It was strange that the hotel keepers, when it was proposed to bring the exhibition here, were ready to guarantee that they could accommodate 5000 people, and now when volunteers were to be concentrated at the County Town—when these men who were ready and willing to defend our homes and save the country from insult and injury, saked for a week's board and lodging, they could not accommodate 385 men. What other conclusion could they come to than that these men were influenced in this matter by a spirit of intense selfishness. If such is the spirit they manifest, then the sooner we take the matter in our own hands the better. He, as a citizen of Guelph, were perfectly willing to pay his proportion of the expense necessary to board and lodge the volunteers.
