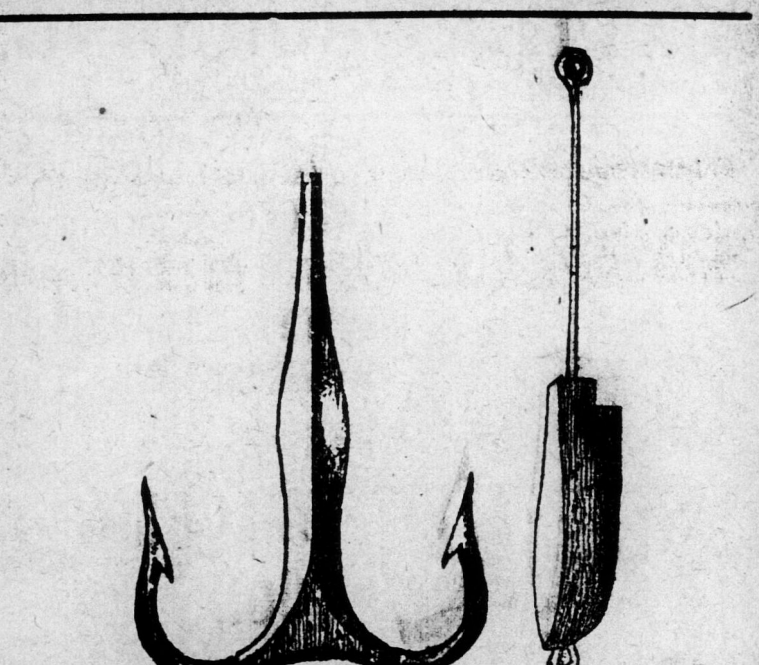

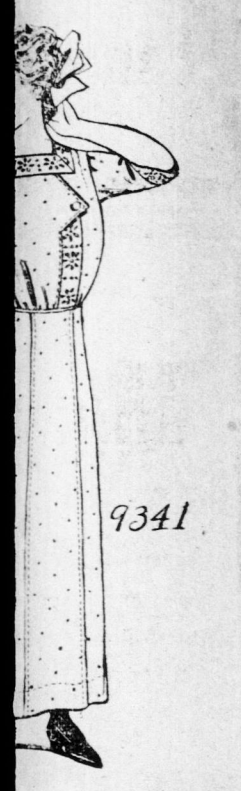

### Terrible Drowning Fatality.

The appended message was received by wireless yesterday afternoon by Dr. Grenfell, who is on the Strathcona, to Minister of Fisheries Piccott—The message was sent via Fogo and read:—

"Regret to report five drownings on August 23rd, at Independent, Labrador. Capt. William Dawe and Richard Jackson of Bay Roberts; William Spencer, Coley's Point; James Holmes and Edward Holmes, of Shearstown. Their boat capsized in a heavy sea. The body of Edward Holmes was recovered on Sunday."

Capt. Wm. Dawe referred to belongs to Bay Roberts. He was a son of Capt. John Dawe and nephew of Capt. Eli Dawe, former Minister of Marine and Fisheries. Capt. Dawe was a promising young seafaring man. He leaves to mourn a wife and several children.

The other five men referred to were all married and all except one had children. For the bereaved widows and orphans the deepest sympathy of the entire island will go out.

### Exploring Labrador.

Special Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, To-day.

A telegram giving the first news of Henry G. D. Bryant's exploring trip to Labrador has been received. Bryant left here on June 22nd last and arrived at St. Augustine, Labrador, on July 12th for a reconnaissance of a part of the Labrador, never before travelled by white men. Bryant returned to St. Augustine on Saturday and the telegram says the expedition was fairly successful and was the first to explore and map St. Augustine River from sea to its source, a distance of 147 miles. "We travelled a region fairly timbered, but unsettled as to agriculture. The scenery of the central plateau of Labrador is surpassing beautiful. The Indians deserted after four days, but we successfully covered two thirds of the distance to Hamilton Inlet. We were obliged to return owing to the serious condition of one of the Newfoundland canoe men, who had injured his leg while running. The topographical results are important and will eventually change the maps of rivers. Entomological and other specimens and photographs reconcile me to the disappointment that I was unable to cross the south eastern part of the Labrador peninsula." Bryant's expedition included canoe men from Newfoundland and Indian guides.

### Hurt by Runaway

Yesterday afternoon a boy named Breen, of Hamilton Street, had a narrow escape from being killed by a horse which was unharnessed and had evidently escaped from its stable. The little chap attempted to get clear as it dashed up on him but was hit by one of the hoofs in the head. He had a remarkable escape from death and became unconscious, while blood poured from the wound. Dr. Tait who was called inserted several stitches.

**Sick of the Government.**

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—Please allow me space in your valuable paper to make a few remarks about the way we are treated here by the Morris Government. First of all, I would mention a fishery matter. There are two coves in this place, and we are allowed no seines to haul caplin. I have seen as high as six or seven seines in those coves hauling caplin and a man paid by the Government to look after them. More than that, they have the so-called protection boat, the Fiona, at times going round on pleasure trips instead of going around protecting the fishermen and having the men that hauled caplin in those coves taken up and made to pay the fine. The Fiona was smart enough last summer in going to get 'Layton Morrissey's' dories, but there was no one saw her coming to Cape Broyle to catch the dories and seines in those coves.

I will tell Morris and his gang they have only another year to let things carry as they have gone on in the past.

My second remark is about road work. When there is work on the roads, some men are sent after to go to work, and more cannot get any. Men that were at work a month ago are not paid for it yet. I know of one man in particular who is asking some of its chairmen of the roads. The cry is there is no money. If the picnic parties were stopped and all that is wasted other ways saved, there would be lots of money to pay the poor men who work on the roads. I have also been told that there were 15 or 16 men

asking the members for Ferryland to give them a government pump for a well they have in their neighborhood, which is somewhere about 19 or 20 ft. deep. They haven't got it yet, although it was early in the summer when they asked for it.

What can we expect from the Morris gang? After 1913 we shall have a good government, for we are sick of the one we have now. Thanking you for space, I am,

Without further ceremony they sailed into the Chinamen and pummelled them about the face. The chinks ran to the deck shrieking, and Capt. McKellop being acquainted sent word ashore for the police. Meanwhile the desperate stokers had attacked a half dozen more Chinamen; one of these brandished a knife and used it to advantage on a stoker's wrist. Soon after two police officers arrived and arrested the frenzied seamen who walked quietly to the police station. When the ship was ready to sail they were liberated. It is likely that the trouble will wind up in Halifax.

The S. S. Sagona arrived at Twillingate at 1 p.m. yesterday. Capt. Parsons' report to the Reid Mill Co. is as follows:—"From Battle Hr. to Seal Islands, fishery practically over. I. & S. Co. A quarter mile race had also been added. It being the first quarter mile ever held on the island, the President, Mr. Chas. F. Taylor, donated a splendid silver cup for this event. Mr. Joseph M. Greene of the D. I. & S. Co. being the winner. The sports lasted till about 7:30 p.m., when "God Save the King" being

played by the City Band under Mr. Robert Avery, all dispersed for supper.

At 8:30 the annual Field Sports Ball took place in Wabana Hall, and was most largely attended. The City Band supplying excellent music. Owing to the inclemency of the weather the prizes were not presented at the field and Mrs. Gouthro, wife of the popular medical practitioner, Dr. H. P. Gouthro, who was to do the honour on the occasion, was invited to present them at the Ball. This Mrs. Gouthro kindly did, and a vote of thanks to Mrs. Gouthro proposed by the Acting President, Mr. C. Maine, and seconded by Secretary, J. M. Greene, was carried by loud applause. Speeches of thanks on behalf of the Committee to Messrs. Jos. Murphy, well known in sporting circles, and Mr. C. F. Taylor, now celebrated for his management of our Regattas the past three years, for their donations of cups, and to Mr. W. J. Higgins, the athletic authority of Newfoundland, were made by Mr. Maine and Greene. The trophies this year were the best ever competed for on the island. All silver cups were given for the individual events, and silver medals for second place, while in the relay and football contests, gold medals were given. While here it may be noted that all the cups were won by representatives of the Dominion Athletic Associations. 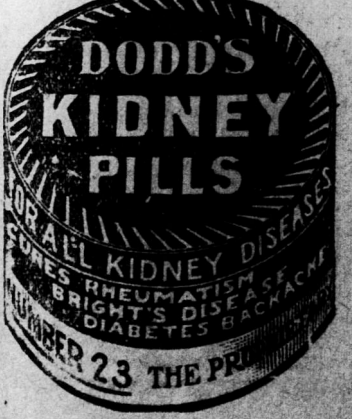
