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SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS. NHE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Deminion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Eatry by prexy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but set Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within aine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader, is good standing may pre-empt a quarter-ection alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

good standing may pre-smite ection alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

# COMBLES FALLS

Its Capture by British Was Imminent—Review of the Day's War News.

London, Sept. 26.-British and French troops to-day reached the town of Combles, on the Somme front, after having virtually pocketed the place in a struggle of many veeks duration and are fighting to gain complete possession of it.

Attacking from the north, British roops have forced their way into the place and are overcoming the Ger man resistance there. On the south the French have reached the town's edge and have penetrated the ceme-tery. In addition they have further losed the small opening left in the

combles pocket by capturing all of the village of Fregicourt, a mile to The Combles salient, doggedly maintained by the Germans has long been a serious hindrance to the al-lies, hampering them in their offensive toward Bapaume and Peronne Its elimination, however, seemed imminent after yesterday's combined thrust by the Franco-British forces which carried them to Morval on the one side and Fregicourt, on the other, leaving as a line of retreat for the Germans only a roadless gap a mile and a half in width swept by

a fine and a har in watch swept sy the allied guns.

Bombs dropped in last night's Zeppelin air raid on England, car-ried out by some half dozen of these German air craft, caused the death of 29 persons, it was officially announced in London to-day. While the great battle on the

omme front was at its height the Germans last night attacked the French lines at Verdun, driving in between the Thiaumont work and Fleury to the east of the Meuse. Paris to-day announces that the French guns were effective in checking the German assaults.

NHE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead s quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Ap plicant must appear in person at the Do ninion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for minon Landa Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Landa Agency (but me' Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and caltivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within sine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader by good standing may pre-empt a functor

certon alongside his nomestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six mouths residence in each extere verse after earning homestead pat ent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Precupition patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on extain conditions.
