
WASHINGTON, To-day.

A peace commission arrived at Juarez last night bearing the terms of surrender. The proclamation stated the Huerta Covernment is bankrupt and unable to supply soldiers. The simultaneous evacuation of other federal strongholds in the north is believed by the rebels to be the result of concerted decision to abandon the whole of Seven generals of the Mexican reg decision to abandon the whole of Northern Mexico. A peace proposal sent by General Mercado to General Villa, rebel leader, through Frederico Moye, Civil Governor of Chihuahua appointed adinterim, came clor with it.
