





SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of Any person who is the sole nead of family, or any mail over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the cant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, ou certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—six months' residence upon and culivation of the land in each of

and culivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owner and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother an sister.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fitty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
