# EDWARD GREY'S INAUGURATION PRODUCE ATTENTION

## Ceremonies Attended by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Other Dignitaries a Success.

Edmonton, N.W.T., Sept. 1.—(Special.)—The inauguration ceremonies of the new Province of Alberta here today were an immense success. The concert last night in the rink was attended by five thousand well-dressed people, better representative of Canada, perhaps, than even a Toronto audience would be. The governor-general and Sir Wilfrid Laurier were in the front, and the concert was excellent, while the keynote of Earl Grey's speech here today at the ceremonies was a revelation to all who saw them for the first time. The ceremonies were impressive and yet democratic, and the governor-general, as the representative of the King, with the regiments of mounted police, smartly drilled, and splendidly mounted, red-coated, solidly, well-drilled, added a note of picturesque grandeur to the democratic shrouded western lad.

## Treaty of Portsmouth May Be Completed To-Day and Then Hostilities Will Cease.

Portsmouth, Sept. 1.—Japan has refused to consent to the cessation of hostilities until the treaty of peace has been signed. The Russian plenipotentiaries, accompanied by their secretaries, called on Baron Komura and Mr. Takahira shortly after noon to-day and were in conference with them for half an hour. Japan having indicated last night through Baron Komura her willingness for an armistice Mr. Witte supposed to-day that the world had been ready to sign. Baron Komura explained that while his government was ready to consent to an armistice, his instructions were that this should not take effect until after the signing of the treaty. The Russian plenipotentiary stated that the Russian position being that Japan's contention was without precedent, and that if the armistice was not signed until after the signing of the treaty, it was practically unnecessary. However, the Japanese were insistent and an agreement was accordingly entered into providing for an armistice which shall take effect the moment the treaty is signed.

## Three Victims in One Day—Fatalities at Deseronto

Deseronto, Sept. 1.—A sad drowning accident occurred here about noon. Leo McCambie, a young man who has been employed in the Bathing Company Lumber Mills, during the summer vacation, and whose home is at Deseronto Junction, was bathing during the noon hour with several other young fellows. He missed his hold on a boom and as he could not swim sank at once. His friends, not knowing he was drowning, sat and waited for him to come up. After several minutes had elapsed they shouted for help, and Andrews, their proposal is to establish a station near Campbellford, there are several cases of smallpox in a cheese factory in the town of Deseronto. It is pointed out in Japanese circles that an armistice has practically been in effect since the conference began, and it is declared that there is no ground for anxiety for a clash before the signing of the agreement.

## Both Sides Disappointed

London, Sept. 1.—Commenting on J. S. Ewart's article in The Monthly Review, The Glasgow Herald says: "One doubts if such plain-spoken words will be altogether palatable to the people who are urging in season and out of season that Canada is yearning for tangible bonds with the mother country. On both sides there are elements of disappointment, for Great Britain is not the state of preference plus quite the practical independence which they enjoy."

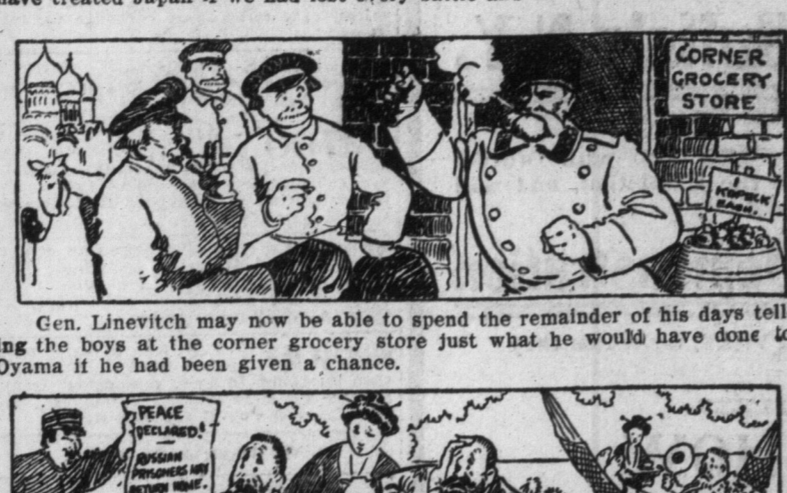
## TURBINER VICTORIAN ASHORE

### VIRGINIAN AGROUND IN A FOG

Nineteen Feet of Water in Forward Hold of Victorian, Whose Stern Protrudes Into Main Channel.

Montreal, Sept. 1.—(Special.)—The Allan Line royal mail steamer Victoria, one of the new turbines, with 230 passengers, general cargo and mails for Great Britain, ran aground at Cape Charles, 120 miles below here and about 30 miles above Quebec at noon today. The liner had been steaming slowly in a thick fog, rendered thicker by dense smoke from her funnels. The Allan here have been informed that there is 19 feet of water in the forward hold of the steamer, and that she is hard aground forward, with her stern protruding at an angle into the ship channel.

Alleged Lobbying of Candidate Causes Trouble in Property Committee of Board of Education.

What promised at the outset to be a remarkably quiet and methodical meeting of the property committee of the board of education yesterday developed into a highly interesting and sensational affair. The members present were: Chairman Leves, and Trustees Davis, Brown and Rawlinson. The committee waded thru the financial statements with nothing to disturb the apartment of the school was the cork point of the committee, precipitating a deadlock within the past two years. Shortly after the opening of the holidays this position of caretaker was rendered vacant thru the death of Miss Crawford. The choice of a building department for the vacant position was Fred Stephens, who for the past two years has at intervals served in the capacity of temporary caretaker in different schools.

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# MILLION GALLONS AN HOUR

## LEAK THRU CONCRETE WORK

Startling Defect in Work on Lift Lock of Trent Valley Canal.

Peterboro, Sept. 1.—(Special.)—One million gallons an hour leak has been discovered in the concrete work of the new lift lock at Kirkfield. The lift lock will afford an elevation of 50 feet, being located between Lake Huron and Lake Simcoe, on the Trent Canal. The leak is in the upper reach, the water escaping thru the concrete side walls. The Dominion Bridge Company of Montreal, which has the contract for the steel superstructure, intended using the power developed by the water coming thru the upper reach to drive their machinery for hoisting drilling, etc., in connection with the placing of the steel. A turbine and machinery had been installed. When the guard gates were raised and the water let in the reach, the leak developed and the concrete work was impossible to raise it to a height to affect the turbine. There are two engineers and an inspector on the job. Repairs are being made to the side walls. It is said the leaks will cost over a thousand dollars to repair. An investigation is likely to be held to find who is to blame for the startling leak. The leak is the contract for the lift lock, and the reach is a quarter-mile in length.

## DOCK LABORS STRIKE.

Company Invores Request of Men for 25c Day Increase.

Montreal, Sept. 1.—(Special.)—This morning about one hundred fifty dock laborers engaged by the Dominion Transportation Co. to handle the freight on the wharf of the C. P. R. went on strike on the refusal of the company to increase their wages. Their pay from \$1.50 to \$1.75 per day. What is described as an ultimatum, signed without name and dated this morning, was delivered to the company fifteen days ago demanding an increase of 25 cents per day. On Sept. 1, and as no favorable reply had been received from the transport company, the men went on strike.

TRANSFERRED FREE OF COST

Fortifications Must Be Held for Military Purposes Only.

Ottawa, Sept. 1.—A cable has been received from the Imperial government regarding that the war department should transfer to the Canadian government free of charge all the fortifications in Nova Scotia, which the Dominion is permitted to take over for military purposes.

FEVER CRISIS PASSED

Campaign of Science Against Yellow Jack Ends in Success.

New Orleans, Sept. 1.—Signed statements of all the leaders in the fever fight, indicating that the crisis has passed, and that the campaign of science is proceeding with unbounded success, and that the fever will be practically forgotten by frost, are printed here today.

DEATH IN PENNSACOLA

Pensacola, Fla., Sept. 1.—The first death here from yellow fever occurred today. The victim was stricken Sunday. No other new cases are reported.

BRUTALITY TOWARDS NATIVES

Chief Colonial Functionaries Sentenced to 5 Years in Prison. Paris, Sept. 1.—As a result of the investigation of Count de Brazza, the African explorer, into the charges of brutality toward natives of the French Congo, the government announced today that the two chief colonial functionaries, MM. Gaud and Touge, have been sentenced to five years imprisonment.

Boston, Sept. 1.—The population of Massachusetts is 2,998,953 according to a preliminary report made today by the state bureau of statistics. This is an increase of 48,775 over 1896, when the last official census was taken.

KILLED BY LIVE WIRE

Hoosick Falls, N.Y., Sept. 1.—Phlander Hall an 18-year-old boy, while at play last night, was instantly killed. He threw one arm around an electric light pole, and with the other hand grasped the cable used for lowering the arm, which had become crossed with wire feeder. A current of 4000 volts passed thru the boy's body.

COMMENDABLE EXHIBIT

LABRADOR MISSION FAILS

SUN OBSCURED BY CLOUDS

Observation Parties Sent Out by Canada and Lick Observatory Get No Photographs.

St. John's, Nfld., Sept. 1.—The Lick Astronomical Observatory expedition which went to Cartwright, Labrador, to observe the solar eclipse of Wednesday last, met with complete failure. Heavy banks of clouds obscured the heavens during the entire period of eclipse, and the result of the attempted observations was so unsatisfactory that the astronomer will not even attempt to develop the photographic plates which were exposed.

The report of the failure of the mission was brought here today by Governor MacGregor, who had accompanied the expedition to Cartwright and returned here today on the warship Scotia. The governor said he feared also that the expedition to the Lick Observatory at Hamilton, only about fifty miles from Cartwright, was fully as unsuccessful as those at St. John's.

Early morning conditions last Wednesday were very favorable for the observation of the heavens, the governor said, and every preparation had been made for the work, which was about about 8 a.m. Behind the sun, however, banks of clouds rolled up, and during the whole period of totality the sun was completely obscured.

### OBJECTS OF CHARITY FIND OLD WOMEN ARE STUBBORN

#### Their Habitation Condemned by Board of Health—They Refuse to Get Out.

Because they have not committed any crime other than living in the house in which they have resided for over thirty years, and would not vacate it on the order of the municipal board of health, Magistrate Kingsford fined four old women \$5, without costs, or thirty days in jail, yesterday. The women had the right to live in the house free of charge, it being one of the bequests to charity of the late Lieutenant-Governor Dawson to the St. Vincent de Paul Society for the aged. The house, which is situated at West Hill, is a two-story building, and the women, who are all over seventy years of age, have lived in it for many years. The board of health, which is composed of the Mayor, the Commissioner of Public Works, and the Commissioner of Health, has ordered the house to be demolished, as it is a nuisance to the neighborhood. The women, however, refuse to leave, and the board has taken the case to court. Magistrate Kingsford, in his judgment, said that the women were not entitled to the house, as it was not a charitable bequest to them personally, but to the society. He ordered the women to leave the house by the end of the week, or they would be committed to jail. The women, however, have appealed the decision, and the case will be heard again in a few days.

### POLICE SALARIES SMALL.

#### Causes Considerable Inferiority Among Applicants for Police Jobs

One of the chief subjects before the board of police commissioners at their meeting on Tuesday will be the appointment of about fifteen new men to the force. It is expected that the board will consider the salaries of the police, which are considered to be very low. The board is also expected to consider the inferiority of the applicants for police jobs, which is attributed to the low salaries. The board is expected to recommend an increase in salaries to attract better candidates. The current salaries range from \$100 to \$150 per month, which is considered to be very low for the work involved. The Globe says it is becoming every day more apparent that the position of Ottawa will soon be exceedingly anomalous. Until the last decade, when Ontario and Quebec were predominant partners in the politics of the Dominion, it was convenient for delegates from Halifax and Winnipeg, but the westward flow of immigration has changed all that, and the east finds itself faced with the loss of a good deal of its population. It will not be necessary to admit that the leading professional people in the metropolis live there.

### WILL GUARANTEE PEACE.

Anglo-Japanese Alliance Regarded Favorably in London.  
London, Sept. 1.—Diplomatic circles are taking deep interest in the new Anglo-Japanese treaty, but as yet they are not in possession of anything beyond the broad outlines already revealed. They are satisfied that it provides a defensive alliance, one which guarantees Japan the fruits of her victories in the far east, and on the other hand ensuring Great Britain against aggression in India. The diplomats express themselves well satisfied that it guarantees peace. In German circles the treaty is looked upon favorably. It is expected that it will be promulgated immediately upon the signing of the Portsmouth treaty.

### MILK THIEF SENTENCED.

A sentence of five days in jail was imposed by Magistrate Denison in the police court yesterday on Charles Bantyne for stealing a bottle of milk belonging to Mrs. Booth. The thief took place in the early morning, and the wagon had made their rounds.

### FOREIGNER'S LIGHT SENTENCE.

Magistrate Denison is disposed to allow foreign prisoners caught carrying revolvers off with very light punishment. Yesterday he imposed the statute fine of \$20 and costs on Victor Mulline, a Finnlander, for this offence. The fine not being left to his discretion, he made the length of term in jail one hour. Of course the prisoner took the latter option.

**W.Y. STOCKS CLOSE HEAVY CANADIANS ARE STEADY**

Wall Street Witnesses Only Slight Rallyies—Some Local Specities Are Well Supported.

World Office, Friday Evening, Sept. 1.

In view of a holiday until Tuesday next, and a further weakness in New York, the local market showed an unexpectedly steady close today. The trading was in about equal volume of that of previous days in the week, but again spots of activity were scarce. A majority of the total transactions were contributed by Sao Paulo. There was a disposition to liquidate this issue rather freely early in the day. A sharp break in the price is constantly being awaited by the trading fraternity, and it was thought that the dip at New York pre-empted just such a movement. The pool in the stock gave the price excellent support, however, and closed transactions at half a point higher than the opening. None of the other speculative shares contributed advances except General Electric, which passed through a similar experience to that of Sao Paulo. Other market movements were fractionally lower, with Twin City, N. S. Steel and Mackay common most prominent in this respect. Trading in bank stocks was represented solely by Dominion, which was firm and a touch higher, and was fairly represented in today's business, and was firm in comparison with other issues.

It is spacious and affords a pleasant resting spot for those who are weary of the busy activity of the grounds, and would seek for a few minutes or an hour the comparative quiet that the headquarters of the order at the fair affords.

There is a genial welcome for all with G. A. Minnow as the dispenser of the hospitalities. The tent, which is situated where the cool lake breezes blow, is a veritable rallying spot for members of the I.O.F. from far and near. More than that, it is a place where information is cheerfully furnished to all those who would enquire into the advantages offered by the order.

It may be said that the I.O.F. has already paid out to widows, orphans and disabled brethren a sum equal in value to about 30 tons of gold. This is a striking way of putting it, and the boon that the order has been to the dependent ones, from whom the bread of life is taken, has been taken, and to those of the members who have become incapacitated for active work through fact that cannot be over-emphasized too much is that all the accumulated fund belongs to the members or policy-holders.

There are six considerations which should carry great weight with those who are not members of the order. There is the social aspect which membership in a society of 250,000 members opens up, in temporary sickness, fraternal help freely given. If there is total and permanent disability, members are given an amount equal to one-half of their policy, besides what is in effect a paid-up policy for the balance of their lives. In old age, entitled members are given yearly financial assistance, so that in their declining and infirm years there is freedom from penury. In death, aid is provided for the beneficiaries and loved ones of deceased members with a promptness which is a relief and solace to the bereaved family. In cases where orphans are left destitute, it extends its helping hand in the best spirit of benevolence, educates them and cares for their physical and moral well-being until they are able to take care of themselves.

The question of stability is, of course, an all-important one. When it is said that the I.O.F. could out of the funds already in its treasury and without collecting any premiums from any one of its 250,000 members pay any probable death claims for a period, approximately, of the next five years, or thereabouts, it would be sufficiently evident that there is little to fear in this quarter. The constantly increasing surplus fund, the widening circle of membership, the feeling manifested everywhere that the order is a substantial fabric, reared on a solid foundation and built for time, are all indications that point toward the I.O.F. as an eminently safe institution.

### HOW TO RAISE A BABY.

There was an interesting gathering of mothers and others in the Women's Institution tent yesterday afternoon, when Mrs. J. Joy of Toronto delivered an instructive lecture on the first five years of a child's life, emphasizing that the mother's care for that important period of a young child's existence made or blighted after life. The sole duty of parents was to observe the laws of nature in the early years of the infant. Animals do this and the percentage of death of their young was far less than that of human beings. Careful study of food, air and water was to be observed to make a mental and physical child, and Mrs. Joy dealt at length on the methods to be pursued.
