



CENSUS BILL AND APPLE PACKING

Mr. Fisher's Measure Before the House-Penalty for Illegal Fruit Packing.

Ottawa, Feb. 7. - The Hon. Mr. Fisher's measure to establish a permanent census bureau, was up for discussion in the House today. The measure calls for a permanent office of statistics, headed by a chief secretary, and such employes as it may be necesary to assign. The minister is also to appoint enumerators and assistants and employ persons from time to time in the collection of industrial and other statistics, and also employ temporary clerks. The duties of the chief officer and secretary, as defined in the bill, are practically those of a census chief officer and secretary under the present law. A census is to be taken in June, 1911, for all Canada and a census of the Northwest and Manitoba in June, 1906. It is provided that the new bureau shall collect, tabulate and publish agricultural, commercial, criminal, educational, manufacturing, vital and other statistics durinter-census years, but it is provided that arrangements may be made for using provincial statistics. Statistical abstracts of public reports and documents are also to be made by the department. In the matter of criminal statistics it is provided that returns shall be made ready by every udge or other officer presiding over criminal court, as well as by wardens of penitentiaries and reforma-



Washington, D. C., Feb. 7 .- In view of the revival of reports from Euro-pean capitals to the effect that there has been a renewal of efforts on the part of the powers to find some basis for intervention in the interests of peace in the far east, inquiry has been made here in official circles to ascertain the position of the States Government respecting such a movement. The state department has made no overtures recently to either of the interested powers, nor does it know officially of any such movement in Europe. The position of the United States Government has not changed in any respect, and it would welcome a settlement of the present disastrous conflict either by means of direct negotiations between the belligerent powers or through the medium of an international conference. But no matter which course is followed in arranging the terms of peace, the one upon which the United States Government will insist is that both Russia and Japan shall, in the settlement, live up to the terms of the undertaking to which both of them have subscribed; that the integrity of China shall be respected, and the equal right of all



IS CANADIAN RIGHT

U. S. Authorities Admit That Hecate Straits Fishing Is Ours.

Washington, Feb. 7.—Respecting the declaration in the Canadian Parliament yesterday that the Dominion Government was about to protect the rights of its fishermen in Hecate Straits, it is learned here that it is four years since any complaint was made to the state department against the assertion by the Canadians of exclusive fishing rights in those waters, and there is no disposition now to question such right. The investiga-tion then made satisfied the authorities here that a line drawn through Dixon entrance marked the limit within which American fishermen might venture, and to the Canadians was reserved by treaty the fisheries in Hecate Straits between Queen Charlotte Island and the mainland.

MARKED TO DIE

Murder of Finn Procurator-General Due to Political Plot.

Due to Political Plot.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 7.—The assassination of the procurator-general of Finland, Solsalon Solninen, is believed to be undoubtedly due to political causes. The Associated Press was informed at the ministry of the interior that Solninen was long ago marked for vengeance by the Young Fenoman and Stateman parties, who regarded him as a traitor to his country. As procurator-general he held a position independent of and in some respects even superior to that of the governor-general, and he also was the leader of the old Fenoman party, the influence of which is no longer dominant in the Diet, although it is still preponderant in the Senate. It was a matter of surprise to persons familiar with the Finnish situation that Eugene Schaumann directed his revolver at Gov.—Gen. Bobrikoff of Finland (who was shot June 16 last, and died the following morning), instead of at Solninen, and the latter had long expected to meet a violent end. Extreme precautions were taken to safeguard his life, but his precautions lately were somewhat relaxed, because the Finns appeared to have settled down to a policy of passive obstruction, without resorting to violent means. The crime is deplored by the Finns, who still hoped the Emperor would entertain the Diet's petition for a return to the former Liberal administration, and it is feared it may provoke a policy of repression, especially in view of the recent disorders in Helsingfors.
