Prompt Action Needed.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—I am receiving letters from parents in this Dominion explaining that their sons in Canada—chiefly around Sydney—are being conscripted, or are liable to conscription, under the Canadian Military Service Act, 1917, and asking me to procure exemption for these sons, frequently upon the grounds known as (B) and (C) in our local Act—that brothers have served or are serving in His Majesty's Forces.

I have to explain to my correspondents, as I wish to here, for a wider circle, that grounds (B) and (C) in our Act have no counter-part in the Canadian Act, and, therefore,

in the Canadian Act, and, therefore, that their sons in Canada cannot get exemption there on these grounds.

I have, however, in one or two I have, however, in one or two cases, been instrumental in getting exemptions in Sydney, through a legal friend of mine there, on other grounds, and I am willing to give such aid as I can in any cases which seem to me to be really deserving.

I take this opportunity to suggest to our Government the situation of Newfoundlanders whose homes are in this Dominion, and who have gone to Canada to work temporarily. Inasmuch as their labour has in the main been sought for such essential occupations as mining or steel manuoccupations as mining or steel manufacturing, and a refusal to allow them to go to Canada would at the time they went have been considered churlish, they ought, perhaps, to be allowed to continue their work, and not be conscripted. If not, they should be allowed to come here. They ought, in any case, to be given the same right to exemption as they would have here, and given a chance, if subject to conscription, or saying whether they would join our Regiment or the Canadian Forces.

This should at once be the subject of diplomatic action, and I cannot conceive that any real difficulty would be experienced in arriving at

German People Realize THE DECEIT OF THE HIGH COM-MAND.

Geneva, June 18.—The enthusiasm reated by the first German offensive deception reigns among the German people, according to an interview with a neutral diplomat who has just arrived in Geneva from Berlin, in La Suissett. Such cards when filled in and signed may be mailed free of charge.

It is not intended that the notification of births as set forth above shall interfere with the reporting of births for re-gistration at present carried out by the Clergymen, who will still continue such registration, transmitting a correct copy of the same to the Registrar General as usual.

Documents to Be Carried

Every Male Person who is not on Active Service in any of His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces, or in the Naval or Military Forces of any of His Majesty's Allies, and who apparently may be, or is reasonably suspected to be, within the description of CLASS ONE under the Military Service Act, 1918

Notice is hereby given that upon and after the 1st day of July, 1918, every male person who is not on active service in any of His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces, or in the Naval or Military Forces of His Majesty's Allies, and who apparently may be, or is reasonably suspected to be, within the description of Class One under the Military Service Act, 1918, by whom or on whose behalf, it is at any time affirmed, claimed or alleged that he is not, whether by reason of age, status, nationality, exception, or otherwise, within Class One under the Military Service Act, 1918, as defined for the time being, or that, although within the said Class, he is exempted from or not liable to military service; is advised to have with him upon his person at all times or in or upon any building or premises where he at any time is,

If it be claimed that he is not within the Class by reason of age, a baptismal certificate of the date of his

MARRIAGE

If it be claimed that he is not within the Class by reason of marriage, a certificate, either official or signed by two reputable citizens, residing in the community in which he lives and having knowledge of the facts. certifying to his marriage and the date of his marriage, and that his wife is living; or

NATIONALITY

If it be claimed that he is not within the Class by reason of his nationality, a certificate of his nationality, signed by a Consul or Vice-Consul of the foreign State or Country to which he claims his allegiance is due; or a passport issued by the Government of that Country establishing his nationality; or

ACTIVE SERVICE

If it be claimed that he is excepted as a member of any of His Majesty's Forces or as having since the 4th August, 1914, served in the Military or Naval Forces of Great Britain or her Allies in any theatre of actual war and has been honourably discharged therefrom, official documents or an official certificate evidencing the fact; or

ECCLESIASTICAL STUDENTS

If it be claimed that he is excepted as an Ecclesiastical Student, a certificate signed by the head in Newfoundland of his religious denomination; or

EXEMPTION

If it be claimed that he is exempted from or not liable to military service by reason of any exemption granted or claimed or application pending under the Military Service Act, 1918, or the regulations thereunder, his exemption papers, or a certificate of the Registrar or Deputy Registrar evidencing the fact;

FAILURE TO CARRY REQUISITE EVIDENCE

If upon or after the 1st day of July, 1918, any such male person be found without the requisite evidence or certificate upon his person or in or upon the building or premises in which he is, he shall thereupon be presumed to be a person at the time liable for military service and to be a deserter or defaulter without leave. and subject to prosecution as such and to the penalty provided under the Military Service Act.


