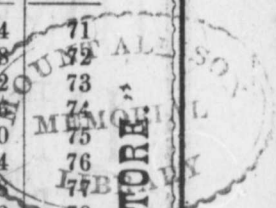

EXPLANATIONS

AND

Principal articles of the Calendar.

ON THE LEFT HAND PAGE will be found the day of the Month, day of the Week, Time of Sun's Rising and Setting reduced to Mean Charlottetown Time, the Equation of Time, ("Sun Fast or Slow of Clock"), for the instant of *Apparent Noon at Greenwich*, and the right of the column, the hourly change or variation of same.

The Sun's Declination is given at *Apparent Noon at Greenwich*, and the hourly variation in the next column: the DAY'S LENGTH is added to the other matter on this Page in place of the Sun's Declination at *Mean Noon*.

On the right hand page are given the Sun's Semi-diameter, Moon's Rising, Southing and Setting, and the Time of High Water at Charlottetown, Morning and Evening alternately. The Moon's *Southing*, or Transit of the Upper Meridian, is given for the use of Seamen, and is the same as found in the *Nautical Almanac*, as are also the Equation of Time and Sun's Declination.

ECLIPSES.

There will be three Eclipses in the year 1879:—Two of the Sun and One of the Moon.

1st. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, January 22nd: Invisible to North America.

2nd. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, July 19th: Invisible to North America.

3rd. A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, December 28th: Invisible to the greater portion of South and North America, including P. E. Island.

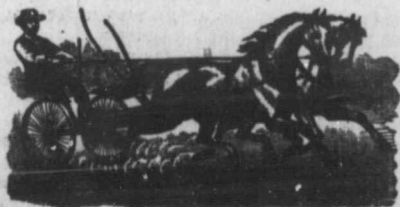

The Time of High Water, Charlottetown, is given in the Calendar for both morning and afternoon; but it must be understood that this is only APPROXIMATELY correct, as the time of high water in these parts is much affected by storms, etc., whose effects are not directly felt on this Island. The Time of High Water at London Bridge has been omitted this year to make room for other matter.

The following Table gives a Constant to be applied as directed to the Time of High Water at Charlottetown, to find the time at the places mentioned in the Table.

VENOR, the "Weather Prophet," says of the Winter of 1878-9,—“Unless I am greatly mistaken, the setting in of the Winter of 1878-9 will be as marked for its unusual *earliness* as was that of 1877-8 for its extreme lateness. Navigation will close *early*, and will not open until *late*, so that the winter will be a long one. There will, in all probability, be an abundance of snow during the fore and latter part of the season; but, judging from the number and severity of our thunder storms in the summer of 1878, I look for a warm and singularly open *Term*.”

GOOSE-BONE WEATHER PREDICTIONS.

The Prophecy of the goose-bone does not extend beyond the year in which the goose was hatched, and the prediction is for the three winter months only. Take the breast bone of a last spring's goose and divide it into three equal parts, and the different divisions will represent December, January and February. The breast bone of a goose is translucent, and if clear when held up to the light, the weather will be mild and pleasant; but if covered with cloud-like blots it will be gloomy and cold; the heavier the blots the colder will be the weather.

REMARKS.—1. The nearer the Moon's changes to midnight the fairer the weather will be during the next seven days; the nearer to mid day the rougher and more stormy. The former time occupies from 10 p.m. to 2 a.m.; the latter from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

2. The phases happening from 4 to 10 p.m. may be followed by fair weather; but this chiefly depends upon the direction of the wind.

3. If a storm arises from the East, on or immediately preceding the Spring Equinox, or a week after, the following Spring or Summer will be wet four times out of five; if from the West, North or S. W., the spring and Summer will be dry five times out of six.

The rate of Postage on a letter posted within the Dominion of Canada, for transmission by Mail to any place in Canada, is 3 cents per half ounce weight; but the Statute provides that this rate must be prepaid by Postage Stamp at the time of posting the letter.

Any such letter posted wholly *unpaid* (or prepaid less than one full rate of *three cents*) cannot be forwarded to its destination, but will be sent to the Dead Letter Office, with the reason plainly written or marked upon it—"postage not prepaid."

Letters as aforesaid posted in Canada, and addressed to places in Canada, when weighing more than half an ounce, and liable therefore to two or more rates of Postage, will be transmitted by mail to destination, though not fully prepaid, if as much as one full rate of three cents has been prepaid thereon by postage stamp; and in such cases will be forwarded charged with double the amount of deficient postage not prepaid: Thus, if such a letter weighing more than $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., and not exceeding 1 oz. in weight, be posted prepaid 3 cents only, it will be rated 6 cents unpaid—"more to pay"—and forwarded to its address.

On letters posted at an Office to be delivered from it, commonly known as "*drop letters*," the rate is 1 cent per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.; to be in all cases prepaid by postage stamp affixed to such letters when posted.

The charge for the Registration of a letter is 2 cents, to be prepaid by Registration stamp.

The Registration fee to the United States is 5 cents, to be prepaid by Registration stamp.

Transient Newspapers and Periodicals addressed to Great Britain must be prepaid by postage stamp *Two* cents per 4 oz. each packet.

PARCEL POST.

To any part of the Dominion, 12½ cents per half pound.

Parcels should not exceed 5 lbs. in weight, or 24 inches in length, or 12 inches in breadth, and should be marked "by *Parcel Post*." Parcels may be Registered by affixing a 5 cent Registered Letter Stamp thereto, in addition to the Postage.

MISCELLANEOUS POSTAL MATTER.

Books and Pamphlets, Printed Circulars, Prices Current, Handbills, etc.

CANADA AND UNITED STATES.

When posted addressed to any place in Canada or the United States, and not exceeding 5lbs. in weight, 24 inches in length, and 12 inches in breadth or depth, must be prepaid by Postage stamp at the rate of one cent per 4 ounces in weight, and must be put up so as to admit of inspection. Such books, papers, returns, etc., must not be accompanied by any instructions or directions.

The rate of postage on Seeds, Cuttings, Bulbs and Roots is one cent per 4 ounces, the weight of a package not to exceed 24 ounces.

PATTERN AND SAMPLE POST.

CANADA.

Patterns and Samples of merchandise, not exceeding 24 ounces in weight, when posted in Canada for places within Canada or Newfoundland, must be prepaid by postage stamp at the rate of *One Cent* per 4 ounces weight, and put up in such a manner as to admit of inspection.



COUNTY COURTS.

THEIR JURISDICTION.

The County Courts have not power to try any of the following actions, namely:

First—Detinue, replevin, ejectment, or any action where the title of land is brought in question. Or, Second—Actions in which the validity of any devise, bequest, or limitation, is disputed. Or, Third—Criminal conversation or seduction. Or, Fourth,—Breach of promise of marriage. Or, Fifth—Actions against an executor or administrator, but executors or administrators may bring actions in the said Courts. Or, Sixth—Actions against any Justice of the Peace for anything done by him in the execution of his office. Or, Seventh—Actions upon a judgment in the Supreme Court.—(See Section 16, County Courts' Amendment Act.)

The County Courts have jurisdiction in all civil actions both of debts and contracts, wrongs and damages, where the debt or damages claimed, whether on balance of account or otherwise, do not exceed one hundred any fifty dollars, and on all claims on Bail Bonds or on other Bonds, given under the County Courts' Act, or any Act in amendment thereof, whatever may be the amount sought to be recovered, and in all actions recoverable under any Provincial Statute, where the remedy provided by such statute is by suit before any Court of Commissioners for the recovery of Small Debts.—(See Sec. 17 Co. Courts' Amendment Act.)

Where the debt or demand claimed is a balance not exceeding one hundred and fifty dollars, after an admitted payment, or set off of any debt or demand, claimed or recoverable by the defendant from the plaintiff, the Court shall have jurisdiction to try such action.—(See Sec. 18 Co. Courts' Amendment Act.)

The plaintiff, in any County Court, cannot divide any cause or action arising out of a debt or contract, for the purpose of bringing two or more actions; but any plaintiff having cause of action, arising out of a debt or contract, may abandon the excess and can, on proving his case, recover to an amount not exceeding one hundred and fifty dollars; and the judgment of the Court in such cases, shall be in full of all demands in respect of such cause of action. Provided that when any plaintiff shall have cause of action against a defendant for goods sold and delivered, and shall at the same time be the holder of promissory notes, made by such defendant and due and payable to the plaintiff, the plaintiff may sue for the amount of his claim for goods sold and delivered, without being required to sue at the same time upon such promissory notes, or that he may sue for such promissory notes, without being required to sue at the same time for the amount of his account for goods sold and delivered. (See Sec. 20 Co. Courts' Amendment Act.)

BANKRUPTCY JURISDICTION.—The jurisdiction in matters of Insolvency is vested in the County Courts under the Insolvent Act of 1875 and Amending Acts. Under these Acts a Writ of Attachment may be issued out of the County Court against a trader who has committed any of the Acts of Insolvency set forth in the 3rd section of the Insolvent Act of 1875, at the instance of any unsecured creditor whose debt amounts to \$200 and upwards. The Insolvent Act of 1875 also provides that the estate of any trader may be put into insolvency by means of a written demand made on him at the instance of any one or more of his creditors for unsecured claims of not less than \$100 each, and amounting in the aggregate to \$500, requiring him to make an assignment for the benefit of his creditors. (See Sec. 4 and 9 of Insolvent Act 1875.)

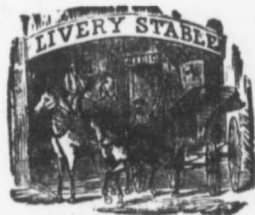
