CONSTITUTION.

I.—NAME.

This institution shall be called, "THE CONGREGATIONAL COLLEGE OF BRITISH NORTH AMERICA."

II.—OBJECT.

Its object is to educate ministers for the Congregational Churches of Canada, and the other Provinces of British North America.

III.—MANAGEMENT.

The ordinary affairs of the College shall be managed by a Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and not less than ten nor more than fifteen other Directors (five to form a quorum), who shall hold office for one year, and be eligible for re-election.

IV.—ANNUAL MEETINGS.

A meeting of Subscribers to the funds of the College shall be held annually, for the reception of the report of the retiring Directors, the election of a new Board, and the transaction of other necessary business.

V.—BY-LAWS.

The proceedings of the Board of Directors shall be regulated by by-laws, which may be enacted, amended, or repealed at any annual meeting.

VI.—ALTERATIONS OF THE CONSTITUTION.

Alterations may be made in this Constitution by any annual meeting, provided that notice of such alterations has been given at the meeting next preceding.

BY-LAWS.

I.

The annual meeting of subscribers shall be held at the same time and place as that of the Congregational Union of Canada.

II.

Every candidate for admission into the College shall present to the Directors: 1. The testimony of the church of which he is a member, respecting his piety and apparent suitability for the ministry. 2. A written statement of the grounds of his conviction that he is called to that work, and of his views of Christian doctrine and church government. 3. Evidence of sufficient literary acquirements, the minimum of which shall be a fair English education.

III.

Approved candidates shall be received for one session, at the close of which, if the results of their probation be satisfactory, they shall be admitted to the full course.

IV.

The course of study shall extend over five sessions of six months each; and shall include the usual branches of a liberal education, the Original Languages of the Scriptures, Biblical Literature, Theology, Church History, Homiletics, and Pastoral Duty. In exceptional cases, the Directors shall have power to admit students for a shorter term.

V.

Attendance upon the classes in the College, and the use of the Library, shall be without charge to the students. Aid may also be granted to them from its funds, to meet the expense of Board: the amount of such aid to be fixed at the beginning of each session.

VI.

As a part of their preparation for their future work, the students, under the sanction of the Directors, shall preach the Gospel, as they have opportunity.

VII.

At the close of every session, the students shall be examined upon the subjects of the year. The examinations shall be conducted, in each department respectively, by two or more examiners to be chosen by the Directors; the whole to constitute a board for the general management of the examination, and the preparation of a report of its results. The examinations shall combine the written and oral methods, in such proportions as the examiners may determine. The compositions of the students during the year may also be called for. The length and difficulty of the examinations, in subjects taken by the whole class in common, shall be graduated according to the academical standing of the several students. The report of the board of examiners shall deal, except in special cases, only with the general results of their labors; but they may, when they see fit, make a further confidential statement to the Directors.

VIII.

In reference to matters not provided for in the foregoing by-laws, the Directors may act according to their discretion; subject always to the approval of the subscribers at any regular meeting.

The Annual Meeting of Subscribers to the Congregational College of British North America was held, according to previous public announcement, in the Congregational Chapel in Kingston, at 10.30 o'clock, A.M., on Friday, the 14th June, 1861.

TWENTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
CONGREGATIONAL COLLEGE
OF
BRITISH NORTH AMERICA.

Although this is the first time that a Board of Directors has reported to the subscribers to the Congregational College, yet, as the institution is identical in all but the name, with the former Canadian Congregational Theological Institute and Congregational Academy, the numeration of preceding reports is continued.

At the date of the last annual meeting most of the students were engaged in missionary labour for the vacation. It is with much satisfaction that we receive accounts of the general marked acceptability and usefulness of these services. At the present time, nearly all the class are again similarly employed. As the Missionary Society is in most instances expected to guarantee the needful compensation, arrangements for this purpose are conducted by its officers.

We are much gratified to have to state, that the second Sabbath in October was observed by the majority of the churches as a day of special prayer for the College, with wonted earnestness and cordiality. We would urge upon every church, and on our supporters individually, the request for continual remembrance in prayer. Let us have a share in the public intercessions of the Sabbath and the prayer-meeting. Our institution will be successful in its most important work just in proportion as it is the object of your prayers.

On the Wednesday after the second Sabbath of October, the new session was opened by a public service in the Second Congregational Church. Rev. Dr. Wilkes presided on the occasion, and we were very glad to enjoy the participation in the service of several other pastors of the churches. Rev. J. Porter delivered the address, in which were set forth the several elements of a Christian Manhood.

The class of 1860-1 numbered fourteen members,—Messrs. James Dickson from the church in Brantford, and James Douglas from the 2nd Church, Toronto, filling up the vacancies left by Messrs. Bryning and Rawson. Mr. Burchill resumed his place in the class: but we are sorry to have to report two absentees, Mr. Day on account of continued ill health, which, according to a medical opinion procured by the board on his return from England, rendered him unfit for study at present,—and Mr. Carlyle in consequence of a teaching engagement extending to the end of December. In regard to the latter, we have further to state, that at our last meeting an application was presented from him for our consent to the termination of his connection with the College, for reasons purely personal, and such as to leave us no alternative but compliance with his request.

The following Reports from the Tutors will sufficiently explain the nature of the studies pursued during the past winter.

DR. LILLIE'S REPORT.

I beg to report that the subjects of study in my department during the session recently closed have been Mental Philosophy, the Evidences of Christianity, the Divine Existence and Attributes, and the History of the Church of the first three centuries. On the first 19 lectures have been delivered; on the second 14; on the third 13; and 30 on the last — making 76 in all. In connection with these, our customary exercises in the writing and examination of essays weekly on the more important topics, and the preparation and delivery of discourses, have been maintained.

Throughout the session I have been greatly encouraged by the diligence and success with which the young brethren have pursued their studies, and the good feeling which has, on all occasions, marked their conduct towards myself.

Mr. Kean, who has completed his course with us, I commend, with all affection, to the confidence of the churches, in the hope that it may please the Master to spare him long and make him very useful and happy in the good work to which he has consecrated himself.

DR. WICKSON'S REPORT.

I beg to submit the following Report of my department in the College for the session of 1860-1861.

In Hebrew there have been two classes, of which the junior read a portion of the Book of Genesis, and the senior about twenty of the Psalms.

In the Greek and Latin languages, two classes, and the subjects Demosthenes and Cicero, Xenophon and Sallust.

In the New Testament Greek, two classes, reading in the Acts of the Apostles and the Epistle to the Hebrews; most of the students attended both classes.

In English, two classes, the principal subject a Book of Milton's Paradise Lost. In these classes attention has been regularly given to the orthography and analysis of the language, and to public reading.

In Archæology and Biblical Geography, one class.

The students of the first year have made some progress in English and Roman History, and in the Elements of Euclid.

The students have evinced a gratifying earnestness in their application to the prescribed courses; and although indisposition has, in one or two instances, broken the continuity of study, yet all have, I trust, made satisfactory advancement.

The Rev. W. Hamiltor having again visited Toronto, the class has been assisted in securing his instructions in Elocution.

EXAMINATIONS.

The annual Examinations were held at the close of the Session. Rev. Messrs. Byrne, Allworth and Wood were the examiners in attendance, and devoted much time to their duties. The following is their Report.

REPORT OF THE EXAMINERS.

Having carefully examined the written exercises submitted to us, we cannot refrain from expressing the high satisfaction we have felt in observing the evident marks of diligence, application and progress exhibited by the students, the junior no less than the senior.

In Dr. Lillie's department, the points of examination had to do in *Theology*, with the Christian Evidences and Divine Attributes; in *Mental Philosophy*, with the nature and utility of the science, and definitions and illustrations of several of the intellectual faculties; and in *Church History*, with what relates to the first three centuries, especially their earlier developments.

In Dr. Wickson's department, the course of instruction embraced the English, Hebrew, Latin and Greek languages, (in the latter much attention having very properly been directed to the Greek of the New Testament,) Biblical Geography and Archæology, and several other branches of study to which less time and attention could be given.

The questions prepared by the respected and honored tutors of these young brethren embraced a wide range of thought, and comprehended the prominent points of the courses of lectures delivered during the Session; and considering the satisfactory manner in which they have been answered, in a way so thoroughly testing both the memory and the judgment, too much credit cannot be given to the tutors, under whose wise and judicious care they have been placed, nor too much be said in the way of encouragement to the students.

As might be expected from the previous circumstances and training of the brethren, differences are obvious as to orders of mind and status, but there are none whom we can hesitate to praise, or of whom we can have any doubts respecting their ultimate fitness for usefulness in the spheres to which the great Head of the Church may direct them. The oral examinations on the topics referred to have confirmed these impressions; and we feel assured that the more these brethren are known the greater will be the amount of sympathy and confidence cherished by our churches towards them.

examinations. By every means the personal acquaintance, sympathy and coöperation of our constituents with the work of the College should be maintained and increased.

We are not able to state precisely how many of the students of the fourth year will not return to the College. By the arrangements sanctioned at the last annual meeting, they are at liberty to leave at the end of the term for which they were admitted—four years, while it would be much preferred that they should remain for the session now added to the course. Acceding to their own request, we have sanctioned a partial modification of the course in some of these instances, exempting them from certain studies already taken up in their first year, and allowing attendance on classes in University College. We hope, hereafter, to have our students enjoy more of the advantages of that institution, and to do so at the beginning, rather than at the end, of their course.

Arrangements have been made during the past year for the better management of the Library of the College. Regulations have been established for the issue of the books, under which a librarian is to be annually elected by the students from among themselves, the Board paying him a small fee for his services. Mr. Lewis was accordingly chosen to the office for 1860-61.

Before the opening of the session we received the most serviceable part of the Library of Gorham College, Nova Scotia, reported two years since as having been offered for our use and accepted. Our grateful acknowledgments are due to Professor Cornish for valuable services in connection with this matter.

We have also much pleasure in acknowledging a gift to the Library from the Congregational Union of England and Wales, consisting of a set of their publications in thirteen handsome volumes. They comprise a series of the Year Book, Hanbury's Memorials, Campbell's and Matheson's Prize Essays, Wallace's Guide to the Christian Ministry, the Union's Tract Series, and the Congregational and New Congregational Hymn Books. We shall prize these volumes, not only for their own merits, but as a token of the fraternal regard of the donors.

Coming now to financial matters, we have to report that we have agreed to lease the premises so long occupied by the Institution, from Mr. Nasmith, at £20 per annum, until July 1, 1864, the lease

being terminable, however, by six months' notice from either party. The \$200 received from Mr. Nasmith for our interest in the building, together with a half-year's rent to 31st December, \$47, are invested in the same manner as the rest of the Building Fund.

In reference to the Treasurer's accounts, the Board would recommend to the subscribers to change the period of our financial year. For reasons which have long ceased to be in force, this has hitherto terminated on the 30th of June, thereby necessitating the anomaly of an interim statement only being producible at the annual meeting, the accounts being left open for subsequent completion and audit. To put our affairs into a business-like form, we would suggest that the financial year close hereafter on the 31st of May, and that the accounts be balanced and audited before the annual meeting. Any disturbance of existing arrangements for collecting that can result from this change, will be but temporary, and more apparent than real.

The subscribers will have noticed that the accounts of 1859-60 presented a balance due to the Treasurer of \$217 79, an increase of over \$100 from the preceding year. Our expenditure, this year, is somewhat less, and we hope that the contributions from the churches, already indicating a considerable improvement, will so far increase as to enable our successors to begin another year unencumbered by debt. We cannot refrain from again expressing our obligations to the subscribers for their still more general adoption of the plan of collecting in October. Early attention to our cause will be still more necessary if the financial year henceforth closes a month earlier than at present.

As the subscribers will doubtless receive a report from the special Committee appointed at the last annual meeting to act for them in regard to the University question, the Board will merely represent that although no legislation was actually attempted during the last Session of Parliament, the assaults on the integrity of the Endowment are carried on with unrelenting pertinacity, and that the question will soon come before the people for decision at the polls. The discussions now in progress serving but to demonstrate the unreasonableness and injustice of the changes demanded, we trust that our constituents, in the discharge of their duty as electors, will vigorously and triumphantly maintain the cardinal principle of Non-Sectarian Public Education.
