

#### The Sealing Fleet.

Within the past four years there has been a steady decline in the numron this year, three steel and seven the Diana, Thetis, Terra Nova, Neptune, Ranger, Eagle and Viking, the and Fogota. The total gross tonnage of the ships above named is three thousand, five hundred and ninetynine, their crew complement being sixteen hundred and ninety-seven men. Since last year two of the Munn. wooden ships, which formed part of the fleet, the Kite and Erik, both with Hutchings, R. Herder, Trapnell, Cangood sealing records, have been lost, the latter meeting her fate at the hands of a German submarine off St. Pierre in August, 1918, the former being dashed to pieces later in the season, on the rock-bound shores of the Laurentian Gulf, a fit end for a gallant ship, which had for many years hunted the seal among the Gulf icefloes, and far more dignified than being sent to the bottom by Hun

It is remarkable that as the old ships pass away, they are not replaced by others of similar type, the reason for which may be their unfitness for any other class of ocean work, because of their slow rate of speed. No attempt has been made to build locally a vessel of the old style Dundee Whaler class, even before the days of the "ironclad" ice-hunter, and it is very unlikely that ever there will be such a class of ship built in Newfoundland, the modern tendency being toward steel ice-breakers with plenty of speed and huge carrying capacity. As the old vessels go out one by one, and their names are removed from the registry, nothing but memories of them will remain, but many a tale will be told future generations of their battles amid ice and fog and blizzard and gale, when they brought to port the wealth wrested from nature at her worst and made the name of the Newfoundland sealer famous throughout the world.

The days of the sailing fleet too have gone, when stately lines of brigs, brigantines and schooners sailed from many of our ports in quest of the harp and hood. Only a vestige of the old glories remain, in the sending out at Channel this year o some five fore-and-aft schooners to the Gulf, the prospects of a success ful voyage, looking, according to those versed in the lore of weather, ice and seals particularly promising.

And to both the steam and sailing vessels, we wish the best of luck. With everything appearing to forecast a prosperous Spring, there will be given the encouragement and impetus to start the voyage in high hope of returning with "bloody decks and greasy holds," and may their desire be to them. 



#### **Another Attempt** at Northeast Passage.




