[William O'Brien comes of revolutionary stock-his father having taken part in the exciting events in Ireland in 1848—and became noted as the editor of United Ireland, which he established in 1881. Secretary Forster in 1886 ordered its suppression for seditious ut. into it, shrieking for aid. There were terances and O'Brien and fourteen members of the staff of the paper were imprisoned in Kilmain jail as suspects. After his release O'Brien renewed the war against Britain's administration in Ireland and was again arrested in 1887, serving two months, the occasion being marked by riotous scenes in Dublin, where the arrest was made, and in Cork, where the trial was held. IHE ISOLATED CANCER MICROBE

Dr. Schmidt, of Cologne, Cures Dread Disease.

ENGLAND TO TRY TREATMENT

It Reduces Malignant Tumors to the Level of Innocent Growths.

London, Nov. 6.-In a lecture before the Abernethian Society, of London, Dr. Jesse Johnson gave the details of a cancer treatment discovered by Dr. Otto Schmidt, of Cologne, which Dr. Johnson has been investigating, and proposes to try in England. Dr. Schmidt believes he has isolated the parasite, on the presence of which in a sufferer he believes cancer to depend. Regarding the numerous found by Dr. Gaylord, an American investigator, and others, Dr. Schmidt is convinced that they are identical, varying only in shape and appearance under different conditions, and he claims that he has produced these variations in his parasite by subjecting it to such conditions. He claims that he has sterilized the parasite, and also that by injecting it into animals he has produced a serum which destroys cancer cells. One of the most impressive features of the treatment is Lyons, France, Nov. 6.-A meeting yes- presence of cancerous growths can be discovered through the reaction under infection by the serum. moreover, to reduce malignant tumors to the level of innocent growths, thereconvinced that it was worthy of experiment. A discussion followed, in which several eminent physicians took part. The consensus of opinion was that so many disappointments had followed previous methods that Dr. Schmidt's method should be treated with cautious reserve, but that it was worthy of a trial.

At the beginning of the life of this independent nation we fully appreciate the responsibilities which the present state of affairs means. But we have profound faith in the good sense and patriotism of the isthmians, and we believe that they possess sufficient energy to open the way, by their labor, to a happy future, without worry or danger. The separation of the isthmus from Colombia was accomplished without any feeling of hatred or any sentiment of joy. We therefore now begin to form one of the free nations of the world. We consider Colombia as being a sister nation, whenever circumstances may require it, and for whose prosperity we have the most fervent and sincere

wishes. Panama, Nov. 5.-Gen, Tovar and his staff have at last been convinced of the uselessness of their resistance to the provisional government, and have accepted the terms offered by the junta. There is great rejoicing all over the city because the stability of the republic now seems assured. The fact that troops were already moving toward the line probably decided Gen. Tovar and his staff to accept the terms of the junta. A Colon dispatch says: At a conference this afternoon, Col. Torres, commander of the Colombian troops here, seeing that the situation was hopeless, agreed to embark his soldiers on the royal mail steamer Orinoco, sailing for Cartagena at 6:30 p.m. A special train from Panama will bring Gen. Tovar, who will also sail. The people of Colon are now jubilant. The flag of the new republic flies from the railway stations at Galun and Bahia Sodado, near Colon, Troops from Panama will doubtless take charge of the city tomorrow. Part of the troops have already embarked on the Orinoco, and the ammunition has been taken aboard. The municipal council of Colon has notified the provisional government at Panama of its adherence to the new republic. The royal mail steamer Orinoco, with 28 officers, 435 men and 30 women, sailed at 7:30 p.m. The United States auxiliary cruiser Dixie has just arrived.

Hicks-Beach Publicly Opposes Chamberlain's Policy.

Manchester, England, Nov. 6.-Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, formerly Chancel lor of the Exchequer, addressing a meeting of business nen yesterday, rebutted Right Hon, Joseph Chamberlain's claims that British trade was decaying. Nothing could be worse for British industry, Sir Michael added "than an attempt to make imports dearer."

Alluding to Mr. Chamberlain's characterization of the leaders of the free food party as "Little Englanders," Sir Michael said he was a wide imperialist than Mr. Chamberlain. He had preached the doctrine of a permanent union of the empire, in England and Carada, thirty and forty years ago, "when Mr. Chamberlain's poli-

cies did not extend beyond Birmingham." The speaker further said that he refused to accept Mr. Chamberlain's policy, which he believed would injure the United Kingdom, and substitute for the existing good-will, friction between Great Britain and her colonies. He was not a "Little Englander," but, on the contrary, he considered the welfare of the empire as a whole.

VENEZUELAN ARBITRATION

The Hague, Nov. 5.-On the resumption of the hearing of the arguments in the Venezuelan arbitration before the international tribunal here today, the German agent, Herr Buenz, who spoke in English, upheld the claims of the blockading powers for preference, which, he declared, were based on the solemn promise of President Castro, before the raising of the blockade, that all the claims of the blockading powers should be settled, and that he would hyopthecate a sufficient amount of the customs as security. Therefore, it was on this basis that the negotiations were opened. Germany had proposed to arbitrate her differences on July 16, 1901; but Venezuela did not deign to reply. Without war, the German agent claimed, nothing would have been accorded. Equality of treatment, therefore, would be an injustice to the blockaders. Herr Buenz further contended that as the debt of the Caracas Water Company was part of the Venezuelan public debt, Belgium's claim in behalf of the company to participate in the 30 per cent of the customs should not be entertained.

Solicitor-General Finlay, in behalf of Great Britain, claimed that circumstances had forced Great Britain to operate against Venerusla and that the non-
