer was therefore given power to dispense with the use of that unnecessary machinery. His decision, however, on that point must be published in the Canada Gazette four weeks before the date of voting. The amendment carried.

To Mr. Jacques Bureau, the minister explained that he had no objection to amending section 32 to provide that lists two years old should be accepted as the basis of voters' lists under the new act. This was because in certain sections of the country voters' lists were revised only every second year.

There was no discussion on the amendment to give the chief electoral officer the power to fix scales of pay for returning officers and election officials. The scales of pay, about five in number, would not necessarily be permanent.







(3) One registrar is appointed in places of from 3,000 to 4,000 population with an additional registrar for each 4,000 more of population.

(4) Advanced polls to apply only to railway employees, sailors and commercial traveloct traveloct traveloct traveloct property in the property of the property traveloct.

(5) Elector disfranchished under provincial statute by reason of race or color entitled to vote in Dominion elec-tions if he served in the Canadian

Mr. Guthrie agreed to an amendment by Mr. King to strike out the clause giving the chief electoral officer power to make new lists for by-elections where he saw fit. Mr. King said the clause as it stood was still far from satisfactory. J. H. Sinclair (Guysboro), said this would be the third attempt of the Conwould be the third attempt of the Conservative party to win an election by means of partisan machinery. The clauses respecting lists settled the partisan character of the bill. The government was building a stone-wall to knock its head against later, The clause carried on division.

Progress was then reported, and second reading was given to the naturalization act, which affects the remaining clauses of the bill, which permits naturalization for a person of enemy alien birth, resident in Canada for over ten years. The minister told Mr. Tuler, that before any certificate of naturalization was revoked for an act of disloyalty the holder would have the right to a hearing before a board of inquiry. The British parliament had the same control over naturalization as was given in this measure. Mr. Euler and W. 





## **OLDEST KNOWN CODE** OF LAWS DISCOVERED

NoOther Food Can Tablets From Nippur Were Prepared Four Thousand Years Ago.

> Philadelphia, June 21 .- The oldest known written code of laws in the world probably antedating that of Hammurabi by at least a thousand years, has been discovered in part among the hitherto untranslated clay tablets from Nippur at the University of Pennsylvania Museum. The Ham-murabi code was prepared about 2100 B. C., and was discovered about 20 years ago on a large diorite stone (some paragraphs missing), by French

paragraphs missing), by French explorers.

The laws, which have just been translated by Abbe Scheil of Paris, deal with responsibilities of hired servants, with trespass on farms and orchards, harboring of slaves, rentals, rights of slave women who have borne children to their masters, punishment for adult. o their masters, punishment for adul-

tery, etc.
One interesting statute provides that rentals must run for three years in case a man has taken over a house the owner does not know how to manage. This is somewhat obscure, and may mean that all rentals were for that term. In any event property could not lie idle or be improperly used if someone was willing to use it for public The discoveries are considered of the highest importance and search will be made for further tablets containing additional laws.
