It is impossible to estimate the number of Indians that inhabit these unexplored regions, but they are inoffensive and unidemonstrative, and the traffic carried on by them is found to be very great. The principal articles of commerce or the lower Veayali are fish, land and river turtle, salt, lard, guins, and oil of copailsa. The temperature is very pleasant, agreeable, and cool, as in Peru.


