

(Financial Past) While the members of the Canadian Club of Montreal were ap plauding an address in favor of a ommission form of Government and a civic manager the city council was overthrowing a motion for the temporary suspension of the functions o the council, while the civic Adminis tration still remained in office Meanwhile the civic Commission wil continue in fice for two years more sharing to some extent the powers o civic government with the City Coun

The address in support of the City Manager plan was delivered by Clin ton Rogers Woodruff, secretary of the National Municipal League of Philadelphia, who declared that this form of municipal government was in force in 125 cities in the United dopted it had given it up. In associa tion with the city manager would be an elective commission of five or sev en men as legislators whose will would be carried out by an efficient nanager. Germany had secured certain efficiency in municipal gov ernment, but not democratic govern nent of the municipality. The work of the city manager in association was a very remarkable contribution towards the developement of muni ipal democracy. The managers were ted their efficiency and ability to car ry on municipal affairs. Forcing Bulbs In The House

Bulbs when properly forced make splendid to use plants and come into bloom during two of the winter months which most need the brightening effects of their rich colours "Bulbs" is a general term which includes Narcissi, Early Tulips and the more recent Darwin Tunips noted for their elegance of form and range of

After bulbs have been potted the next essential is to induce an abundance of root growth as quickly as possible. The proper root develop ment will determine the subsequent size, vigor and lasting qualities of the flowers. Explicit advice in this connection is, first, choose as the storage place for the pots the coolest, darkest and dampest part of the cellar—or the vegetable storage room is very suitable, Second, provide a condition which approximates as nearly as possible the condition they would have if planted in the ground outside. One thorough watering at the time of potting may be sufficient, but in most cases it is not, therefore water regularly as often as the top soil shows signs of dryness. Another method is to plunge the pots into damp sand and keep the sand moist.
