The others take it out largely in talk. There are nine Sisters of Charity and two Fathers, all from Syracuse, N. Y. The buildings in which they live are neat and clean, and are surrounded by gardens and banana-trees. These noble women are sacrificing their lives to a great a d loving work under the most discouraging circumstances. How sweet, good and gentle they were to the lepers! Some have been in the colony five or six years without having once felt it. . . . I met on the island a gentleman named Dalton, who had been an officer in the United States Army, and lived for a time in Cincinnati. He was formerly wealthy and stood high in the social world. Five or six years ago he was converted to the Catholic faith, disposed of his fortune, gave up his social position and went to Molokai to devote the remainder of his life to the lepers. I found him a good-looking, and extremely intelligent man about 45 years of age, with black hair and beard and a pleasing address. He lived in a one-storied, three-roomed cottage, surrounded by a high stone wall. The little rooms contained many religious emblems, pictures of Christ and the Blessed Virgin Mary, and were very neat and clean for a bachelor's apartments. 


