NEW YORK, Aug. 6 .- (Can. 

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



And this seems to us the easy and real way out of the trouble. It simply means that Canadians will take over absolute control of their own constitution. And that the Canadian Parliament, under STABBING AFFRAY, AT SARNIA. King George or his viceroy, is not within the jurisdiction of the British Parliament under the same King George in a little stabbing affair at the ferry in matters Canadian. Our parliament will be supreme in our own country. Then will we be the equal of the mother country and a co-equal partner. At present we are wards and will so remain as long as we choose. 


