KEEP THE LIVER CLEAN.

Den't Overwork It and Give It a Resi

tor at that said: "The liver is misunderstood and underestimated in its functions. If it can be kept clean and active there is no reason why we should ever be ill a day, and we should live to be 150 or 200 years old. It is not necessary to rip this organ all to pieces with ten grains of calomel to get it stirred up. The best thing to do is to shut off your food supply for two or three days, drop your whisky and claret, your tea and coffee, and give your liver a chance to rest. This should

be done once a month."

It is well known, of course, that in olden times the liver was supposed to be the seat of the affections. Friends when they met in the morning did not salute each other with "How's your health?" but with "How's your liver?" Men take horseback exercise principally for their livers. A good shaking up every morning drives away the cirrhoticbiliary encroachment. It is an error to assume that whisky alone produces cirrhosis. Overfeeding is more often the cause. If the digestive organs would organize a union and work only eight hours a day all of us would be healthy and long lived. The trouble is we require the liver, stomach, bowels, heart, brain, muscles, nerves, kidneys, spleen, etc., to work all the time and overtime. Wrong. Give them a rest.

MINING FOR RUBIES.

The Primitive Methods That Are Still In Use In Burma.

The system practiced for obtaining rubies in the mining districts in Burma is of the most primitive description, says the Searchlight. The mining shafts are simply holes about two feet square sunk to a depth varying up to fifty or sixty feet. The shoring up of walls of the shaft is most crude, the sides being supported by posts at the corners and branches of small trees secured carefully against the sides by means of stout sticks.

The miner carries a tin pot similar in shape to a blunt edged cone on his head. He squats down in one corner and digs between his knees in the opposite corner. The earth, or byon, as the ruby bearing earth is called, is conveyed to the top as fast as it is except at the same of the sa cavated in small buckets let down

The apparatus for raising and lowering the buckets is simple in the ex-treme. A stout bamboo post about twenty feet high, called a maungdine, is fixed upright in the ground at a con-venient distance from the pit, or dwin, and a long, thinner bamboo pivoted horizontally into the upper end of it so as to project an eighth from the mine and the long arm toward the mine.

Telling Age and Sex by Pulse.
"The female pulse always beats faster than the male," said a physician, "and from birth to death the pulse speed steadily decreases. I have no doubt that by the pulse alone I could tell readily a healthy person's age and sex. Babes at birth have a pulse that beats 160 times a minute in the case of girls and 150 times a minute in the case of boys. At the age of four or five the pulse beats will have fallen respectively to 110 and 100. Maidens' and youths' pulses average ninety-five and ninety; mature women's and men's average eighty and seventy-five; elderly women's and men's average sixty and fifty. An old woman's pulse rare-Rev. #### DRINK WHEN YOU EAT

TAKE AS MUCH WATER AS YOU WANT WITH YOUR MEALS.

Is Claimed, as Neither Gastric Juice Nor Pepsin Work Properly Unless Largely Diluted With Water.

How much water should we drink nd when should we drink it are questions so simple that at first sight their discussion seems superfluous. One would naturally answer, "Drink all the water you wish when you are thirsty." but authorities say, "Drink more than you wish when you are not thirsty," for they recommend that a gallon or so be drunk between meals, which is nore water than we need and the very time the system least demands it. Usually we experience thirst during or directly after eating.

Inasmuch as 87 per cent of the whole body is water, which is, of course, being used up every moment, there is no question that we should drink of this element copiously, but it is a serious question whether we should refrain from water at meals—the time we par-

ticularly desire it.

There is a class of persons, ever growing more numerous, that believes that whatever is is wrong. For the natural and simple they would substitute the artificial and complicated. To drink water while or directly after eating is a natural instinct. Give a dog his dinner, putting a bowl of water near it, and observe that he will first eat all he can and then immediately drink. Wild animals look for a stream after feeding. Cage birds will stop pecking at seed to peck at water. Children have a perpetual thirst, and I have seen babies that, unlike young Oliver, have refused to eat more when denied water after every few mouth

It is especially important that babies be given what water they wish and at the time they wish it, which is usually

at table.

The thinner food is the more easily and thoroughly is it digested; in fact, it cannot be digested until it has been made liquid by the gastric and intestinal juices. Indigestion is caused often by food that has not been sufficiently istened by the digestive secretions.

There are sound physiological rea sons for our craving water with meals Water is the solvent that constitutes 95 per cent of the gastric juice. Now, when one eats a hearty meal and does not drink, the amount of water in the stomach is not sufficient thoroughly to moisten the great quantity of food, and this makes digestion difficult. On the other hand, when enough water is ingested with the food the latter is well moistened and broken up, the diwell moistened and broken up, the di-gestible particles being then readily acted on by the gastric juice and after-ward absorbed. Again, when the par-tially digested food (clayme) passes into the intestines it is most important that it be very moist, particularly as water is constantly absorbed from the chyle in the large intestine. Bad cases of constipation are caused by dry chyle remaining in the intestines, where it sets up an inflammation that some-times proves fatal, dry faeces, of course, resisting peristaltic action. The excrement of persons suffering from

constipation is always dry and hard and is a potent cause of appendicitis. The idea that water drinking at meals unduly dilutes the gastric juice is nonsensical, water being not so palatable that one is apt to drink more than his digestive functions require. As a matter of fact water generally facilitates the digestion of albuminous substances. In this connection Dr. A.

Jacobi in his work on "Infant Diet," page 67, says: "In experiments upon digestion of albumen with gastric juice obtained from the stomach of animals it was noticed that after a certain time the proc ess began to slacken, but was rene merely by the addition of water. The the substance it had dissolved and ceased to act upon what remained un-til it had been diluted. In the living stomach this dilution is of even greater importance, for it permits of the immediate absorption of the substances soluble in water and which do not re juice." Neither the gastric juice nor pepsin has any true digestive action unless they be largely diluted with wa-

ter.

It goes without saying that it is not the food that is ingested, but that which is digested, that does good, and this principle holds good with water, which is practically a food. Now, when one resists the perfectly natural desire to drink while eating he may be not thirsty several hours afterward, but he is advised nevertheless to force himself to drink at that time. But if he drinks then, the water, having no food to mix with it, will go through him, as it were that is, it will do no

### THE LOBSTER'S SHELL.

New One Is Grown Before the Old One Is Cast Off.

One is Cast Off.

Odd as it may sound to say so, the lobster grows before, not after, he casts his old hard shell—that is to say, he makes new cells and tissues, which are not at once filled out, but which are intended to swell to their full dimensions as soon as he has got rid of are intended to swell to their full di-mensions as soon as he has got rid of his binding and confining external skel-eleton. When the critical moment at last arrives a new soft shell grows en-tire within the older and harder one, and the animal then withdraws him-self leg by leg claw by claw and and the animal then withdraws him-self, leg by leg, claw by claw and swimmeret by swimmeret, out of the enveloping coat of mail which covers him. The shedding of the old coat is complete and absolute. Not a frag-ment remains. Even the apparently in ment remains. Even the apparently in-ternal hard portions are cast off with-the rest, for the entire covering forms one cintinuous piece, the interior por-tions being really, so to speak, folds of

the skin inserted inward.

An entirely new skeleton had already grown within the old one, but exceedingly soft and flexible in texture, and the body becomes so almost fluid or jellylike—not in structure, but in power of compression and extension—that even the big claws are drawn out even the big claws are drawn out through the narrower apertures of the joints in a perfectly marvelous man-ner. After a longer or shorter period of muscular paroxysm the soft lobster at last disengages itself entirely from the dead shell and emerges upon the world a new and defenseless fleshy creature. The whole cask skeleton, un-ruptured in any part, but disengaged ruptured in any part, but disengaged by lifting up the body piece where it joins the tall, looks exactly like an entire dead lobster.

### UNNATURAL HUSBAND

Female Quack Causes Tragic Death Of Young Toronto Wife

CHARGED WITH MURDER

Toronto, July 21.—Mrs. Agnes Bridant, residing at the Bristol House, corner of King and Jarvis, died at that corner of King and Jarvis, died at that address yesterday morning as the result of blood-poisoning caused by an illegal operation, and the husband, Edward Bridant, and Lillian Miller, practicing as the Dr. De Voss Medicine Co. at 210 Queen street east, are in custody, charged with her murder.

Toe Laty For Ante-Mortem.

It was at 10 o'clock yesterday morning that Crown Attorney Corley and Detective Sergeant Duncan were sent for to take Mrs Bribant's ante-mortem deposition, but on arrival at the Bristol.
