the session.
A committee was appointed to wait on the cabinet and ask

At the instance of the committee on Federal prohibition which is seeking to force the issue in pariiament, the resolution
was altered to ask for prohibition during the war and for a "rewas altered to ask for prohibition during the war and for a "re

A. W. Fraser, K. K. Ottaid the committee was at-
tacking liguor from the ECONOMIC viewpoint. They estimated the saving Canada would effect by total prohibition at upwards
of \$150,000 per year.
J. W. Booth, the Ottawa millionaire lumberman, pnt the prohibition issue second in importance only to the prosecution of
the war. "With liquor wiped out Canada would be the happiest
