

WELD AT GHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., JUNE AND JULY, 1863.

FIRST SEDERUNT.

At Charlotte Town and within the Church at the head of Prince Street, the 24th day of June, 1863.

Which place and day the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of the Sermon. Lower Provinces of British North America met, and was constituted, after a sermon by the Rev. Hugh McLeod, D.D., Moderator, from Eph. iv. 12, middle clause—" for the work of the ministry."

The Moderator read a letter which he had received from the Rev. P. Letter fm Clerk G. McGregor, the Clerk of Synod, stating that in consequence of the state of his health, he had been advised to relinquish his labours for a time, and that his congregation having generously provided the means, and the Session of his congregation and the Presbytery concurring, he had resolved to visit Britain, and would therefore necessarily be absent from this meeting of Synod. On motion it was agreed, that the Synod express their sympathy with him in his present affliction, cordially sustain his reasons for absence, and approve of his diligence in preparing for the business of the present meeting of Synod.

The Rev. George Patterson was elected clerk pro tempore. Clerk, protem. It was reported that the following changes affecting the roll of Synod Changes in Roll and occurred since last meeting. That the following inductions had taken place.

Rev. James Waddell to the pastoral oversight of Sheet Harbour and By Induction. Tangier, 8th November, 1862.

Rev. Hugh McMillan to the pastoral oversight of Murray Harbour, December 17th, 1862.

That the following probationers having accepted calls have been or-By Ordination. lained and inducted, and their names added to the rolls of Presbyteries.

Rev. W. R. Frame to the pastoral charge of the congregation of Rich. mond Bay East, in the Presbytery of P. E. Island, on the 13th August, 1862.

Rev. Alex. Falconer, to the pastoral charge of the congregation of Queen Square, Charlotte Town, in the same Presbytery, on the 14th of August, 1862.

Rev. Kenneth J. Grant, to the pastoral charge of the congregation of Merigomish, in the Presbytery of Pictou, on the 18th November, 1862.

Probatloners Licensed.

It was also reported that the following probationers have been licensed, By the Presbytery of Pictou, Mr. Thomas Cumming and Mr. William L. Campbell.

By the Presbytery of Halifax, Mr. William Stuart, Mr. John Lamont,

and Mr. James D. Gordon.

New Congregations.

It was also reported that the Presbytery of Pictou had divided the congregation of St. Mary's, Rev. John Campbell retaining the charge of the congregation of Sherbrooke, while Glenelg and Caledonia had been erected into a separate congregation, and also that they had organized the people of Little Harbour and adjacent settlements into a separate congregation; and that the Presbytery of Halifax had erected a new congregation at the North End of the city of Halifax.

New Moderator

Proceeded to the election of a Moderator. The Rev. James Waddell proposed the Rev. George Christie, and the Rev. John McKinnon proposed the Rev. Robert S. Patterson. Both being seconded a vote was taken, when Mr. Patterson was elected.

Dr. McLeod having thanked the Synod for the courtesy extended to him while Moderator of Synod, left the chair, which was taken by Mr. Patterson who briefly addressed the Synod, thanking them for the honour conferred upon him.

Adjourned to meet again at 4 o'clock, P. M. Concluded with prayer.

SECOND SEDERUNT.

The Synod met, and was constituted by the Moderator.

Minutes Read.

The Minutes of last sederunt were read and approved. The Rev. John Morton moved that the thanks of Synod be tendered to Thanks to retir-

ing Moderator Rev. Dr. McLeod, retiring Moderator, for the highly satisfactory and efficient manner in which he presided over this Synod, and for the very appropriate and masterly discourse with which he opened this present Sesion, and that he be requested to furnish the Synod with a copy for pub lication.

> The motion passed, and the Moderator in terms thereof communicated the thanks of the Synod accordingly.

The Report of the Committee on Bills and Overtures was read and Report of Com. on Bills and adopted as follows. Overtures.

James' Cottage, New Glasgow, June 15th, 1863.

Edinburgh May 8th, 1863.

REV. AND DEAR BRETTIREN,-

Your fraternal and very welcome letter of July, 1861, was read to the Ministers and Elders of our Church in Synod assembled, at their meeting held in Edinburgh in May, last year; and we were appointed to express to you the gratification which its grasal afforded to them, and to respond on their behalf to its gratifying statements and christian and appropriate sentiments. The notice it contains of the intimate conaction which subsisted between your ancestors and our own, was observed with pecular interest; and we cherish the memory of that connection as a happy illustration of the fraternal and expansive power of the principles which have actuated the Church four fathers, and as one of the earliest manifestations of the missionary character. While the memory of our own fathers is held in devout remembrance, we do not fail prevere those of your Church, whose character and labours we feel assured you have set exaggerated. We have read, and our fathers have told us of the apostolic Dr. MGregor, and his immediate co-adjutors and successors, and some of us can well remember the able and energetic Dr. McCulloch, and his associates, some of whom rerain, but the most part have fallen asleep. In the enlargement, stability and enterpise of your Church now, we gratefully recognise the successful result of many efforts and prayers, during years of, to it, not unmixed privation.

The accomplishment of the union which has so auspiciously taken place among you, we hail with no common satisfaction. In it we realize an effect of our Saviour's prover that his disciples might be one, and a happy omen and harbinger of the time when the watchmen shall see eye to eye, and when "Ephraim shall not envy Judah, and Judah shall not vex Ephraim," and there shall be nothing to hurt nor destroy in

all God's holy mountain.

Of this union, the results which you communicate to us are such as rejoice our harts, and as we think might have been anticipated in answer to your prayers, and we fervently trust that the gracious Head of the Church will continue increasingly to cause its good fruits to be enjoyed by yourselves, and realized by the whole of your

population.
Your efforts in the cause of education, both in the Sabbath School and in the Semisary, furnish another cause for gratulation. We cannot doubt that while the former cause for gratulation are appropriately as an evaluable institution, the latter will approve ited eminently conducive to the promulgation of sound opinions, and the formation Melaracter, at once intelligent and virtuous both in the church and in the general community.

Moderator.

It is gratifying to us to observe the number of Professors and Theological Students. and we are persuaded that your school of the Prophets will prove a great instrument in the hands of our Divine Master of perpetuating and extending his church in your sample territory, and making the moral wilderness to "rejoice and blossom as the rose.

The Home and Foreign Missionary efforts which you have made, give us yet far-ther reason to expect good things for your church. In this going forth to the world without, we would see evidence that your own spiritual growth is advancing; and in the sweet converse which is held in foreign lands from time to time between Missionaries sent out from different countries, we recognise the oneness of that principle which

animates and supports the whole army of the faithful.

We see with satisfaction that you are so fully alive to the responsibilities that rest upon you, and notice the determination you cherish, in dependence on Divine aid, to endeavour to act answerably to them. We readily understand that the character of your population is such as to render your Missions in some respects peculiar and very arduous, but we need hardly to remind you that endeavouring to cultivate the field of labour in which Providence has placed you, you are warranted to expect, as well need

ed strength, as great results.

We are happy to find that you appreciate the blessings which have flowed, and continue to flow from unions in this land, as in your own. As time rolls on we see more and more cause to be thankful for the results which have attended the secessions from the Established Church, in pursuing the light of our common faith and the warmth of vital christianity. And it is perhaps not easy to overrate the blissful consequences that have attended, and may be expected to follow, the gathering into one of those who, in their separate states, did good service to the common cause, by presenting one aspect to the christian world, and one front to the common foe-the estrangements of the past merging into the harmonies of the present, and the feelings and energies which were wasted by division combining into unity of purpose, counsel and action.

It will interest you to be informed that the United Presbyterian Church now comprises 551 congregations, and 167,558 members, being an increase during the past Synodical year of 4000 members. The number attending prayer-meetings is 52,119. Of Sabbath School Teachers, there are 9214, and of scholars, 71,635. During our las financial year there has been liquidated £38,514 of Debt which rested upon congregations, and the sum of £42,679 has been raised among us for Missionary and benevelent objects. For all purposes of an ecclesiastical and missionary character there has been contributed during the year the sum of £205,167, being an average of 24s. 544. We are happy to add that the attendance at the Theological Itali amounts to 163 Students, of whom 31 have entered for the first year, giving us cause for present thankfulness, and of humble hope that the Lord has farther work and blessing in store for our Church, not in our own country only, but also in other lands

In these tokens of Divine favor to the Church of our common Fathers, and of the perpetuation and extension of our common faith and polity, and in the hopeful dawn of a brighter and more blissful day than we have yet seen, we know that you will re-

joice with us.

We cannot close this letter without expressing our belief that union has not yet with us been carried out to its full practicable extent, and that ere long in the good Providence of God, the Free Church and ourselves will be one. In the meantime, you will be glad to know that the "unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace" is being strengthened, that pulpits are freely interchanged, that mutual prejudices are lesse in and that, as we believe, the fellowship already existing is progressing towards find

And now, Dear Brethren, may the God of love and peace be with us both. May He establish the work of our hands upon us, yea the work of our hands may be so tablish it.
