The ordinary microscope will, in favourable circumstances, magnify up to about 3.000 diamteres, so as to render visible an object measuring only about one quarter-millionth of an inch across: but with the latest kind of instrument, known as the ultra-micro scope, which magnifies up to 30,000 liametres, or 900 million times the size, objects can be distinguished that have a diameter of only one five-millionth of an inch.

Of course, no details of the structure of such minute objects are visible, but when suspended in water they are observed to be in a state of movement They are so small that they pass through ordinary blotting-paper. Dutch Fleet

Defeated by British. On Wednesday, October 11, 1797, during the reign of George the Third.

a splendid victory was won by the British fleet against the Dutch one, off the east coast of Great Britain, in the North Sea, the battle being named from Camperdown, which is near Dundee, on that coast of Scotland. The Dutch seemed to be threatening to invade this country, and the British fleet were commanded by Admiral Adam Duncan, who for this complete success was created a viscount, with a pension of £3,000 a year for himself and the two next heirs of this peerage. But that is now their second title, for in 1831 earl, so that the present successor, Adam Philips Haldane Duncas-Haldane is third Earl of Camperdown. . In former times the Dutch were great navigators, before the British became such, and this earl had for two years the tedious duty of Dutch, capturing eight of their ships.
