Horrible Railroad Disaster.

correspondent set out on an extra train for the scene of the terrible catastrophe, which was found to be at the second bridge over the Greenbrier River.

Immediately preceding the bridge on the railroad is Harvey's Tunnel, 1,200 feet long. This morning a material train, consisting of a small engine, known as the David Anderson, and five small flats, loaded with crossties and having on board some fifteen employes, emerged from the tunnel, going at the rate of four miles per hour. Steadily it moved on to the bridge, which was 300 feet long and fifty four feet high from the bed of the river.

The fated train advanced cautiously and was soon on the bridge, between heaven and earth. The centre was reached in safety; in a moment more it was passed, and now the
