"We do not tase much stock in the rebellion here. We are not loyal enough to be very anxious to volunteer in such a doubtful cause, and not quite exasperated enough over our wrongs to join the rebels. The farmers are going on as usual getting in their spring crops, and people in the east seem to be making far more fuss over the trouble than we are here. Wheat sowing is almost over with us already as the weather has been very fine this spring, and we anticipate a good year. New settlers are coming in about the same as in the past two seasons, but they do not go as far west now."

A Stormy Scene in Parliament over the Irish Registration Bill - The Government takes time to Consider the Matter. LONDON, April 24.—There was a stormy discussion in the commons this evening over the bill for the registration of voters in Ireland. providing that the charges for registration be providing that the charges for registration be provided for by the general government instead of locally. Mr. Gladstone vigorously opposed the amendment. Mr. Childers implored the Irish members to have patience, and claimed that their proposal would cause an additional burden upon the taxpayers of £130,000. Mr. Nolan was obturate, and the amendment was carried by 62 to 53. After the announcement of the vote Mr. Gladstone adjourned the debate in order that the government might consider the question.

There was much excitement in the house over the government's defeat. Before the division Mr. Gladstone stated that the government reserved freedom of action if the amendment carried.

HOW TO FIGHT BARBARIANS.

A subsequent calegram as such as a secret under such as such as a It happens sometimes that we have to fight barbarians, savages and semi-savages. killed by an insignificant little savage, Having the means to sweep such savages off the face of the earth, with very little

risk to our own men, why have we not used them?
In this Indian warfare of ours, in the Northwest, the same general considerations hold good. We should not be obliged to seek the savages on their own ground. They, if they want to fight, should have to come to us, not we to them. But the one drawback to this is the existence of far back and detached settlements. Let it be recognized that we have savages to deal with, and act accordingly. At convenient points let there be forts sufficiently garisoned, each one of them with shot and shell enough to blow ten thousand Indians off the ground in an hour. And what then would happen? This, simply, that the savages would not make any attack at all.

They would let us alone, and there would her own grease if Germany did not come to her aid, which is always a contingency to be dreaded, for the sympathies of Berlin are rather more with the east than with the west of Europe. But Britain needs to send no army to invade Russia, no such thing has ever been thought of. Napoleon's invasion is not likely to be repeated. but if he had in his time armed Poland and Hungary he might have driven the Tartar back to his native wilds. Britain's proper course would be now to treat Russia as a barbaric power, with whom treaties are valueless. Let us realise that we have barbarians to dea with and act accordingly. To treat Russig as a civilized power has been a profound mistake all through. Her statesmen do write diplomatic notes, in French, but her Cossack officers do as they please in Central Asia. We have to deal with savages wearing a thin disguise of civilization. Mr. Gladstone's mistaken friendship for the great robber power of Europe will yet cost England dear.

A GOOD SUNDAY DINNER. Fillet of Veal Stuffed With Ham - Boston Cream Cakes for Dessert.

Try this for to-morrow:

Peasoup.

Fillet of veal, with ham.

Mashed potato. Spinach.

Cabbage salad.

Boston cream cakes.

Coffee.

The pea soup is delicious if made with a can of green pras in a becfstock.

Fillet of Veal with Ham.—Have the veal rolled and skewered by the butcher. Stuff a good forcement of crumbs and minced ham between the folds of the meat, and lay sliced ham over the top and sides, bindings in place with pack thread. Put a cup of boiling water in the pan, and roast twelve minutes for each pound. Baste very often. Half an hour before you take it up remove the ham and lay on one side of the pan; dredge with flour and and baste abundantly till well browned. Dish with the ham cut in strips and laid about the edge of the dish. Strain the gravy, season, thicken with browned flour, and serve in a boat.

Boston Cream Cakes—According to Marion Harland should be made as follows: Take one-half pound of butter, three-fourths of a pound of flavor, six eggs and a pint of warm, not scalding milk. Stir the butter into the warm water and heat slowly to a boil. Then put in the flour, boil and stir one minute, and empty into a dish to get cold. Beat the eggs light and whip, first the yolks, then the whites, into the cooled paste. Drop in great spoonfuls upon buttered paper, not letting them touch each other, and bake in a quick oven for ten minutes. They should puff up to four times their original size. Pass a sharp knife lightly around each spitt, and fill with the cream.

Filling for Cream Cakes.—One quart of milk, four tablespoonfuls of corn starch, two eggs, two cups of sugar, one teaspoonful of butter and vanilla to season. Heat three cups of milk and stir in the corn starch wet with the other cupful. Beat the eggs and sugar together and add the bolling nixture by degrees. Put in the butter, mix well and cool before adding the vanilla.

FLOODS IN MONTREAL.

MONTREAL, April 24.-A resident of Laprairie stated that a large portion of the village was this morning more or less under water, the fiver having overflowed in several in skiffs. A great deal of loss must result. A telegram from Point Claire this morning says the ice is showing here. There is a mountain of ice stuck on Point Claire lighthouse. Water came with a rush upon the people of Point St. Charles and St. Gabriel village simultaneously. The flood might be said to have made an attack in two wings, one south from

roundation, compelling the cars issuing from the pridge to the city to take side tracks till reaching near Wellingtonstreet.

The porth wing of the flood had a much more disastrous effect on private property. Yards and houses that at seven o'clock this The north wing of the flood had a much more disastrous effect on private property. Yards and house's that at seven o'clock this moraing were comparatively dry were submerged in five feet of water at it and at 3 o'clock this afternoon. Many people were driven completely out of their homes and were taking refuge on higher ground on the Lachine road. The water came most suddanly up Congregatiou, Magdalen, Hibernia, Fayard and adjacent streets. Point St. Charles, Richmond street and Seigneurs street, Montreal, and in a word the whole of St. Gabriel village, which presented at 3 pm. one vast lake, the water in many places averaging six to eight feet.

Ste. Cunegonde also suffered considerably, but the main flow of the flood seems to have been out off from it by the Lachine canal, which, in many places, presented a formidable cataract. The scenes caused by the sudden irrupution of water in many cases were painful as well as ludicrous. In two houses in St. Gabriel village sick and helpless persons were seen being taken in beds and placed on a raft to be sent to a place of safety. Cattle and poultry were in every direction seen in a half drowned condition plying their way to the high ground.

The company will sell on deferred payments covering at least ten years.

Do take an old friend's advice and show your wisdom and increase your real influence by declining to pursue what is evidently a wrong method to obtain your end. You have a right to agitate for a secular Sunday and seven days work all of right, for if the people of this city had beer sufficiently anxious for libellous matter they or a secular Sunday and seven days work all you think proper, and if you are right you can et the law altered, and if wrong you wi like every honest citizen, bow to the decision of the pessele expressed by a majority. We shall not defy the law but go round it. Just what the law is on this vexed question we should like to know, and with Mr. Howland's assistance and Mr. Fenton's helping hand, we may soon learn. The Globe newspaper is a notorious lator of the Sunday law, and some well disposed citizens purpose surrounding that office to morrow evening and taking down names of those who it is alleged break the sanctity of the day by working on its Monday paper. The deacon however will not be caught; he will be found at the other end of the tele phone. While we again assure our eld friend of our high esteem and warm admiration we trust he will do his best to regulate the bad deacon and show him the error of preaching piety in his columns while he teaches disregard of moral and state law by keeping engravers and reporters at work all Sunday.


