Messrs. Curry Bros & Bent have had some fine fish on exhibition in the Union Bank building.
The new fall of Saturday and Sunday renewed the sledding a bit and business has been unusually brisk this week.
The Cheese and Butter Company are asking for tenders for conveying milk to the factory over the various routes.
The net debt of Nova Scotia is \$184,000 less than that of New Brunswick, although our population is much greater.
President Trotter, of Acadia University, has secured about \$20,000 towards the \$60,000 to be subscribed by November 1st.
Mr. A. D. Hewat, the lately appointed general manager of the D. A. R., has his office at Halifax instead of Kentville.
Messrs. Callan, Whitman & Co., of Annapolis, have shipped over thirty cartons of fish to South America during the season.
Mr. Fred Baker, of Melvern Square, was married at Fredericton, N. B., on Monday to Miss Mattie Davidson of that city.
Mr. W. M. Forsyth has had a large ice house constructed and filled with cold blocks, as a necessary adjunct to his meat business.
Mr. Hugh Fowler leaves to-day on a trip to the eastern part of the province in the interests of the Bowker Fertilizer Company.
Lawrence town is to make Rev. Lew Walker its pastor, and receive him on Tuesday. Neighboring pastors have been invited.
There will be devotional services in the Y. M. C. A. room next Sunday at 4.30 in the afternoon and in the evening after church services.
The annual meeting of the Bridgetown Driving Park Company was called for last evening and was adjourned to meet on the 16th inst.
Irad Hardy (Lis) of Acadia University will preach in the Baptist Church, Dalhousie, next Sabbath evening, if the weather should be favourable.
The bill to incorporate the Lawrence town Butter and Cheese Manufacturing Company, Limited, has been passed by the legislative council.
Mr. Harry A. Snow intends moving to Lequille early in the spring where he will manufacture his "Canadian Jersey" cheese quite extensively.
Hardly a house where there are children is now being protected or above influenza from the deceptions of foreign fishing fleets, the result of this protection has not only encouraged Canadian fishermen to properly work their grounds, but it has raised the market price of the fish caught in our waters, and has increased the demand for foreign markets to such an extent that the supply is almost inadequate. Nova Scotia stands at the head of the Canadian provinces as a fishing ground, the catch in her waters being valued at over \$8,000,000, while her closest competitor, New Brunswick, is over a million dollars behind this estimate. The province by the sea will compare favourably with any other like area on the face of the globe in the extent of its great natural wealth and climatic perfection.
The chances are that Ontario is still under a Liberal regime, though the despatches this morning conflict a bit, one placing the standing of the parties at forty each, with two counties to be won, while the *Halifax Chronicle* claims a majority of ten for the Hardy government. It is likely that the majority is overstated in this case and the final result will probably not give the Liberals a majority of more than three or four. The election was much closer than was generally anticipated. In this province both parties considered the government party following equal, at least, to the late majority. The uncertainty of an election forecast is amply illustrated in the case. Ontario has been under Liberal government for thirty years and the management of its provincial affairs has been justly regarded by less prosperous provinces, surprised rather than deflated by the results. The Liberal party this year the federal government stood as a strong prop, and against all this was arrayed only a strong corps of opposition candidates with a banner inscribed with the old, old battle cry "It's time for a change."
So far as can be learned, the investigation into the cause of the destruction of the United States bark "Maine" in Havana harbor has been hampered of results. The divers sent to examine the wreck have encountered almost insuperable difficulties in their work, as the bottom of the harbor contains a great depth of mud in which the ill-fated ship is almost completely buried. The opinion that the explosion was caused by a hostile outside agency appears to be gaining ground, and the Spanish press is expressing, in very strong terms, indignation that such thoughts should be harbored by the American people. Excitement has apparently cooled a bit, but the situation is none the less dangerous, and an increased activity in United States naval and military circles is evidence that rapid preparation is being made for trouble.
There is an effort being made in United States political circles to push Mayor Van Wyck, of New York, as a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination in 1900. The movement is apparently confined to the east, as the middle and western states may be safely depended upon to support Bryan once more. His great popularity was strikingly evidenced over in the hour of his defeat, and his party platform has suffered no loss since the late election. They still adhere to the free silver cause and it has made gains for the party in nearly a score of state elections. To the casual observer it looks as though the gold standard Republicans have a harder fight before them than in 1896, and it is quite probable that they are advocating Van Wyck's candidacy in the hope of working confusion in the Democratic camp.
The provincial government has re-considered its determination to cancel the yearly grant of \$1000 to the Nova Scotia Farmers' Association, and that body will not be compelled to prosecute its work at the expense of individual members, as it had fully decided to do. The government is in a position to stimulate the general farming interests of the province, and considering its past record it may be expected to perform an abundance of good work in its particular field.
The minister of justice has decided that all the evidence in the case of Lyman Dart, the Toronto man convicted of the murder of the American pedlar, is consistent with the boy's testimony, and that he should be discharged. This decision is in harmony with a special report made by Judge Ritchie, the trial judge. The minister's report has been approved by the executive the governor-general in council.
The province French fish steamer, *La Champagne*, from Havre to New York, with first cabin, 20 second cabin, and 300 steerage passengers, and a crew of 100 persons, was off this harbor last Friday with her tall, white, black, and machinery painted by the Warren Line steamer *Bonnie*, after having been drifting about five days and nights.
