





Wellington.

On a hundred and forty-four years ago today the Duke of Wellington was a boy. The Duke's real name was Arthur Wellesley, but he did not use it very long, as every time he won a battle the English Parliament would call him several kinds of a viscount or baronet, and in the later years of his life he had to get out new visiting cards every month. He was a gaunt, severe man, and lived mostly on popular acclaim and rare beefsteak, for both of which he had a 60-horse power appetite.

Wellington was born in a castle in Ireland and his profession in life was whipping the French army whenever he met it. The castle was a poor place to live in, as it did not have a bathroom or vacuum cleaner, and Wellington soon went to Eton college, later going to a military school in France, where he learned to perfume his conversation with some of the most popular French quotations.

As soon as Wellington was out of school he started in pursuit of the French army, which was roaming around Spain and attacking people who didn't know the Champs d'Elysees from a new 5-cent cigar. Wellington went over to Spain for the purpose of conducting the funeral of several thousand French soldiers, and by the time he got through the flower of the French army looked like a frosted asparagus bed.

Wellington was about to retire and commune with the gout when Napoleon broke out of Elba and went on the war path. The English people did not like Napoleon's manners, or his blunt style of doing business, and they implored Wellington to go and head him off before he captured Hyde Park and the property owners abolishing thereon. Wellington sent a polite note to Napoleon, requesting him to await and back up, or words to that effect, and on the latter's refusal to do either he took several of the English militia and started for the field of Waterloo.

Napoleon had 130,000 men to Wellington's 70,000, but Napoleon's army was nourished on cream, putts and orange blanc mange and opposed to fighting on an empty stomach. Nevertheless, it took Wellington three days to convince Napoleon that his star was about to set with a bitter plunk, and then it was a re-inforcement of Prussian warriors that turned the trick.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, May 1. To-day's bulletin says: The Duchesse de Devonshire had some wireless counting the night. Her general condition this morning is slightly improved.

NEWMARKET, May 1. The two thousand guinea stake was won by W. Louvrie, C. B. Ismay's Crazanhour coming second, and R. Whitney's Meeting House, third.

LONDON, May 1. The arson campaign was renewed this morning, when a large stable at Hendon, London, N.W., was destroyed by fire. The usual placards.

LONDON, May 1. The Dominion of Canada is going to be a favorable holiday resort during parliamentary recess this year. The visitors will include members of both sides of the House. They leave England in July for the Antipodes by way of the Dominion.

LONDON, May 1. Miss Kenney, one of the most notorious of the suffragettes, was arrested to-day, as soon as she set foot in England, on her arrival from the Continent. Detectives accompanied her from Paris, bearing a warrant, charging her with conspiracy.

LONDON, May 1. Two cents has brought a letter from the South Pole to London. This is believed to be the record in cheap postage. Two letters, with only a penny stamp, have just been received by Sir Joseph Ward, former Premier of New Zealand. They were mailed in the Polar regions by the late Capt. Scott of the British Antarctic Expedition.

LONDON, May 1. Acting on Kaiser Wilhelm's suggestion of some months ago, an international conference of shipping interests will be held in London, probably in September next, to deliberate on matters concerning the greater safety of life and property at sea, with a view to the completion of the uniform regulations and life-saving rules framed by the Board of Trade directly after the Titanic disaster. These laws come into force on March 1st, and will, it is expected, be amended to some extent, when the boats' davits committee presents its final report. Interchange of opinions is now taking place between the different governments interested. Other measures, notably equipment, ice observation vessels, and the diversion of North Atlantic liners further South, have already been adopted. On July 1st, the new radio-telegraphic agreement will take effect throughout the world. Among other things, it provides for constant wireless watch on ocean-going passenger steamers, and the interruption of long-distance messages for four minutes at the end of every quarter hour, and at times when it is likely that distress calls might otherwise be heard.

LONDON, May 1. A proposal that the Montenegrin seaports of Antivari and Dubrovnik shall be occupied by a joint international force of Austrians, Italians and British troops, as a further demonstration to assure King Nicholas that the European Powers are resolved to carry out their decision in regard to the inclusion of Albania in the future Kingdom of Albania, is to be made at to-day's meeting of Ambassadors in London. Should Austria accept this middle course, its adoption will allow time for further pressure to be brought to bear on Montenegro, and for making arrangements to provide her with compensation of some kind. The reply of Montenegro to Europe's demand for immediate evacuation has been received. It is non-committal in character, and keeps the door open for further negotiations. The little Kingdom tells the Powers that it has the greatest deference for them, and declares the capture of Scutari to be in no way a defiance of their decision to give the former Turkish fortress to Albania. At the same time Montenegro suggests there is room for discussion, and reserves the right of bringing up the question of Scutari in the course of the peace negotiations. When the definite delimitations of Albania come up for discussion by the Balkan Allies and the Powers, King Nicholas thus, while he has not consented to yield Scutari, has opened the way for further discussion. In the meantime, arrangements are in progress for the definite conclusion of peace between the Balkan Allies and Turkey. The European Powers have requested the respective governments to appoint plenipotentiaries, who, on meeting in London, will be invited to sign a draft, which the Powers have already drawn up, and which is moderate in tone. Montenegro's reply to the Powers has cleared much electricity out of the diplomatic atmosphere. There is a much more hopeful feeling that an early settlement may be reached. The impression derived by diplomats here from King Nicholas' note is that he is extending his hand, waiting for the compensation which is offered him, and that, as soon as it is forthcoming he will grant Scutari. The general belief prevails that the danger point will be safely passed without a split in the European entente.

St. Louis Specialist Blames Fallen Arches on Standing in Street Cars. St. Louis, March 20.—Dr. A. E. Black, a foot specialist, shocked the leaders of fashionable society here to-day when he made the statement that many of the women are suffering from that most plebeian ailment, fallen arch, or, as it is more commonly known, flat feet. Dr. Black said that while some of the more than one hundred cases which he has been called upon to treat in the last few days might be traced to the new style English walking shoe, most of them were caused by standing in street cars.

Notes and Comments.

The Home Rule Bill which was rejected by the House of Lords is to be introduced again into the House of Commons next week in the precise form it left the lower chamber. It is expected that it will be rejected a second time by the Lords, but on passing the Commons a third time and after receiving the King's assent, of which there is no room for doubt, it will become law, and a parliament will in due course be established in Dublin, and put an end to a long continued and unifying strife.

"For refunds on other goods" (except coal) "imported into the Colony and exported out again, we took a vote of \$16,000. That vote is over-drawn to-day about \$3,000. This is the reason for the \$20,000 vote put down here. For instance, we have been paying refunds on tea, sugar, etc., exported out of the Colony and we would find ourselves in an awkward position if we did not take the vote to pay back these amounts between now and the 20th of June." So said Mr. Cashin in his reply to some criticism of the Supplementary Supply by Mr. Kent.

This brings out one of the situations in which the Government has landed itself by its reckless bid for votes in putting tea, sugar, etc., on the Free List without counting the cost. Not only has the Government lost the revenue from the old duties on new imports after the date of the Free importation, but it has been losing duty on the old importations which have been sent out of the country by importers who wished to get the duty back and bring in the same articles under the Free List.

In addition there will be the loss on the revenue on glucose which paid \$40 per cent, which the cheaper sugar is now displacing in the manufacture of confectionary, and there will naturally follow a smaller importation of confectionary and jam. The duties on these goods remain, and with sugar free of duty will give confectioners and jam manufacturers a great chance to cut out the imported articles, the effect of which will be to jeopardize

James Allen, Minister of Finance and Defense in the Massey Cabinet of New Zealand, was the guest of honor to-day at a luncheon given by the Canadian branch of the Empire Parliament Association. In his address he directed attention to the Pacific cable. It will, he said, soon be necessary to duplicate a part of it and New Zealand would not be found wanting when it came to putting her hand in her pocket to find money for that operation.

LONDON, May 1.
 From now on it will be war, real war. This was the deliverance of the presiding officer, Miss Macaulay, of the militant suffragettes at a weekly meeting at Essex Hall last night. The women cheered the announcement. That belligerent suffragettes were not daunted by the capture of their stronghold and the arrest of their leaders was evidenced by the attendance which far exceeded the capacity of the Hall. Hundreds of women were unable to get in and remained outside the gates throughout the meeting. In attempting to suppress the militants' union, Miss Macaulay declared the Government had tackled a bigger job than it was able to carry through. No amount of imprisonment of its members, or torture by forcible feeding, would make them abandon the fight until victory had been won.

Cowboy Act at Rossley's.
 Last night one of the finest acts ever staged was put on at Rossley's Theatre. The hall was so crowded that a great many had to go away disappointed at not being able to get in. It is the greatest comedy and funniest of all the acts seen here.  Dear Sir,—Just to satisfy the mind of "Cock-a-doodle-do" will you please publish the facts of that record hatch of chicken mentioned in your paper of the 30th April.

The incubator I use holds 120 eggs, more or less according to size of eggs. At the start I had 121 eggs, and at the first test on the 14th day I took from the machine only 1 unfertile egg, leaving in six others that I marked doubtful. On the 18th day these were removed, leaving 114 tested eggs, and on the 21st day I took from the machine 104 chicks, the remaining 8 eggs contained weaklings. Evidently Cock-a-doodle-do has been having poor success with his incubator.

Three Persons Shot Dead.

TWO POLICEMEN AND A WOMAN. — SHOT AT AN INN.—CAPTURED IN A DRAIN.

Three people were shot dead yesterday afternoon at the little colliery village of Bedlington, Northumberland. A man-hunt followed, and John Amos, a man of about thirty-two years, is now in custody charged with the triple offence.

The victims were Sergeant Barton and Police Constable Musle, of the Northumberland Police, and Mrs. Sarah Grice, wife of an innkeeper. The circumstances are singular. There is a custom, it appears, by which a manager of a licensed house may be dismissed and a new tenant installed on the same day, and it was the exercise of this custom which is said to have led to yesterday's affray. Amos, who has travelled a good deal, having visited America on more

than one occasion, has been for six weeks tenant of the Sun Inn, a recently rebuilt, fully licensed house at Bedlington. This is owned by Mr. J. Wood Irons, of Newcastle, who has a license in his own name. Mr. Irons yesterday gave Amos his notice, and introduced a new tenant, Richard Grice.

Amos disputed the validity of the notice and refused to go, so it is alleged, until a bond for £60 was returned to him, but the owner declined to give this up until there was a settlement of accounts. About four o'clock, Mr. Irons, Mr. Grice, and a friend of the latter were in the cellar taking stock. Amos was upstairs, and it appears that Constable Musle entered the house during this time and tried to exercise his influence to induce Amos to leave quietly. But Amos, it is alleged, after some words, produced an American Winchester repeating rifle, which he had apparently loaded previously, and fired. Musle was hit in the neck and fell. He died a few seconds later.

Amos then turned, it is said, and fired at Mrs. Grice, who was just descending to the cellar. She dropped down the ladder into the cellar. Police Sgt. Barton, who had been called by the neighbors when the shots were heard, then entered, and Amos fired at him twice, both bullets striking him in the chest. The sergeant fell and died instantly.

Smoking a Cigarette.

By this time a crowd had gathered outside, but Amos, instead of making off, is stated to have walked out in front, carrying his rifle and daring anyone to touch him. Meanwhile he lit and smoked a cigarette. Messengers went for the police, the headquarters of the district being only a short distance away, and Amos, as their approach grew imminent, retired into the house. He was seen by a neighbor to kiss his wife. Then he fled by the back way, still carrying his rifle, and by its means keeping the crowd from following him. By the time the police arrived he was lost sight of behind a hay stack.

Headed by Inspector Cully, the police quickly followed the trail, having first obtained three shot guns. The haystack was surrounded, but this was found to be a blind trail, and then the path was followed straight on to Hartford Woods, lying less than half a mile away. More police, summoned by telephone and cyclists, had by this time arrived, and while the Bedlington contingent searched Hartford Woods, others made their way towards Bedlington, searching on the way.

"I'll Come Out!"

The search of the woods proved fruitless, and after more than two hours' work, in which a crowd of men and boys, numbering perhaps a hundred, assisted, a return was made towards Bedlington. As the haystack which had previously been searched was reached, Constable Smith noticed footmarks branching off towards a drain or culvert about two feet high. The police shouted down this but received no reply, so a shot gun was placed at the end and fired.

There was no reply to the first discharge, but after a second one a voice was heard crying, "I'll come out! I'll come out!" The police drew away and pointed their guns at the outlet, but Amos crept out without his rifle and held his hands up in token of surrender. He was arrested by Inspector Hutchinson and Constable Smith. The rifle was afterwards found in the drain. Four cartridges had been discharged, it is stated, and one "live" one still remained in the rifle. Amos was taken to the police station and there detained after slight injuries which he had sustained from pellets had been dressed by Dr. Hudson, who was summoned for the purpose.


