BABES BURNED TO DEATH:

TWO CHILDREN OF JAMES SCOTT, REW LOWELI, CREMATED.

The Crazed Father Risked His Own Life in Attempting to Rescue His Children From the Flames, But Without Avail-The Mother Is Prostrated and May Not

New Lowell, Ont., Nov. 26. - The two baby children of James Scott of Sunnidale Township were burned to death last night. The explosion of a coal oil lamp is supposed to have started the

Shortly after 7 o'clock in the evening Mrs. Scott put the two children, aged 2 and 4 years, snugly in bed. The clothes were tucked closely around them

clothes were tucked closely around them with a mother's tender care. Then the lam, was turned low, and the wife and mother went with her husband to look after the stock in a barn, about 150 yards from the house.

They had been absent about 20 minutes, when Mr. Scott noticed a glare in the windows of the house. The whole room where the children lay sleeping seemed to be in flames. With quick perception the father noted the fiery gleam and ran toward the house. Bursting into the room, he was at first driven back by the smoke and flames that gushed forth. But the feeble cries of the little care imprisoned in the burning bedclothes gave the father renewed courage, and he dashed once more into the flames. Blinded by smoke, his head scorched by the fire, he groped for the bed, and seizing the two tots in their blazing nightgowns, he dashed from the building. The two children were very badly, burned, and, although everything was done to aid them, they died in a few hours. Mr. Scott was severely burned in his brave attempt to rescue his little cones.

There was no one in the house when the fire started except the two children. It is supposed that the lamp exploded or else was thrown to the floor by one of the children. The terrible affliction has seriously impaired Mrs. Scott's health, and she is now very ill.







Around the station now there is nothing to show the wealth and importance of the city. This should be looked to at once."







The Northwestern car lots were 20 per cent. less than last year. Exporters were reported buyers at the seaboard. Wheat started firm, was made temporarily weak by the increase in the visible, but closed strong, at 11-4c over Saturday. A decrease in the English visible, 1,240,000 bushels, offset the increase in the American visible, and led to the expectation of a moderate increase in the world's visible to-morrow. Provision market was again a puzzle. Under very large receipts of hogs and lower prices for them, the market did not break, but held very steady, with a moderate amount of business, consisting chiefly of buying by the public and selling oy the manufacturers. The closing was firm, in sympathy with strength in wheat, but this influence did not cause any advance in prices. There was some improvement reported in the cash demand for meats. 
