McAULEY ANGRY

He says he is one of the few Chicago members of the Red Cross Society who refused to tear off the badge of organization and shoulder a rifle in behalf of the Boers.

McAuley alleges he stuck to the ambulance and tended both the Boer and British wounded.

Dr. McAuley is very incensed at the treatment which he declares Americans have shown him.

He himself, he adds, was thrown into the sea five days ago, and being shipped off to Europe.

Hitting the Boers Heavily

General Roberts Reports Several Successful Encounters With the Enemy.

Two Commandants Killed and One Wounded—Prince Christian Victor's Success.

London, Nov. 12.—The war office has received the following despatch from Lord Roberts:

"Johannesburg, Nov. 10.—Methuen surprised Commandants Snyman and Gertze on the 10th November.

Three dead Boers were found, and 50 prisoners and several wagons were captured.

"Kelly-Kenny reports that Major Mackintosh, of the Beaufort Highlanders, surprised a Boer force on the 10th November.

The Boers fled in all directions. Three wounded were brought to our hospital.

Surgeon Hartley and seven men were wounded.

"Lytleton reports that Kitchener successfully surprised the Boers during the night of the 10th November.

A party of the 19th Hussars and the Gloucester Mounted Infantry, under Capt. Chetwood, managed to get the Boer commandant, while the Gloucesters engaged the enemy's picket.

The Hussars charged the Boers in the moonlight, and the Boers fled.

Chetwood and several non-commissioned officers acted with great bravery, but the Hussars would probably have suffered severely, as they got into bad ground, had they not been supported by the mounted infantry.

In the morning the artillery and infantry joined the Boers, and completed the Boer rout, the latter being said to have lost heavily.

"The Boers, who were reported to have returned from the Boer camp, report that Commandant Prinsloo and Gen. Fourie were killed, and that Gen. Grobler was wounded.

Pratoria, Nov. 11.—Reports have been received here showing that the plan of campaign has been decided upon by the Boers, who contemplate having each commando defend the district in which it is raised.

HE SPREAD DISEASE

Milkman Allowed His Son, Sick With Typhoid, to Milk Cows.

Montreal, Nov. 9.—The outbreak of typhoid fever in two convents in this city has been traced to the milk supply obtained from a farmer named Choquet, of Beollet. There are twenty cases so far in the two institutions.

Will Not Consent

Li Hung Chang Says (Chinese) Will Refuse to Execute Officials.

And the Court is Preparing For Further Flight to the Interior.

German Papers Continue to Publish Stories of atrocities.

London, Nov. 9.—"Li Hung Chang telegraphs," says the Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Express, "that he despairs of a settlement and that it is useless to expect the Chinese court to consent to the execution of Yu Hsien or Tung Fu Hsiang. He declares that it is equally vain to attempt to induce the powers to moderate their demands, and that therefore the court is preparing for a further flight to the province of Sze Chuan, with an imperial army of 14,000 men."

Berlin, Nov. 8.—The papers continue to print letters from German soldiers in China, showing terrible atrocities committed by German troops. A printed report describes the capture of a certain village. "Bayonets were fixed, and our lieutenant was commanded to shoot down or beyond the Chinese soldiers. During the night many Chinese were killed, including a woman and a child."

St. Petersburg, Nov. 8.—Learned men of the city are planning an expedition to examine the immense number of manuscripts at Mukden discovered by Russian troops among them being ancient Greek and Roman documents, supposed to have been taken by the Mongolians on their retreat from the Occident. They are reported to be of great historical value.

Washington, Nov. 8.—Count Cassini, the Russian ambassador, said to-day, in regard to the reported acquisition of territory in Tibet (Asia) by the Russian government, that he felt very sure no such step had been taken. He touched upon the possibility of a Russian concession similar to the British and French allotments having been made, but dismissed the report that Russia had summarily taken possession of the territory referred to as entirely improbable.

London, Nov. 8.—Vice-Admiral Sir Edward Hobart Seymour, K.C.B., in command of the China station since 1897, who is to be succeeded by Vice-Admiral Sir Harry Holdsworth Rawson, has been appointed a G. C. B., and Naval Captain Bailey, T. Burke, Callaghan and Tallace have been appointed G. C. B.'s for service in China.

Mayor's Banquet

Lord Salisbury Speaks on the National Events of the Year.

Dilates Upon Strengthening the Ties Between Mother and Colonies.

And Closes With Appeal to British People to Maintain Defences.

London, Nov. 9.—What is possibly the most brilliant of all public functions in England, the Lord Mayor's banquet, took place this evening, Lord Salisbury, in the presence of 900 guests, including United States Ambassador Choate, the members of the British cabinet and many of the leading men of England, spoke as follows of the United States elections: "We believe that the cause which has been won is the cause of civilization and commercial honor. We believe their principles to be at the root of all prosperity and all progress in the world. Therefore we claim that we have secured the right to reject a man who has taken place as the distinguished gentleman (referring to Mr. Choate) who sits at my side."

This was followed by loud and prolonged cheering. Lord Salisbury's incursion into the internal politics of the United States was preceded by an apology, in the course of which he said:

"One of the circumstances which gratifies me most during the last year is the very hearty feeling displayed between this country and the United States. I hope Mr. Choate will forgive me if there is any irregularity in my expression. It is quite wrong for a secretary of state to make any observations in respect to the internal politics of any other country, but I am soon to give up my office. In view of this abandonment, which is close at hand, I hope Mr. Choate will forgive me for expressing the sympathy with which we in this country have heard of what has recently taken place in the United States."

Mr. Choate, replying a few minutes later to the toast of the diplomatic corps, declared that Lord Salisbury had stated, with such truth, simplicity and earnestness, the result of the election that he (Choate) would not attempt to add to it, although he would not fail to refer to the noble Lord upon the fact that his remarks had been made after instead of before election. (Laughter.)

Except in his references to the United States, the speech of the Premier cast an extraordinary glow over the gathering. The Colonel commanding the City Imperial Volunteers, Lord Salisbury started his hearers who considered the Premier's remarks by satirizing the war fever, although praising the courage of the soldiers and the confidence in the military valour evidenced by the populace. Many produce a change of attitude on the part of the world when viewing English character.

When with lowered voice and almost trembling accents, he spoke of the ravages of death, dealing especially with the Queen's bereavement in the person of Prince Victor, who with bent head and hands clasped, he uttered a hope, almost a prayer, that Lord Roberts' memory be spared the sorrow now hanging over him by reason of the critical condition of his daughter. The tears sprang to the eyes of the women and the men moved comfortably in their seats.

The Premier reviewed the events of the last twelve months. He mentioned the Empress of China, who went on, he said, had forced war upon Great Britain. He maintained that the British war effort had deserved great credit for the way in which it had handled these emergencies.

"In spite of nebulous and fictitious attacks, we should be glad to improve all the defects of the war office, and our most efforts will be devoted to that task—but I should rather deprecate any unnecessary examination into what has occurred. You will not add to the enthusiasm of the troops by so doing."

He dilated upon the strengthened ties between the Mother Country and the Colonies during the year, and poked fun at the delay consequent upon the European concert when dealing with China, he declared, to comment upon the negotiations while in progress, he said, that he would make an exception in the case of the Anglo-German accord.

"This he remarked, 'represents the feelings of most, if not all, the powers allied. It is impossible to lay too much emphasis upon the integrity of China, and the open door, and by putting out of defence the great advantage that the powers should have expressed themselves in favor of fundamental principles if they are achieved, the issue of the China problem need not concern us very anxiously.' He maintained that the idea of invading China with 'our scanty forces' or of approaching the stupendous task of governing China instead of leaving it to be governed by the Chinese, was most dangerous.

Relations into peace, Lord Salisbury admitted that the trend of recent events has almost put an end to the hopes of the Russian Emperor and of those who took part in the peace conference at The Hague.

His speech closed with a fervid appeal to the people of Great Britain to maintain their defences in such a perfect condition that 'we shall not be exposed to any sudden interruption of the peace upon which our prosperity depends.' He claimed the Premier, 'is not a reform, no improvement, is of the slightest importance unless security against external interference is obtained by putting out of defence in such a position that no accident may happen beyond our borders that shall make our own country a prey to the enemy.' Airship For War Purposes

The German Government Has Bought Count Zeppelin's Wonderful Invention.

Further Experiments With It Will Be Conducted at Berlin.

New York, Nov. 9.—The German government has bought Count Zeppelin's airship for military purposes at a high price, says a Geneva despatch to the World. The ship is to be removed to Berlin shortly, and further experiments will be carried on there. The Kaiser is interested in the invention. It is mainly through his influence that the purchase was made.

Since the first balloon trip was made, says the New York Sun, the great problem of aeronautics has been to achieve that same result over the sea. The fact that the airship has been bought by the German government is a demonstration of the fact that the airship is a practical invention.

Count Zeppelin is said to have expressed a belief that a few improvements will render his ship capable of flying over the sea. He is now working on his invention, and it is expected that it will be ready for service in a few months.
