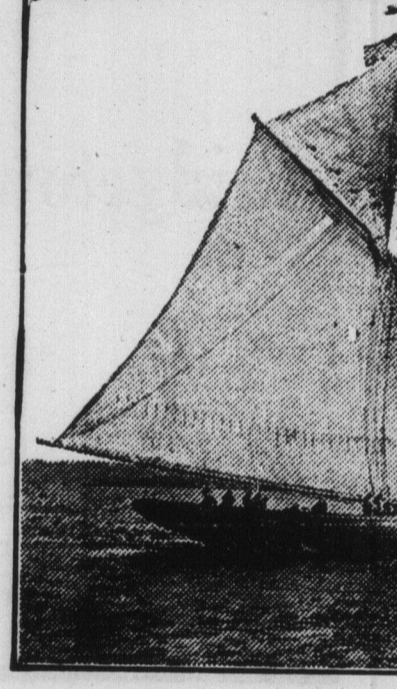

Fine feathers make fine birds in a material sense; but when you come to measure a man in the code by which men should be measured, what is the fisherman's stature? These hardy folk are the men to whom we entrust the development of our great fishery resources. They bear the great burden. All they expect of the balance of the population is a reasonable use of the product of their work. It is up to the public to assist them to develop the industry.

GOLD FIELD RUSH IN MANITOBA

The Pas, Man., Jan. 5.—The rush to Elbow Lake gold camp, 75 miles north of here, continues and nearly 500 claims have been staked out. Many prospectors have gone in and during the last week eleven two-horse freight teams have left with supplies. The Hollinger Company, of Porcupine, holders of the \$150,000 option on the Murray claims, have taken in complete supplies and a gang of 25 men who will start immediate development of the property. A number of claims near the original Murray discovery, which had been overlooked owing to heavy timber surrounding it, have been found by G. R. Bancroft, and he has accepted an offer of \$75,000 from a Toronto syndicate for his holdings.

BANK CASHIER SHORT \$754,000

St. Louis, Mo., Jan. 10.—Arthur O. Meisinger, fugitive cashier of the Night and Day Bank, late to-day was indicted on a charge of making a false report of the affairs of a corporation. His alleged defalcations are said to be \$754,000. The Night and Day Bank closed its doors last week.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ON FORESTRY BY CANADIAN FORESTRY ASSOCIATION

Q. How many railway ties are used for the Canadian railroads each year and what wood is chiefly employed? A. About twenty million ties. Jack Pine is the wood used for this purpose. A comparatively recent development has been the crosetting of Jack Pine ties so as to double their life.

Q. I have an island in Georgian Bay on which considerable white pine of large dimensions is growing. Would it be a paying proposition to do some cutting? A. Better consult the nearest sawmill. Get a practical lumberman to look over your island and estimate the commercial quantity. Don't start cutting until you know your costs and your market.

Q. I have heard it said that of the millions of little trees found growing in a forest only a trifling percentage survive. How far is this true? A. Ninety-five per cent. of the juvenile trees in a forest eventually sacrifice themselves in order that five per cent may live.

Q. Has Ontario any scientific plan whereby the present deterioration of her white pine forests can be corrected? A. Only last week the Provincial Forester of Ontario announced the scheme whereby ten thousand acres of barren lands should be planted up with pine seedlings each year and this would eventually supply the province with as much mature pine as is now cut annually. The scheme looks like a good business proposition.

Q. Does our Canadian system of licensing timber differ from that of the United States? A. Materially so. The people of the United States own less than one quarter of their total forest area whereas the people of Canada own about 90 per cent. of the forest area. In Canada we merely lease timber cutting rights and retain State control so as to enforce sensible methods in forest conservation as a safeguard to future generations. The United States unfortunately faces the ticklish problem of applying mandatory laws on forest conservation to private property. In Canada we can enforce forestry provisions on our own estate which is much simpler job.

MESSAGES OF CHEER

W. G. Clarke, of Bear River, Warden of Annapolis County. (Halifax Herald)

With the close of the year we have passed through one of the most critical periods in Canadian business history. The outlook at the beginning of the year was uncertain, but so many features of uncertainty, that even the most hopeful, grew pessimistic, when forecasting the year's happenings. The worst is over, and as the year closes, there is an attitude of hopeful expectation toward business for 1922. This is not due to surface developments only, but rather to a genuine recognition that certain vital fundamental conditions underlying the world's business structure, have measurably improved in recent months and give promise of a more stable and essential foundation on which healthy business may hereafter be built.

The delay in adjusting the relations between labor and capital is retarding the return to normal conditions, and a determining factor in the abnormal and excessive freight rates now charged by the railways and in all these factors are harmonized, business will continue to be restricted. Given an equitable adjustment of these conflicting elements, and a realization that wages or salaries are only relative, and should be determined by their purchasing power, rather than by the amount received, our major difficulties will have disappeared, and we shall enter upon a period of increasing business in all departments in 1922, with the assurance that "The best is yet to be."

### THE BANKS OF NEWFOUNDLAND

These Are Fished by Fleets From United States, Canada and Other Countries

On Cregan, Lever's roving charter, was disappointed on crossing the Atlantic that he could not see Banks. It had been his hope that the fishing banks of the Atlantic consisted of mounds and slipping into the sea. Perhaps he was even entertaining the idea of capturing to one of these "randy lands." A good many are possibly "hot" spots on the subject as the irrefragable Con Cregan, but are unwilling to admit their ignorance. The fishing banks are not exposed above the surface. They are actually banks or mounds on the bed of the ocean but are perceptible only by the aid of sounding devices.

The Grand Bank of Newfoundland, the largest, located south-easterly on the Ancient Colony, covers an area about 330 miles north and south and 350 miles east and west and is generally traversed by ships crossing the North Atlantic ocean between European points and ports in Nova Scotia or on the Bay of Fundy. The general depth of water on the Grand Bank varies from thirty to forty-five fathoms and the bottom is mostly sand, gravel, or broken shells. The water surrounding drops off to anywhere from sixty to one hundred and fifty fathoms. The only dangers to navigation on the Bank that have been verified are the Virgin rocks and banks and the Eastern rocks. The area covered by the Grand Bank really includes St. Pierre and Green Banks, which are separated only by narrow channels.

The approach to the Grand Bank is generally evidenced by an increasing number of sea-fowl around the vessel. The great shearwater, well known to the fishermen as hag or hagen, is seen all across the Atlantic, but on the banks it, as well as divers and other sea fowl, becomes very numerous. The shearwater, by the way, derives its name from its skimming or shearing the water when flying.

One will observe by studying a chart of the North Atlantic how close our maritime ports are to the chief fishing banks as compared with American ports, yet it is an actual fact that our neighbors to the south take from these areas between two and three times the quantity of fish we do, and are serious competitors in our foreign trade. It seems logical from an economical and geographical standpoint that the business should be centralized in our Maritime Provinces, excluding possible supplies destined for consumption in Portland, Boston, New York and American centres conveniently at hand. Undoubtedly fish may be landed sooner in our ports and if intended for the fresh fish trade will be on the way to interior markets much sooner than when travelling circuitously via Boston. Furthermore, the proximity of the port gives the fishermen more actual time on the banks. Naturally, when the distance to port is shortened the fishermen can produce more in a stated time and consequently should be able to meet all competition profitably. With the exception of George Bank the Americans are at a disadvantage.

There seems to be a big opportunity for profitable investment. The fresh fish demand in Canada is developing rapidly and fish consumption generally is on the incline throughout the Dominion and the United States, as well. In addition, our foreign trade has grown tremendously in recent years. We should be able to produce cheaper than anyone else and at the premium on the American dollar at the present time handicaps the United States' producer further in competing for foreign trade. Canadians have everything to help them but our neighbors are still doing a large proportion of the business.

The North Atlantic Banks are fished by fleets from the United States, Canada, Newfoundland, France and an occasional ship from Iceland. Large French fleets operate with the French Island of St. Pierre as a base. A cold storage plant costing \$1,200,000 having a freezing capacity of 200,000 in twenty-four hours and storage capacity of 6,000,000 pounds boxed ready for shipment, has recently been built there by the French Government and especially equipped steamers are provided to carry the supplies to Europe. The Parisian government is lending great assistance to the fishing industry, looking apparently in that direction for material for her navy.

### N. S. WOMAN MURDERED

John Waller Shoots His Wife, Her Sister, Then Runs From Scene and Kills Himself

Chelsea, Mass., Jan. 10.—Mrs. Anna Johns is reported dying at Chelsea Hospital. She is the third victim of her sister's husband, John Waller, who yesterday shot and killed Mrs. Waller, shot Mrs. Johns and then running around the corner from the scene of the shooting killed himself.

Mrs. Johns and Mrs. Waller both came here from Nova Scotia and are both natives of Nova Scotia. Waller shot his wife in the back as she came out of a factory where she worked to support herself and child, Marion, and help her husband who was ill with tuberculosis and had been at a sanatorium.

The sick husband brooding over his troubles had become jealous of his wife and the shooting was the result of this jealousy which had reached a point of insanity and which friends of the dead woman say was unjustified.

About two weeks ago he found his wife talking with a man. This inflamed his jealousy and he assaulted her. She had him arrested. They had been separated at the time, he lived in Everett, Mass., she in Chelsea.

After Waller shot his wife he went to her postulate form, lifted her head from the ground, and put another bullet into her body. When he first shot his wife he also shot her sister but he made no attempt to shoot the sister a second time. A few minutes after shooting the two women he killed himself.

Mrs. Johns, when taken to the hospital, said her sister had been threatened many times with death by her husband. She believed that besides having consumption he had mental disease. Waller was engineer before his illness.


