You have only to shoot a gull and cook it to find that this is the case, and that as a dinner dish it is a complete failure. Yet in Iceland gull flesh is one of the principal winter foods of the peo-ple. There, in early summer, when the cliffs swarm with nesting gulls, parties are organized and men are let down over the lofty precipice by ropes. They catch young gulls, which are as fat as butter, and send them up to the top in sacks. The moment they reach the top the birds are skinned. This completely does away with the fishy taste, and the birds are then taken home and hung in smoke until they are thoroughly dried. 
